

## HOW LONG IS TEMPORARY

"Motorists Pay More Than Their Share of Highway Costs." That's the title of an editorial in the February 21 issue of The Saturday Evening Post. And it deals, in large part, with the "temporary" federal taxes that have been progressively applied to gasoline.

The first "temporary" federal gas tax, the Post observes, was imposed in 1932, and made permanent in 1941. Then, in 1951, a "temporary" increase of the tax to the two-cent-a-gallon level was imposed, to help finance the Korean War. It was never abandoned-instead, the rate was raised to three cents in 1956, because of the super-highway program. Now the rate is four cents --of which one cent was added in 1959 on the same old "temporary" basis. And there is a plan to add another half-cent to the load.

The Post makes the basic point—that it is manifestly unfair to charge highway users alone with all the hosts of highways. The U.S. Bureau of Public Roads is authority for the statement that "there are real and extensive beneficiary groups, other than highway users as such, that reap the advantages of highway improvement." The Defense Department is one of those-almost a billion dollars has been added to the cost of the superhighway program to raise bridge clearances to meet this Department's standards.

The Post urges that Congress "stick by its 1959 promise and let the Federal gas tax go back to three cents." But that won't happen unless Congress is made to realize that public sentiment is solidly behind it.

The "munificent benefits" included in the ever-expanding programs financed by public treasuries are thus exacting a high toll.
