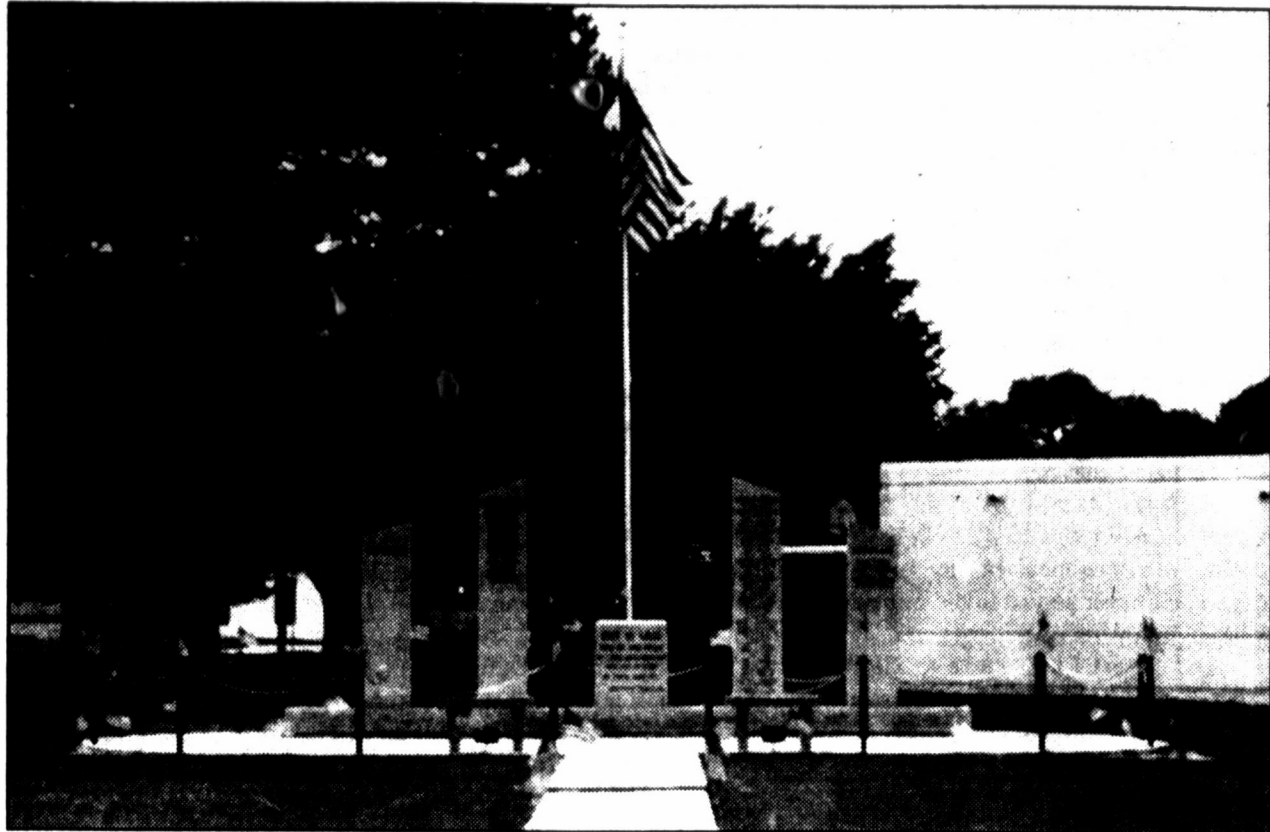

## Greenbelt Lake begins \$370,000 improvements

Greenbelt Lake will be seeing more than \$370,000 worth of improvements to recreational facilities in the next few weeks.

The improvements are being made possible because of two grants from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. according to Walt Knorpp, vice president of Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

The first grant will be used to further develop 20 acres of Kincaid Park on the south side of the lake.

The project includes plans for a 30' x 50' open air pavillion. The roofed facility will be able to be used for reunions, picnics, outdoor meetings, and similar gatherings.

