The current terms of three board members (two from district one and one state-at-large) will expire at this time. All peanut farmers are eligible to vote in the district in which he resides. All peanut farmers within the state can vote for the state-at-large position.

District one includes the following counties: Coryell, Hamilton, Comanche, Brown, Mills, San Saba, McCulloch, Llano, Lampasas, Mason, Gillespie, and Runnels.

State-at-large includes all the peanut producing counties in the State of Texas.

A peanut farmer who qualifies to vote in the election may place his/her name in nomination for membership on the Texas Peanut Producers Board for a six-year term from the district in which he farms. The application must be signed by the nominee and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the election. The applica-



### The Lone Star Hustle: It's A Real Gas

Sit back and enjoy this tale of one man's battle with great utility corporation.

Last October, Mr. Rogers purchased a great little firm known as The Clarendon Beacon from Mr. Roberts. All went according to plan, and the deal was a

In January, Mr. Rogers received his natural gas bill

for the month of December: He happened to notice that Mr. Roberts' name was still listed in the billing address. So being the good natured sort of guy that he is, Mr. Rogers dropped a note to the gas company explaining the change of ownership of the Beacon into the envelope along with his pay-

On a Monday morning in February, Mr. Rogers got his gas bill for the onth of January. He noticed that Mr. Roberts' name was on the bill and hat it was 'for service from Dec. 18 to Jan. 5.' Mr. Rogers sighed and paid the \$60 bill.

Two days later on Wednesday Mr. Rogers was shocked to receive another bill from the gas company. This one was addressed to him and called for a \$130 deposit from Mr. Rogers.

Thursday, Mr. Rogers got still another bill from the gas company also addressed to him. This one said it was for service 'from Jan. 5 to Jan 24. This bill included a 'service charge' of nearly \$30 and totaled about \$80.

Mr. Rogers had had enough. He called the gas company and kindly asked for an explanation.

"Well, you're a new business," replied the gas lady, "and we require a deposit on all new accounts."

"But I'm not a new business," insisted Mr. Rogers. "This business has been at this location for well over a decade."

"Yes, but you are a new owner, and we must have something that will guarantee you will pay your bills," the gas lady said.

Mr. Rogers noted that he had been paying the gas bill since October and wondered aloud if there had been some problem with those payments

The gas lady seemed confused and said, "Well, no." "Then why are we doing this?" Mr. Rogers asked.

"It's our policy," was the reply.

"Why is it your policy, and it's not the policy of the electric company,

and it's not the policy of the telephone company, and it's not the policy of water and sewer utilities?" Mr. Rogers queried.

"I den't know," the gas lady said.

Mr. Rogers told the lady, who was by this time beginning to irritate him, that he already had a residential account with the gas company from last June. Couldn't they use the deposit from that account to cover some of these charges?

"Well, no," came the reply.

"What's going to happen to the deposit made by Mr. Roberts, the previous owner?" Mr. Rogers asked.

"He probably didn't have a deposit," was the quick answer. "What!?"

"My records show that his account started in the late 1980s, and we didn't always require a deposit then," the gas lady explained.

"@%&\*!" Mr. Rogers thought.

"How convenient," Mr. Rogers said.

"Do you people realize that you're fixing to hit me for nearly \$300 in the space of about four days? Do you realize that's more than I had to pay for all the gas bills last quarter?"

"I'm sorry, but that's our policy," the gas lady stated.

Mr. Rogers was fed up by this point. "And what if I decide to turn off the gas?" he asked.

"Then you would get your deposit back," she said.

"Then you can expect a call from me to that effect within a month," Mr. Rogers said and hung up.







Several years now the reports on lowering saturated fat or fatty acids have proclaimed a connection with reduction in the incidence and costs of coronary heart disease in the milligrams per deciliter or above with United States. The past 40 years of evidence percent by 1 to 3 percentage points, links dietary saturated fat and cholesterol intakes to the development of coronary heart disease. Numerous health organizations — the American Heart Association, the American Dietetic Association, the American Diabetes Association, and the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute have recommended that Americans follow a diet lower in cholesterol and lower in fat - especially saturated fat. The total fat intake should be 30 percent or less of the total caloric intake with saturated fat less than 10 percent of the fat consumed.

Are Americans making any progress towards these goals? The recently released data from the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES III) illustrate that some progress has

been made. In the NHANES II study (1988 to 1991), the total dietary fat level was at 34 percent and the saturated fat acid level was at 12 perpercent, respectively in 1976 to 1980 (NHANES I). If these trends toward less dietary fat and saturated fat continue, then important health benefits may arise.







Right Now is the prime time to catch big walleye at Lake Meredith. A great place to ambush a school of walleye is located 200 yards either side of the ramp at the Marina. When the sun sets, schools of walleye leave their deep-water lairs and prowl the shoreline searching for the good spawning grounds. I assume that the more remote areas of the lake are also visited by wandering schools of walleye, but I prefer the Marina area because the bright president Amy Thornberry. The in- lights attract huge schools of shad while affording anglers some measure of illumination.

> Best baits for catching walleye from this shoreline area are a three-inch, white or chartreuse grub, #5 Countdown Rapala, Ratlin Rap, and 1/2 oz. Rat-L-Trap.

> Waiting for the fish to appear is an exercise in perseverance. Several hours of nothing can suddenly explode into fifteen minutes of fast and furious action. Veterans of these nighttime walleye wars always wear plenty of warm clothing and usually carry a thermos of hot coffee. Don't forget a landing net, because lipping a toothy walleye in the dark can be a painful experience
