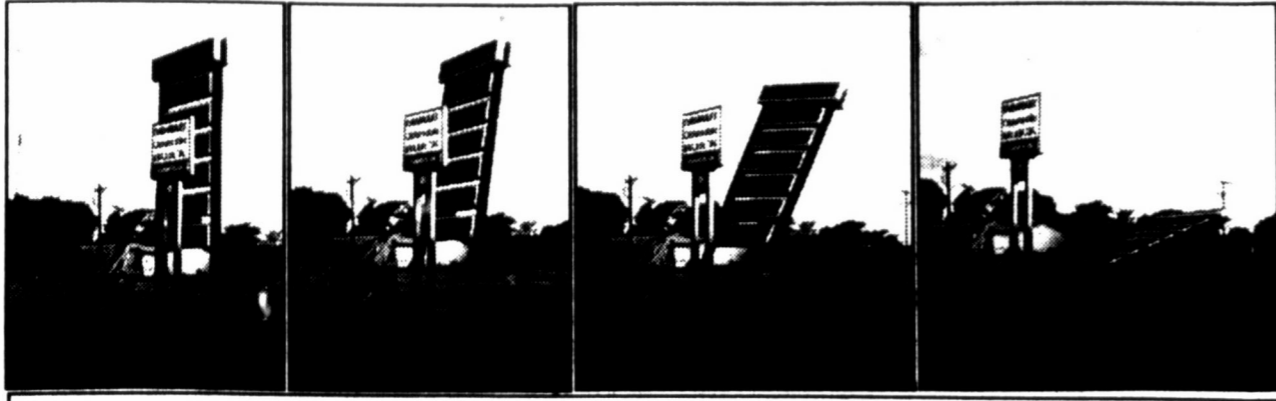

College hires new food service provider, makes plans for more student activities

Students enrolled in the spring 1996 semester participated in a survey on what could be done to improve quality of service and activities at Clarendon College. As requested by the students, CC has announced some changes and additions.

The most requested need was for a new food service. Therefore, Great Western Dining Service was recently hired to oversee the college cafeteria. Great Western is also the food provider for Vernon Regional Junior College, Amarillo College, and Frank Phillips College.

CC students will be offered all-you-can-eat meals, as well as regional specialties such as chicken fried steak and barbecue. Great Western will also offer a Steak Night every other week.

The second most requested change was for more student activities. According to Michelle Schmidt, CC Activities Director, the fall semester will be filled with fun and exciting sports and special events.

"The large addition to the student activities is going to be sand volleyball. With a lit area, students will be able to play into the evening hours," Schmidt said.

Archaeology Society sets tour for historic sites near Lake Greenbelt

A local archaeology tour and artifact identification at Greenbelt Lake is set for June 14.

A guided tour by Texas Archaeological Society members will be conducted at prehistoric and historic sites overlooking Greenbelt Lake in Donley County on June 14, from 2 to 5 in the afternoon. The site is located on HWY. 70. The route will be marked from Howardwick. The site is private and closed to the public any other time.

Do you wonder about that rock on your desk or that arrowhead in your drawer? An artifact identification session will be held at the same time and place as the tour. No artifacts will be kept; however, experts on local archaeological materials will discuss your materials with you. You will learn what the artifacts are and their age. You will be asked where the artifacts originated and photographs will be taken. This valuable information helps you and scientists build a better picture of the Panhandle Region and makes area site interpretations stronger.

The Texas State Archaeologist's Office will have persons present to share with you information on recording and preserving archeological sites on your land, how to join a network of interested persons, and the importance of all archaeological resources for the present and the future. They have material for your children and others interested in archaeology.

Citizens meet to discuss community goals at recent development session

Approximately 25 persons participated in a strategic planning process for Clarendon led by Sylvia Knezek, Community Development Specialist of West Texas Utilities on May 20-21, 1996.