Plans also call for construction of a playground, a fishing pier, 20 RV campsites, a 1.1 mile trail, interpretive signs, utilities, and other signs.

The total cost for this project is \$103,488. With the 50/50 grant, the state will pick up \$51,744 of that amount.

The second grant will provide new boat ramps and courtesy docks on the south side of the lake. One will be at Kincaid Park, one at Bluff Point, and one near the lease lots on the southwest side of the lake.

Each of the new boat ramps will have parking areas, lighting, and signs.

These new boat ramp facilities

will have a total \$266,667 price tag, and the 75% grant from the state will pay \$200,000 of that cost.

As this story went to press, work was expected to be underway immediately. The entire project is expected to be completed in 90 to 120 days, Knorpp said.

The local Masonic Lodge awards scholarships each year to qualified candidates. Students must be graduates of CHS, be enrolled to attend Clarendon College, and meet other qualifications of the application. Masonic Heritage does not enter into the selection process.

Masonic Lodges have a long history of supporting education which began in the earliest days of the Republic of Texas.

### Clarendon's depot takes a trek across town to new home

After many months of planning, the historic Fort Worth & Denver depot was moved last Wednesday to its new home at the Saints' Roost Museum.

The depot, which was one of the earliest buildings in New Clarendon and was a center of activity in the town for generations, will be restored and be used to house exhibits for the museum.

The restoration is being made possible by a grant from the Bairfield Foundation and the work and donations of many volunteers.

1. For over a century, the depot has been located on Kearney St. on the south side of the railroad. In this top picture you can see workers making preparations to move the building. Bricks and shingles had been removed several months ago.

