Bobby Lesley, who measures out at 6' 2" and weighing 165 pounds playing in the Howard County Tournament as one of the "little boys" was selected on the All-Tournament by the 14 coaches who had teams entered. A sizable percentage of the players on the teams which the Bulldogs played against ranged from 6' 4" to Tyler's huge center who measured 6' 8" and sealed out at 250 pounds.

CJC Bulldogs Earn 4th Place Trophy in Tourney

Clarendon Jr. College Bulldogs, in a dazzling display of offensive play earned the fourth place trophy at the Howard County Junior College holiday invitational tournament during last week end.

The Bulldogs played four games during the tournament, two of which were played with the first and second seeded teams in the tournament and one with the first ranked junior college team in the nation, (Tyler) set averaged 80 points per game for the 4 games. The second game of the tournament was played against Frank Phillips of Ector in which the Bulldogs scored 65 points; which was the most points scored by any team in any one of the 24 games played at the tournament.

The fine play of the Bulldogs was even more credible due to the fact that the only height possessed by the club is Wayne Riddle of Sunray at 6-feet-4 and he was unable to make the trip due to a severe attack of tonsillitis.

Three of the sophomores led the offensive attack for the Bulldogs, Bobby Lesley, averaging 18 1/2 points per game for four games against the toughest competition in the nation, John Alexander with 17 points per game and Oscar Bronniman with 14 each outing. Leading the defensive efforts were the two other sophomores, Jimmy Humphreys leading the squads in rebounds while gathering 8 points per game and John Tom Morrow who also did a masterful job on defense while adding 5 points per game to the cause.

Leading offensive player of the Freshman group was Ray Deborch of Sauray who dropped 20 points through the basket against Frank Phillips and hit 16 of 34 attempts from the field during the 4 games for a nifty 47 per cent accuracy. Ray's accuracy from the field was only exceeded by Bobby Lesley's 27 of 35 for a 49 per cent accuracy.

Outstanding defensive play and substitute support was turned in by Buddy Jones, Billy Higgins and Kenneth Martin. They gave a marvelous account of their abilities while filling the shoes of some very tired sophomores. Two of the games at the tournament was played only three hours and a half apart.

The High School Basketball teams won a pair of games from Quail Friday night, January 30. The local girls allowed the visitors to come within 6 points of the 10 point lead held by the Bronchoettes entering the last quarter. The scoring in the Quail game was divided between Marie Richey and Paula Adams. Paula drilled in 30 points while Marie pumped up 28. Sharon Williams helped with 7 points and Brenda McAnear came through with 4. Brenda played some in a guard position to help Sandra Webb, Janie Ivey, Connie Martin, Jackie McClellan and Deanna McAnear hold the Quail girls to 58 points while keeping the ball in the forwards' hands enough to rack up 69 points, the highest score attained by the Bronchoettes thus far this season.

The boys' game looked as if it would be a close one with Quail leading the Broncs at the end of the first quarter by a score of 16-15. The Broncs came back to lead at half-time 34-28 and increased this lead to 51-31 to allow the second teams an opportunity to play the last quarter. The second team increased the lead slightly to finish the game by a score of 57-34.

Quail's boys got 22 points from the Broncs, 12 of which were from the free throw line. Howard Talley was high scorer for the Broncs with 17, followed by James Allen and Jerry Elmore with 9 points each, and Dwight McAnear with 8 points. McAnear shot once in each quarter for 100 per cent from the field.

Billy Spier, a 6' 3" junior, has been looking better as the first conference game nears. This was the fourth win for both the boys and girls this young in the season.

In their games with Groom Tuesday night, the girls won their game 51-40 and the boys won 51-41, only one point difference in the two games. In the girls game Paula Adams scored 32 points and in the boys game, Howard Talley was high with 19 points. James Allen who had been out with a sprained ankle, played the last 3 minutes of the game and dropped in 6 points.

County Banks Hit All Time High With Deposits Over 8 Million

According to financial statements of the two banks here and one at Hedley, published in this issue of your Donley County Leader, deposits hit an all-time high over eight million dollars on deposit. This is the first time in the history of the county banks to exceed the 8 million mark.

In 1958, banks in the county reached their previous highest total with \$7,822,500.27 and the total on deposit as of Dec. 31, 1960 was \$8,009,172.92. This shows an increase in deposits over 1959 of \$227,800.17.

The loan figure for all three banks shows an increase for the same period of time with a total of \$3,794,274.67 at the close of business December 31, 1960. This is an increase of \$383,247.49 over the 1959 total of \$3,410,527.18.

Donley County residents are fortunate in having three progressive banks in our community that are offering comparative services with banks in larger cities.

Mr. Carman was presented by the Rev. Dan Gerrard, vicar of St. James Episcopal Church of Dalhart. The ministers father served as ordaining bishop for his son's elevation to the priesthood.

This followed six months service as deacon in the Shamrock and Clarendon churches. As a priest the minister will now celebrate all of the Holy Sacraments of the Episcopal church.

Mr. Carman and his wife moving to Clarendon in July following his graduation from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley, California. They live here with their young son.