Linda Caton and Shirley Deal, also of West Texas Utilities, formed the team with Sylvia provided by Eric Geisler, WTU's Director of Business Development. The event was sponsored by the Clarendon Economic Development Board with support by the Clarendon-Donley County Chamber of Commerce and hosted at Clarendon College's Bairfield Activity Center.

The meetings were structured to create a plan of action to accomplish locally identified goals for economic development. It is usual for more actions to be identified than there's energy to initiate, and Clarendon's meeting followed that pattern.

Knezek led exercises to identify community strengths and weaknesses by dividing those present into smaller groups for discussion. Everyone was able to state their observations based on needs in their daily lives.

The top six positive assets identified were the education system, the major highways, Greenbelt Lake and the area parks, being a central location for celebrating our Western heritage through the museum and crafters, tourism and the prospects of Thunder Junction, and local access to the Internet.

Apathy was identified as the major community weakness. Those at the meeting said they saw too many residents as unwilling to cooperate, to change, and to be involved. Deficiencies in the areas of financial funding, entertainment facilities, a cooperative plan between government offices and volunteer groups, and needs for affordable housing and beautification along Highway 287 were other weaknesses.

Following the assessment, a vision statement describing the ideal

Bairfield Foundation makes \$9,000 donation to renovate old depot

A grant of \$9,000 from the Charles E. and Thelma A. Bairfield Memorial Foundation will be helping to renovate the old Ft. Worth & Denver Depot.

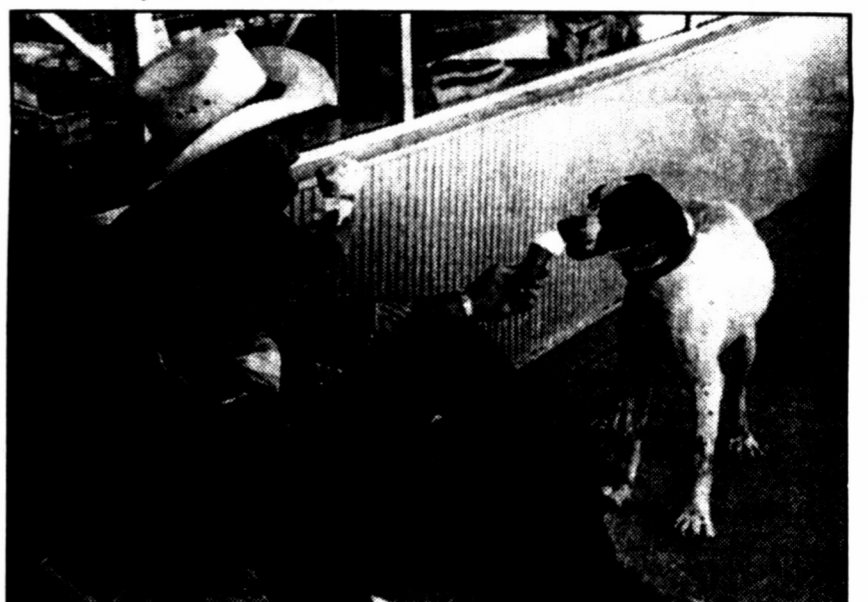
The depot, which was moved recently to the east side of the Saints' Roost Museum on the grounds of the old Adair Hospital, will be remodeled to house a railroad exhibit for the museum.

The Bairfield Foundation, according to Joe Lovell, annually disperses funds earned on a principal amount that was set up by Charles and Thelma Bairfield after their deaths. The dispersal of such money is decided by the trustees of the

foundation. Upon his death in 1991, Mr. Bairfield specified that the foundation money be spent on such purposes as religious, scientific, literary, charitable, or educational endeavors.

The trustees selected the Saints' Roost Museum as this year's recipient and informed them several weeks ago of the decision to grant the money with the stipulation that the depot be on-site at the museum before the money was released.

When the depot arrived on the museum grounds on May 22, 1996, a check was cut and presented to representatives of the Saints' Roost Museum.