2. Long steel beams were run under the structure and then jacked up so wheels could be attached.

3. At 8:30 a.m. on May 22, 1996, the depot took off on its day long trek across town, heading south down Kearney St.

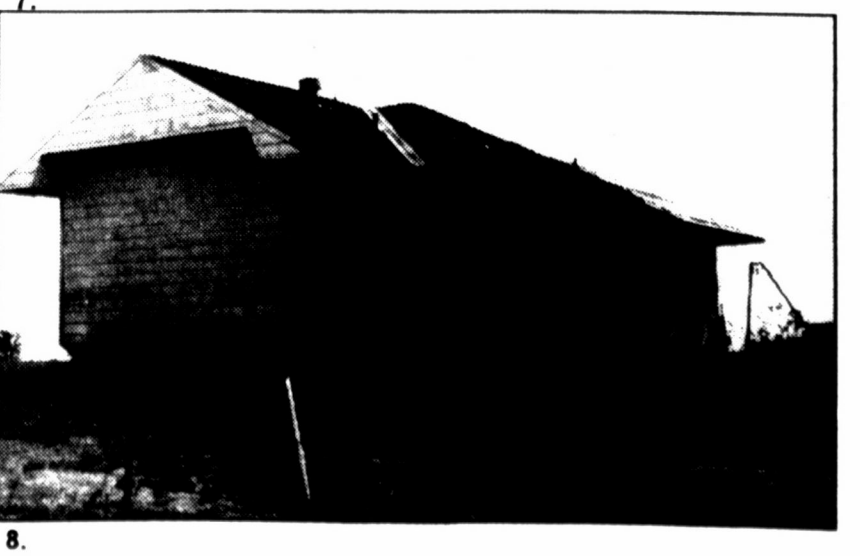
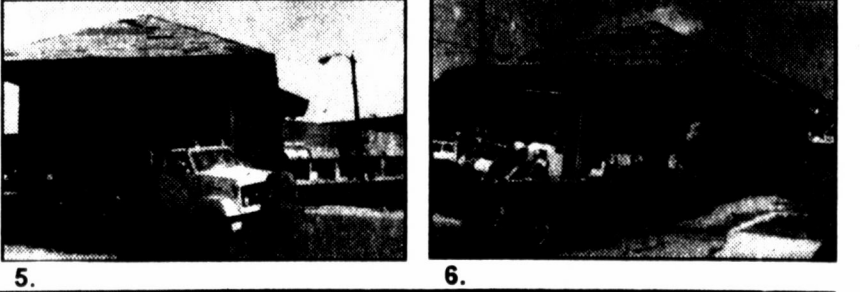
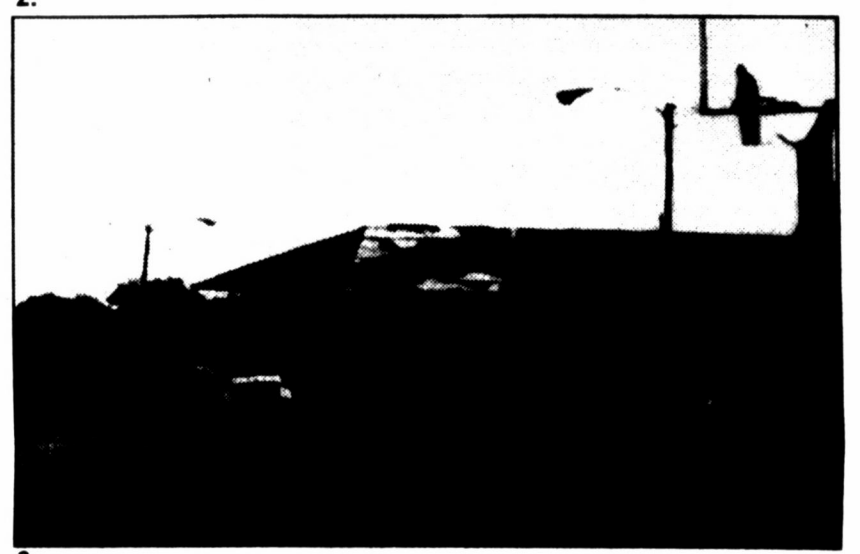
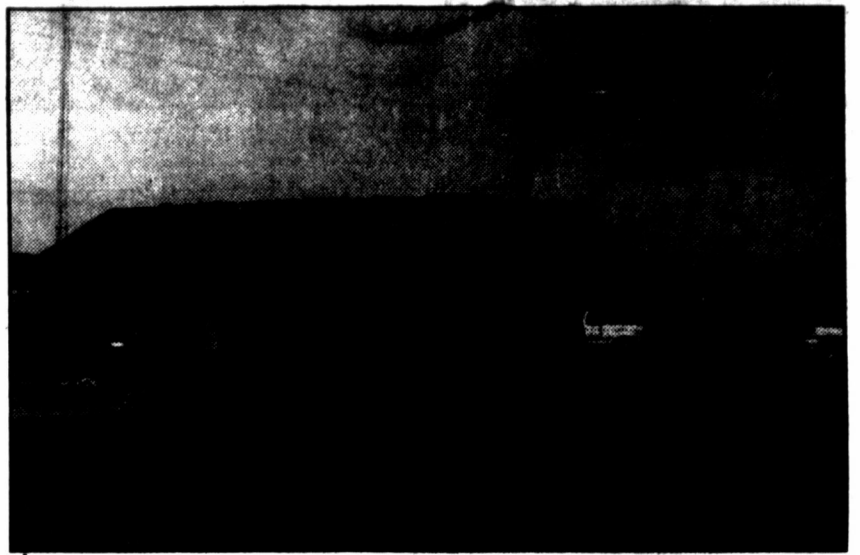
4. Progress stopped briefly at the intersection of Second St. and Kearney when the depot roof hung on the traffic light cables. Traffic on Hwy. 287 was halted for about 30 minutes.

5. The depot turned east on Fourth St. by the Post Office.

6. The moment of truth came as the depot crossed the drainage area at the intersection of Fourth and Gorst. The support frame made it across but scraped the brick pavement.

7. By 1 p.m., the depot had climbed the hill and was approaching the intersection of Fourth and Hawley. The tree seen in this photo bravely sacrificed a branch or two when the depot ran into it.