A luncheon and reception given by Women of St. John Baptist Episcopal Church followed the service at 1 p.m. in the Presbyterian Church.

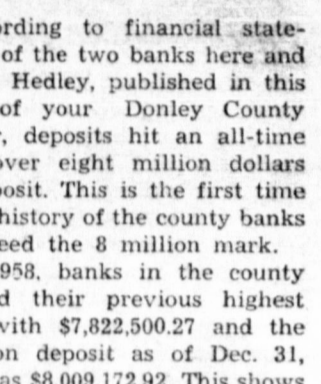

PLOWIN' Out the CORNERS
Safety on our highways is something we all believe in. Many of us could write at length as to the best way to improve our record. Then, just about every last one of us will break some of the safety rules in most any given week. Part of the time will be accidental, other times will be because we do not know the rules, but far too often we just run the risk. Especially is this last part true regarding speed.

About this time each year we receive a package of information from the Governor's Highway Safety Commission that makes one stop and think. We find that our record for 1960 in the first nine months is some better than last year. If we could hold the line through the holidays we would come out better in loss of lives, 9 per cent better in over-all traffic crashes, and with an economic saving of 7 per cent. This in the face of 4 per cent more driving.

Our congratulations to Gov. Daniel, Col. Homer Garrison, and Director Brad Smith for the efforts being put forth by them to help us help ourselves with this problem. Here are a few of the slogans that have helped:

"Driving is a lot like baseball, it's only the number of times you get home safely that counts."
"You may outrun, outmaneuver, outdistance, outbluff, and outbrag the other drivers, but more important, will you outlive them?"
"He who has one for the road gets a trower for a chaser."
This one seemed worth adding on our own; if at each crossing we look both right and left — the chances are we will be.
If you pass Johnny on a hill, likely as not you'll pass him still.

Debts to some of us, who weathered the financial slump of the 30's, remains a frightening thing. Time may have dimmed the reality, but the memory lingers on. Thinking along the subject of debts both personal and national we decided to get together some information. From several reliable sources we tried to cull out a few vital figures that to us reveals a dangerous trend.

In 1900 the National Debt was \$1,263,000.00. By 1930 it had risen to \$16,185,000.00. As of December 1st 1960 it had reached the staggering sum of \$290,406,000. There is no sign of a slower trend of increase.

The 1916 individuals owed debts totalling 36 billion. By 1930 this figure had climbed to 71 billion. At the close of 1950, the last date that totals are available it had jumped to almost 266 billion. Corporation debts were 40 billion in 1916 and by 1950 had climbed to nearly 336 billion

about one year ago. Many experts say that to add the pledged obligations of the government to the present debt would make it as much or even higher than the debts of both individuals and corporations.

The value of all property in the United States including the government's foreign investments has also increased but just how much is increased wealth and the part that is merely inflation is debatable. In 1900 all property totalled almost \$3 billion. In 1930 this figure had reached 410 billion. By the end of 1958 the total had climbed to 1.692 billion. We were borrowing 1.4 per cent on total property in 1900, as a government. Today our government is borrowing almost 20 per cent on all property.

Individuals and corporations mortgaged for 40 per cent. Adding the totals together we are soaked for 60 per cent of our worth.

AUSTIN — Beginning of an odd-numbered year brings a "changing of the guard" at the state-house.

Actual number of turnovers this year will be few, with Gov. Price Daniel, Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey and Atty. Gen. Will Wilson continuing in their present offices.

No. 1 change will be in the Supreme Court. Chief Justice John E. Hickman, 76, is retiring after a 50-year legal career, including 34 years of appellate court service.

Judge Hickman will be succeeded by Robert W. Calvert, now an associate justice of the Supreme Court.

Succeeding Calvert will be Zollic Steakley, who has served as Secretary of State since 1957. He was sworn in on January 3, in the Supreme Court Room of the State Courts Building in Austin. A reception and informal Open House will be held in the State Bar Building. The public is invited for both occasions.

Court of Criminal Appeals has a new judge, also. W. T. McDonald of Bryan will succeed Judge Lloyd Davidson, defeated at the polls last summer. McDonald will be sworn in January 2 in Bryan, in the district courtroom where he has presided as judge for the past five years. His brother, Reed McDonald, a notary public, will administer the oath.

Already sworn in and ready to go when his term as land commissioner began on January 1 is Jerry Sadler. Mrs. Dorothy Hallman, chief clerk of the House of Representatives in which Sadler served three terms, gave the oath. Sadler was sworn in nearly two weeks ahead of time in order to

be "ready." He defeated the incumbent, Bill Allcorn.

HOME WORK — While they're still home, members of the next Legislature can take their minds off Christmas bills by studying Governor Daniel's proposed budget for state government.

It calls for spending \$376,000,000 from the general revenue fund for the 1962-63 biennium. This is \$54,000,000 more than was appropriated for the present two-year period, but is 49 percent less than the agencies requested. It does not include any funds for public-school-teacher pay raises, a recommendation which the governor said he will present after the legislature convenes.