Open house to mark debut of photo exhibit at local library

The public is invited to an open house at the Burton Memorial Library in downtown Clarendon on Thursday, June 6, 1996, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The open house will mark the debut of "Plains of Light, Fields of Vision," a photographic retrospective created by Dr. John Morris of the University of Texas.

This show includes over 40 rare photos taken in the Texas Panhandle from 1905 through 1915. During that period, "land developers, town boosters, and proud new homesteaders all turned to area photographers to record much of their march of progress," said Morris.

The resulting photographs serve as windows through which old and

young can catch a glimpse of the Panhandle's past.

"These pictures will bring back a lot of memories for seniors in the area and children can see what life was like when the Panhandle was young," said Mary Green, Burton Librarian.

The "Plains of Light" show will be on display throughout the month of June.

In addition to taking in the heritage of the region, the library invites the public to get a look at the future. A new research computer is now up and running at the library, to be followed by another computer devoted to providing access to the Internet.

Howardwick to experience a mock disaster next Saturday, June 15

A mock disaster will be held next weekend in Howardwick to prepare citizens and emergency personnel for any potential crisis.

The event will take place on Saturday, June 15, starting at about 9:30 a.m.

Currently, plans are for a level three tornado to cut a path across the town leaving 30 dead and 100 wounded. The actual mock disaster could be a different scenario however.

Local deputies, fire fighters, EMS personnel, Highway Patrol, and other emergency volunteers from

surrounding counties will be involved in the "disaster" relief.

A planning and organizational meeting for the mock disaster was held Monday night at the Howardwick City Hall. Mayor Millie Dishong said the main reason for the meeting was so participant could how very important communication is in crisis situations.

"There's No Place Like Home"



Whenever you make a deal, you normally give up something to get something.

When I moved to Clarendon, I gave up McDonalds, a quad cinema, and a mall. But I got back so much more. It seems like every time I leave our city limits I'm reminded of that. Like a couple of weeks ago when the family and I made the 5 1/2-hour trek down 287 to Dallas for my nephew's high school graduation.

Seeing my sister and her family was nice, but, ultimately, I couldn't get out of there fast enough. I had forgotten just how frenzied big city life can be.

Back in 1975, I lived in Rockwall, Texas, and worked in downtown Dallas off of Ross Avenue as an editorial assistant for the United Methodist Reporter. I was reminded of those days again when we hit 35-E, which connects Denton with Dallas. Geez, I felt like I was a participant in one of those annual Spanish bull runs when the snorting, horned beast chases all those crazy people down the street and usually goes one or two.

Of course, dodging one of those bulls might have been easier than driving on 35-E and LBJ (635) because I would have only had to contend with the bull. In the case of driving, I had all the other cars and my wife, Claudia, riding shotgun and providing an incessant flow of expert advice.

"Slow down, slow down!" she'd say. "You're following that car too closely! Give that truck more room! Watch that guy changing lanes..."

And on an on and on - a continuous monologue on defensive driving. You know, Claudia - bless her heart - would have made an excellent Hollywood tour bus guide. You can talk all you want while driving at a turtle's pace and making frequent stops to potty.

But finally I'd absorbed enough and countered with, "Claudia, I'm just keeping pace with the traffic, dear."

"Is that what you're going to say when you get a ticket?" she volleyed.

"No," I shot back. "I'm going to tell the cop that we were rushing to the hospital."

"The hospital? For what?" she quizzed.

"Battered husband syndrome," I said.

"Ha. Ha. Very funny," she retorted. "But if you get a ticket, you'll never hear the end of it."

"Doye," I summed.

Of course, highway congestion wasn't the only reason I was ready to leave Big D posthaste. I had the opportunity to play golf with my best friend, Jeff Garrett, one afternoon, and I felt out of place there, too.

Jeff and I played high school football together in Tennessee, then roomed together in college for a while. He moved to Dallas to go into the antique business, and ultimately convinced me to give Texas a try back in the

70s. Jeff became one of the most successful antique dealers in the Southwest, numbering among his clients celebs like Johnny Cash.