8. The depot turned back south on Foker to make the last leg of its journey to the museum grounds, arriving there at approximately 3 p.m.



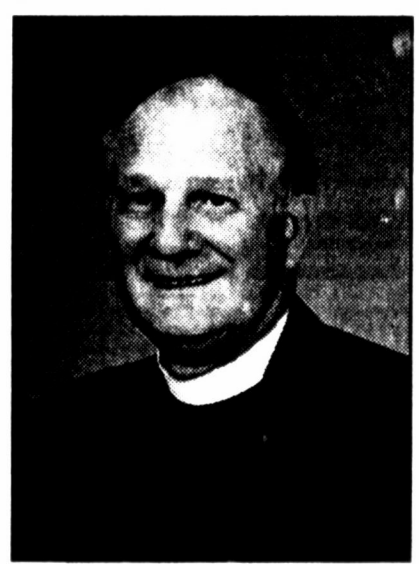
## New minister set to arrive in Clarendon

Reverend James E. Bell and his wife, Mary Lynn, will be moving to Clarendon in June to become the pastor of the First United Methodist Church.

Rev. Bell was born in Hale Center, Texas, in 1933 and attended McMurry College and Perkins School of Theology, SMU. He was ordained into the Methodist Ministry in Lubbock in 1956. After serving churches in Blackwell and Morgan Mill, Texas, he and his wife, Mary Lynn, were commissioned as missionaries by the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church and were assigned to the Methodist Blackwell Mission, Browning, Montana, in 1959, where they served for ten years.

From 1969 to 1983, the Bells were volunteer staff members with the Ecumenical Institute, a global organization concerned with the human factor rural development. This assignment beyond the local church led to service on the Sioux Indian Reservation, Cannon Ball, North Dakota, the Republic of South Korea, Jeju Island, and Chung Chong. Other years of service followed in North East Asia, including Taiwan, Republic of China, the Philippines, and Hong Kong. Dr. Bell also served a short term in Maharashtra State, India, and in Kenya, East Africa.

After returning to the United States in 1983, Rev. Bell served five years as Associate Pastor of First United Methodist, Midland, Texas. During his time in Midland he completed his doctoral studies toward a Doctor of Ministry degree at the Graduate Theological Foundation of Notre Dame. He received his degree in May 1988 with special emphasis on "Spiritual Development in the Local Congregation."

Since leaving Midland in 1988, Dr. Bell has served as pastor of First United Methodist Church in Post and The First United Methodist Church in Muleshoe. He and his wife, Mary Lynn, have three grown sons and eight grandchildren. His special interests are music, antique cars, theater, and Ukrainian egg decorating.

The second home to be previewed is the home of Virginia and Nelson Christie at 516 South Parks Street in Clarendon.

Johnny and Jeff Martin came to Donley County in 1887 and rode for the JA Ranch. When the Adair-Goodnight split occurred, Johnny went to work for Charles Goodnight and later become his partner. Johnny married Goodnight's niece, Viola McLaren, in 1895. In 1919, Johnny built the family home at 516 S. Parks in Clarendon. The architectural style of the house was certainly different from others in Clarendon. The style may have been based on those observed while the family lived in California from 1907-1914. According to reports, the house has always been white with red brick trim. The house and the original garage are built of clay tile as is the old "Ford Garage"

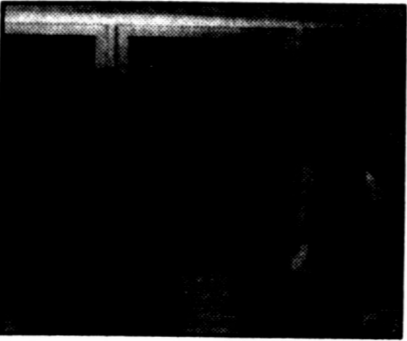

# Off Campus

"When 'Thanks' Seems Little Enough"

I guess just about everyone has a void or two in their life - something they would like to have done differently or done, period.

