Why reduce the saturated fat in the diet

Sese days about mating news changes to reduce the risks of various diseases. Several years now the reports on lowering saturated fat or fatty acids have proclaimed a connection with reduction in the incidence and costs of coronary heart disease in the United States. Coronary heart disease leads the mortality list, accounting for one third of the deaths annually. An conomic burden wiu related medical care 56 billion in 1994 was reported in the Heart and Stroke Facts 1994 Statistical Supplement, American Heart Association, Dallas.

The past 40 inks dietary saturated fat and chole erol intakes to the development coronary heart disease. Numerous health organizations - the American Heart Association, the American Ditetic Association, the American Dia eart Lung and Blood Institute have Heart, Lung and Blood Instiute hav a diet lower in cholesterol and lower in fat - especially saturated fat. The total fat intake should be 30 percent or less of the total caloric intake with saturated fat less than 10 percent of the fat consumed. Are Americans making any
progress towards these goals? The recently released data from the Na tional Health and Nutrition Exam nation Survey (NHANES III)
trate that some progress has been made. In the NH
been made. In the NHANES I study (1988 to 1991), the total dietary
fat level was at 34 percent and the saturated fat acid level was at 12 per cent compared to 37 percent and 16 percent, tespectively in 1976 to 1980 (NHANES I). If these trends toward less dietary fat and saturated fat con tinue, then important health benefis may arise.

persons between ages 35 to 69 year with total cholesterol levels of 200 milligrams per deciliter or above with no reported incidence of coronary heart disease.

An estimated three million first ime coronary events (heart attacks of strokes) occur over a 10 -year period
among persons with cholesterol levels $200 \mathrm{mg} / \mathrm{dL}$ or above.
The findings revealed that by re ducing saturated fat intake from 10 percent by 1 to 3 percentage points, coronary heart disease incidence could be reduced by 32,000 to 99,700 events. This reduction yields combined savings in medical expenditures and lost earnings ranging from $\$ 4.1$ $\$ 12.7$ billion over a
year period