When the TV series Dallas was on the air, Jeff's company supplied all the furniture for the Jock Ewing mansion. He rubbed shoulders with Larry Hagman (J.R.) and Patrick Duffy (Bobby) and Barbara Bell Gedes (Miss Ellie) and the whole cast. I think his favorites, though, were Victoria Principal (Pam), Linda Gray (Sue Ellen), and the blond who played young and mischievous Lucy. I think her name was Charlene Tilton or something like that.

Anyway, Jeff made it big and lives on the golf course at the exclusive Dallas Athletic Club, where Jack Nicklaus won the PGA Championship in 1963. Since then, DAC has added another 18 - designed by Nicklaus.

Jeff invited my son, Scotty, and me to play, and just driving up to the swanky place in our 1987 Chevy Celebrity was, in itself, a humbling experience. I turned to Scotty and rolled my eyes.

After it was over and I'd shot 150, I humbly offered to pay Jeff for our green and cart fees.

"Oh, you can't use cash here," he said. "You have to sign for everything."

"Well, then, I'll just pay you. How much is it?" I asked.

"You don't want to know," he giggled. "Just forget it, man. You can pay for mine when I come to Clarendon."

"Okay," I said, thinking that I had just made out like a bandit.

So, you give up something to get something. I'll gladly trade the maniacal traffic and Claudia's coaching for my unobstructed two-minute ride down Koogle to work. And maybe our fairways at Clarendon Country Club aren't exactly like carpet. But, hey, at least I don't lose 20 Top Flights in water hazards every time I play.

And I'm quite comfortable driving my rusty Chevy to the course without slithering down in the seat behind some joker in Mazaradi wearing Tommy Hilfiger shirts and a Plantation hat.

Dorothy, ruby slippers and all, said it best - there's no place like home.