Each Memorial Day I'm reminded of one of the biggest voids in my life - not serving my country in the military. I was a freshman in college in 1972, the year the last "draft" was conducted. My number came up 287; so, I never got a call from Uncle Sam.

In my case, however, it really wouldn't have mattered. A childhood accident that permanently impaired my vision, and a football injury that damaged vertebrae in my back saw to that. I would have never passed the physical on my best day.

My undergraduate days loomed as a controversial era in American history. A lot of young men my age crossed the border into Canada or applied for college deferments or sought slots in the National Guard in an effort to dodge the Vietnam conflict.

Such just wasn't part of my thought process, however. You see, I was raised to believe that serving one's country was an honor and a duty, and to this day the knowledge that I never served in the military leaves me with a kind of hollow feeling.

The closest I ever came to the Army was a rather inept stint in ROTC in college. I learned how to march in a straight line, operate a compass, and shine shoes and belt buckles. Bill "Stripes" Murray was a better soldier, I'm sure.

That hollow feeling is undoubtedly a product of my family's tradition. My grandfather served in the U.S. Army in World War I and was wounded in action. My father manned a post on a destroyer in World War II in the Pacific. One day a Japanese Zero on a suicide mission swept across the deck of his ship and killed 75 brave men. My Dad, by the grace of God, was not one of them, as he was below deck at the time. My uncles also fought in WWII.

Two of my brothers-in-law fought in Vietnam. One was shot off a bridge by Charlie and topped some 50 feet into a murky riverbed. The Good Lord spared him, too.

That any young man or woman dies unnecessarily is a tragedy, whether it's in an Asian rice paddy or in a drive-by shooting on a ghetto street corner. Without question, the validity of the manner in which the Vietnam conflict was approached by our country's leadership remains debatable, but whether one should have answered the call was never an issue in our household. My Dad believed that when your country called, you didn't stop to analyze the issue, you just responded.

In my heart, I believe I would have answered that call, but that's easy for me to say because I knew I would never be permitted to serve. So, the best I can do at this important time when we honor our veterans is to say, "Thanks. Thanks for preserving the freedom I now enjoy. Thanks for your willingness to make the supreme

sacrifice, if that's what it took. Thanks for putting it on the line."

Of course, it doesn't have to be Memorial Day to get that humbling feeling. Just go down to the courthouse and look upon the wall that honors Donley County veterans. It's especially humbling to observe how many names are designated with a star, meaning they gave their lives for us.

Last weekend my family and I trekked to Dallas to watch my nephew graduate from high school. The ceremony was held in the "Pit," North Texas State University's mammoth basketball coliseum. There must have been 7,000 people in the stand to honor the 600 graduates.

As you might well imagine, there was much diversity represented in that class and crowd of well-wishers. And I thought that was great. Diversity is something I believe should be celebrated in our country. Moreover, I believe an important component of anyone's educational experience is learning how to interface in a positive fashion with people from different cultures and walks of life.

Having said that, I must admit to some discouragement and even anger during the commencement ceremony. During the Pledge of Allegiance, I could not help noticing that there were many people of foreign heritage who either did not know the words to the Pledge or refused to recite them. The same thing happened during the playing of the National Anthem.

Perhaps even more disappointing was to observe the numbers of youthful native born citizens who didn't bother to remove their ballcaps during the Pledge or the National Anthem.

At first I was mad, then I gazed down at my father, standing there with his hand over his heart, his bald head shining. Then I kind of got sad. I thought to myself, "There's my Dad who fought for his country so that all these fine people could be standing here in this air-conditioned comfort, enjoying freedoms of which other people in the world wouldn't dare dream - including a publicly-funded education."

My thoughts continued with, "Dad gummit, at least give my Dad and all the other men and women like him the respect of learning the doggone Pledge and National Anthem. And at least take off your darned caps. At least we could all do that much to say thanks."