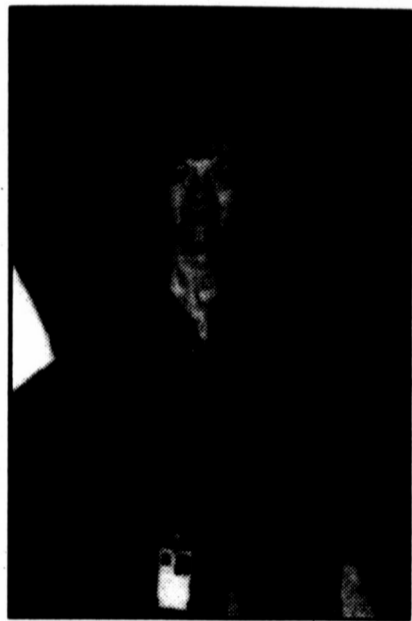

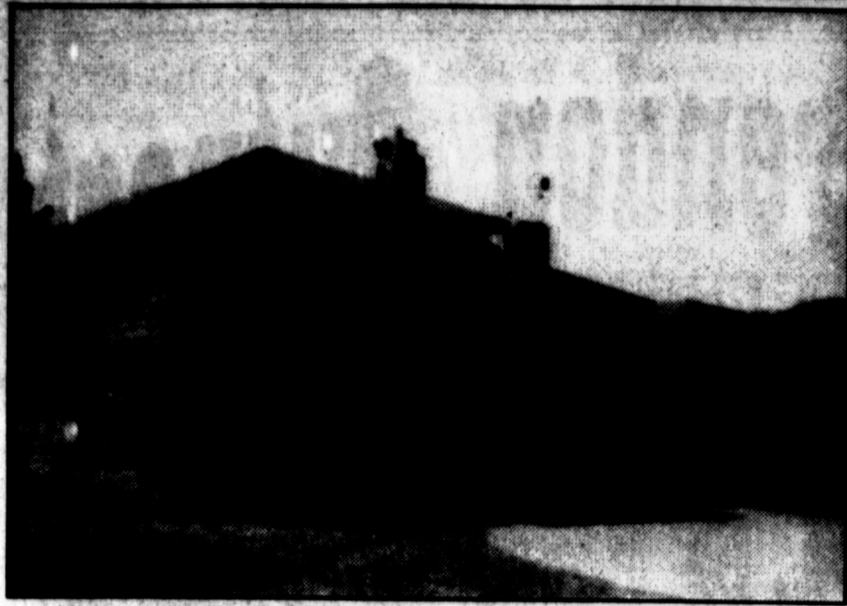

Old Line Turns Into Fish Attractors

Thanks to the folks at Berkley, anglers can turn discarded fishing line into state-of-the-art fish attractors call Fish-Habs.

For the past several years, Berkley has encouraged anglers to become more environmentally responsive by recycling their old monofilament fishing lines. Line left carelessly behind at the lake is potentially lethal to all kinds of wildlife, from turtles and fish to raccoons, waterfowl, and birds of prey.

Special bins were distributed to tackle stores across the nation, and concerned anglers responded to the Berkley challenge by returning nearly 5 million miles of all brands of line. Berkley, who does not make their premium lines from discarded products, was faced with a mountain of monofilament. They started searching for a suitable use that would help both the anglers and the aquatic environment.

Fish-Habs were the answer because they provide structure for growth of beneficial algae and other microorganisms. These draw schools of baitfish, which attract crappie, bass, sandbass, and walleye. Patterned after the traditional crappie stake-beds and enclosed to make a cube, a series of Fish-Habs would make an ideal addition to our mostly barren West Texas lakes.

As part of a special promotion, organizations can earn one FREE Fish-Hab cube for each 60 UPC codes from any line that is made by Berkley. According to Jan Bowles, promotion and merchandising manager for Berkley, "I see a lot of opportunity for bass clubs to get involved with retailers and accumulate a lot of UPC codes quickly." Fish-Habs may be purchased for \$60 (includes shipping) but groups may pool their UPC codes to earn free units.

Berkley suggests setting up the Fish-Habs in the vertical position for a crappie attractor and in a horizontal position as a bass attractor. Be sure to check with the proper lake authorities before installing the Fish-Habs.

Because of the foresight and some basic research by Berkley, the fishing will improve while our lakes remain free of the dangers associated with discarded fishing line. It's a win-win situation for everyone involved in the great outdoors, and a prime example of why Berkley is an acknowledged leader in the fishing industry.

An Unexpected Windfall
Our Museum received a surprise gift from the Moore County Historical Museum last week. Among estate items bequeathed to the Dumas museum were several 1921 edition of *The Clarco*, the weekly newspaper of Clarendon College. The editions are in very good shape and provide some interesting reading.

In 1921, Glenn Lewis was editor and Vera McGowan was assistant editor. David M. Beights was the business manager and Monteith Warren was assistant business manager. Associate editors included Alice Mulkey, Earl Clements, Wesley Upton, Elizabeth King, Lelia Burrell, Cecil Peoples, Alice Miller, and Arch Hart.

The May 17, 1921, edition of *The Clarco* contained the final examination schedule for the year. Final tests were being given for Geology, English, Spanish, Latin, math, Economics, History, French, bible, Science, Education, Domestic Science, Public Speaking, and Domestic Art.

The February 1 edition contained the following life mottoes selected by graduating students;

Cleora Brummett - "Let the rest of the world go by."

Alta Brown - "Keep off the grass."

Helen Brashear - "Take a sporting chance."

Neva Bourland - "The life of a sailor's the life for me."

Ches Crawford - "Water water everywhere, and nothing else to drink."

Ethel Hudson - "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy."

The March 22 edition of *The Clarco* contained the following bit of verse:

Here's The Girl of To-Day
With her short cut skirt and cunning way

Long may she live as the stars at night,

Make the roses ashamed to come in sight,

With her drop stitch hose and low-cut waist,

Make an old man glance at amazing Grace

Here's to her tinted lips and cheeks so fair

All make the world so glad she's there

Here's to her eyes both blue and brown

Without her the world would not go round

Then let us hope that she won't stop

And that skirts short will never drop

Oh, well, you have to remember it was called the roaring 20's!

Allergic reactions to raw fruits and vegetables

Why is it that a person can eat cooked fruits and vegetables without experiencing allergic reactions but, when eating the same fruits and vegetables raw, an allergic reaction is triggered? The basic theory is that allergenic molecules are almost always a specific size and shape. When a food is cooked or processed, the shape of the molecule is changed so that it no longer triggers the reaction in which the allergen stimulates the release of antibodies. These antibodies called immunoglobulin E are specific for the fruit molecule. These antibodies attach or link up to cells of the immune

system causing a release of the components (histamine and other chemical substances) that produce an allergic reaction — itching, swelling or other symptoms characteristic of oral type allergic reaction.

The fact that the cooked food counterpart no longer triggers a reaction is reported most frequently in regards to fruits and vegetables. Some can be dangerous and even life-threatening. So if you suspect you know that a certain food causes you a specific allergic symptom, check with your family physician or allergist about any type of allergic reaction that you may be experiencing.