Alas, the America in which we live today is a somewhat different country than it was when my Dad and many, many others served in the military. We're even more free now than then. We can burn flags, don swastikas, and keep our hats on when the Star Spangled Banner is played.

Things change. That's inevitable. It's just that sometimes not everything changes for the better.

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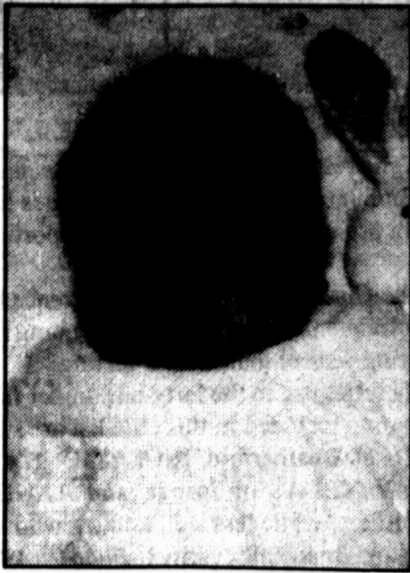

### Three-Pepper Beef Kabobs

- 1 pound boneless beef sirloin steak, cut 1 inch thick
- 2 tbs. vegetable oil
- 1 tbs. each - fresh lemon juice and water
- 2 tsp. Dijon-style mustard
- 1 tsp. honey
- ½ tsp. pepper and dried oregano leaves
- 1 medium green, red, and/or yellow bell pepper, cut in 1 inch pieces
- 8 large mushrooms

Whisk together oil, lemon juice, water, mustard, honey, oregano, and pepper in large bowl. Add beef, bell peppers, and mushrooms on each of the four 12 inch skewers. Place on grill over medium coals and grill 8 to 11 minutes.

## Girls Scouts to distribute 911 information cards

Clarendon Girl Scouts will be distributing 911 information cards to Donley County residents on Saturday, June 1, from 9 to 11:30 a.m. These cards should be filled out and returned so that the information can be entered into the computer for the 911 system.

This information could be important in the event of an emergency. Unless you have a card on file at the Sheriff's Office, when you call 911 they will have no information about where you live, how many people live in your home, or if there are special medical problems they might have to deal with in an emergency. Seconds and minutes count, and it would save time for the EMS or the fire department if that information was available.

The Girl Scouts will be distributing cards in Clarendon, Howardwick, and Hedley. They will also have tables set up at B&R Thriftway and The Grocery Store. You may also get a card at the Sheriff's Office. The cards may be mailed in or returned to the Sheriff's Office.

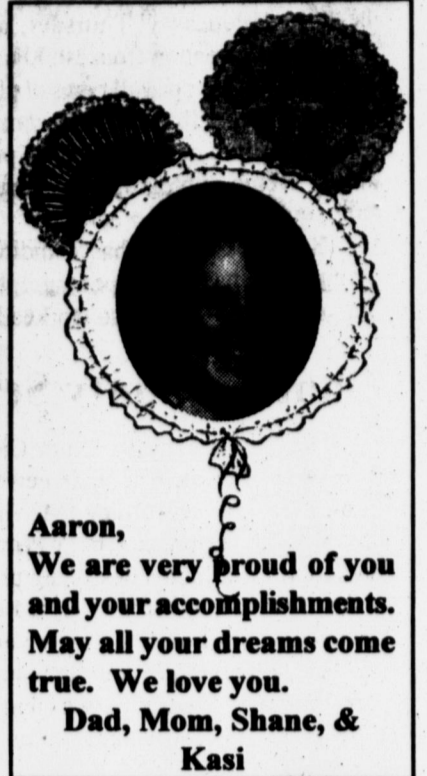
## Hedley High School Junior and Senior Prom

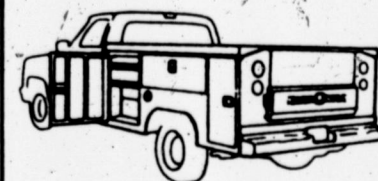