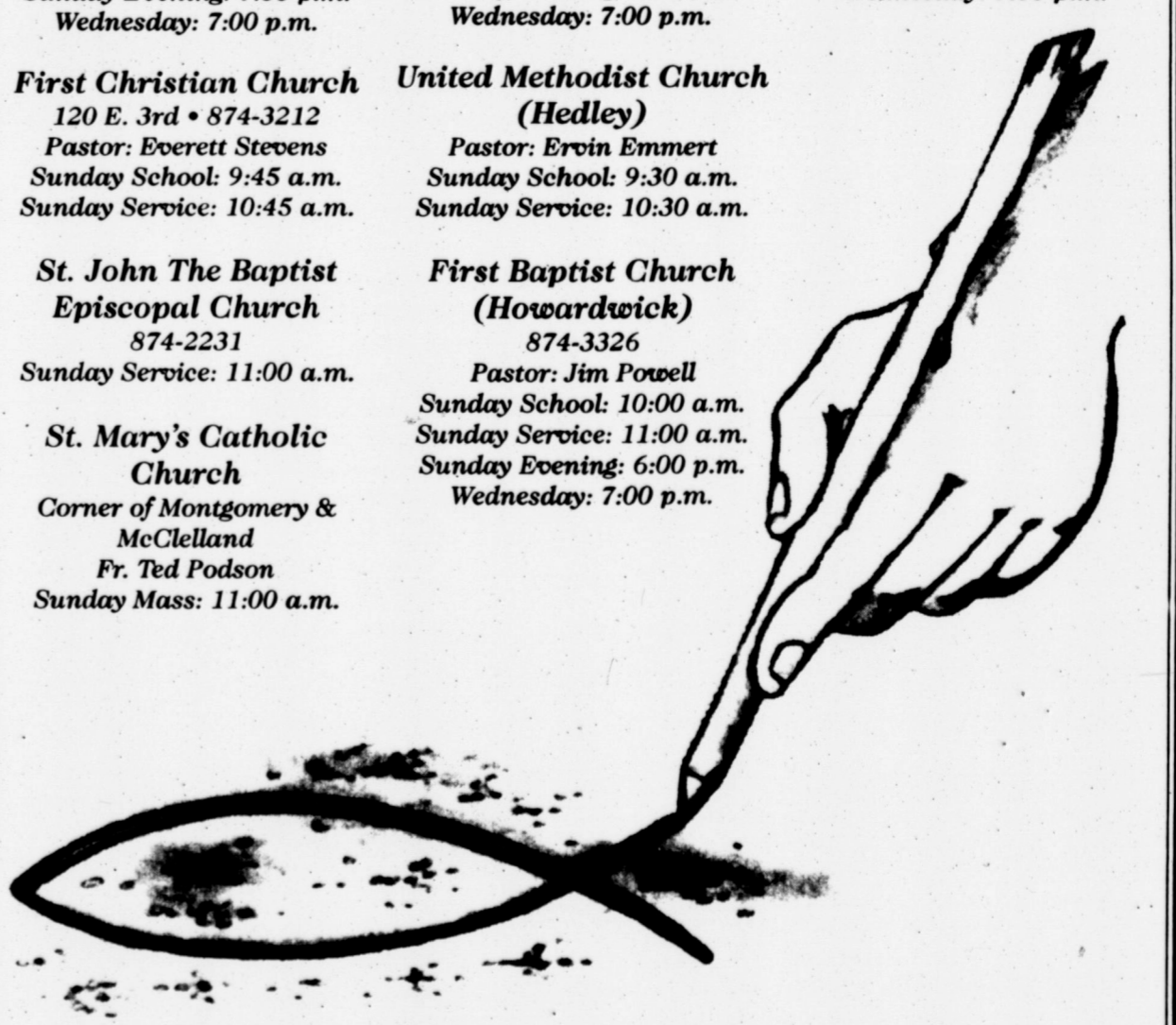

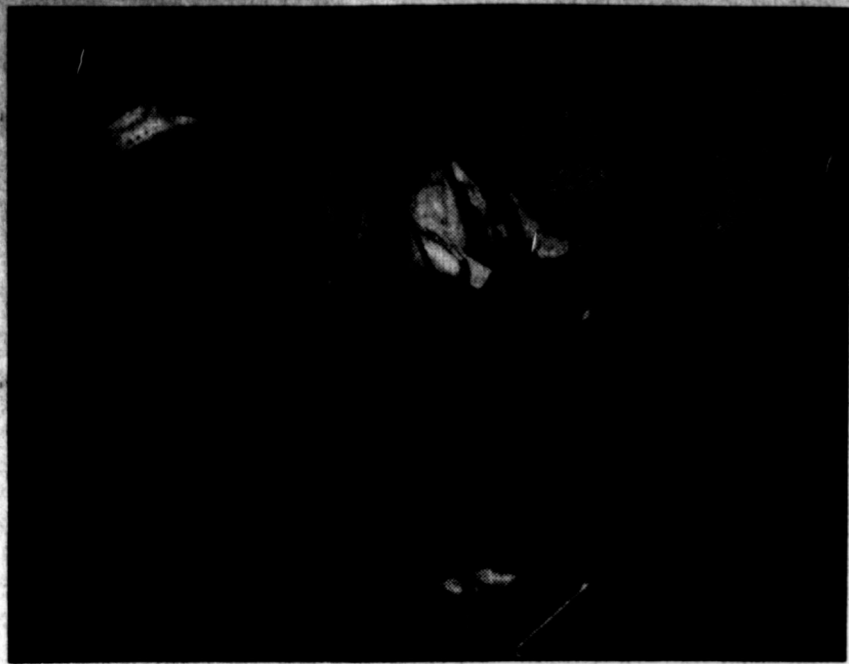

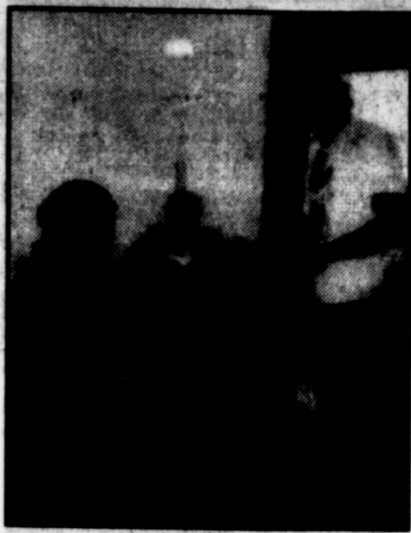
Large crowd attends Saints' Roost Jamboree