Governor Daniel will propose a \$600 a year increase per teacher, adding approximately \$94,000,000 other state's two-year costs. This \$94,000,000 plus the \$54,000,000 increase above, plus the \$76,000,000 general revenue fund deficit, adds up to a \$224,000,000 problem which the new legislature will face.

MAVERICK TO RUN — Latest to announce for the U.S. Senate seat to be vacated by Sen. Lyndon Johnson is Maury Maverick of San Antonio, former member of the Texas House of Representatives.

The former legislator from San Antonio is a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee and son of the late Congressman and Mrs. Maury Maverick of the Alamo City.

His great grandfather was Samuel Maverick, also of San Antonio, one of the signers of the Texas Declaration of Independence.

Other announced candidates for the Senate seat are: Rep. Jim Wright of Fort Worth; Former Senator William A. Blakley of Dallas; State Senator Henry Gonzalez of San Antonio and John G. Tower of Wichita Falls.

State Board of Water Engineers approved plans to build a \$21,690,000 reservoir on the Colorado River between La Grange and Columbus.

Farmers, ranchers and businessmen from the affected area had vigorously protested the flooding of what they described as a prosperous agricultural area. They estimated it would destroy an annual agricultural income of about \$1,500,000.

Proposed reservoir would be 22 miles long, with 160,000 acre feet of initial water storage space and 75,000 acre feet of reserve. Lower Colorado River Authority estimates it will save for use some 100,000 acre feet of water that now flows into the Gulf.

U.S. Bureau of Reclamation is planning the project which is to be operated by LCRA after construction.

YOUTH PROGRAM GOALS — Texas Youth Council will urge the next Legislature to enact a six-point program to cut down on the number of Texas youngsters who "turn out bad."

Goals are: 1. Adequate funds to operate the state training schools and orphan homes; 2. A juvenile parole system to provide supervision for youngsters released from training schools;

4. Local youth councils to work with delinquents and to help prevent development of delinquency; 5. Testing and guidance programs to spot problem children before they become delinquents; 6. More job opportunities for youngsters to keep them out of trouble.

NO HORSE-TRADING — Highway Department agents seeking to buy land for rights of way cannot "dicker" with land owners over prices.

Commissioner DeWitt C. Greer re-stated this policy in reviewing an instance in which a landowner eventually got in court nearly four times what the Department originally offered for the land.

Though dicker might have saved state money in this case, Highway officials feel that giving more than a thousand different agents authority to "barter" with state money would create many more inequities.

Commission policy is to have an appraisal made and offer the amount indicated by the appraisal. Landowners who do not feel this price is far can seek a better one in court.

SHORT SNORTS — Women seeking to attend Texas A&M College have struck out again. U.S. Supreme Court refused to review state court decisions upholding A&M's all-male status. . . Texas Employment Commission reports a creeping up of joblessness in Texas. Latest weekly figures show 80,558 claiming unemployment

benefits, an increase of 8,241 over the previous week and 23,639 more than for a year ago.

West Point, Miss., Leader: "When Social Security taxes were first levied in 1937, the maximum combined annual tax on employer and employee amounted to \$60 — or \$30 each. By 1969, the combined tax on employers and employees will be \$432 — or \$216 each. Since 1957, when more people became beneficiaries, the Trust fund has been declining because it has been paying out more than it received. The deficit in 1959 amounted to \$1.7 billion.

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GEORGE'S WIFE

There have been so many good articles in Readers Digest lately, January's issue contains one of special interest which shows

hind-sight when fore-sight was needed. It's about the "Waking Sickness-Scourge of the New Africa." It's none of the dreaded diseases one would think of, but the kind the white man seems to leave in his wake wherever he goes if he is not on a mission of mercy and love, and in some

cases even this seems to have gone too fast. We think it could be called White Sickness just as well.

Even in our own society, each new generation seems to be moving ever faster, or have we come to the age when it just seems so.

This article states, "In such an era physicians and engineers, schools and capital investment are urgently needed. It's true. But even more urgent is the need for teams of social scientists to study the swiftly changing culture patterns. Otherwise the physicians, agriculture scientists and engineers will find themselves working futilely and wondering why methods fail that proved so effective elsewhere. They say such a study is being considered, but may take ten years — to discover how best to help native people to attain the physical and mental health of their compatriots to the 20th century environment.

And we know how long ten years seems to Americans . . . just too slow. What we need to do is back up to and grasp hold of some of our basic laws, rules and documents, be still — re-learn them and live them day by day. Then when we set out to lift up our fellow man . . . we may realize more fully that patience is truly a virtue, and we need not change all other people's ways to our ways in order to lift them up. Indeed in some cases we get as much as we give,

when we learn to respect other peoples customs. This is government wise — individually, if we who profess to be christians carried out the commandment given to us "Go ye into the utter-most parts of the earth and teach, if you cannot go, send some one." Then the burden would, and does rest with each individual voluntarily to carry out his responsibility to his fellow man . . . Instead of saddling the government with something that is not its business in the first place.

SOIL SURVEYORS MAP 50 MILLION ACRES

Field soil mapping by soil surveyors of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service covered more than 50 million acres in fiscal year 1960, an increase of 2 million acres over 1959, the USDA announced today.

At near year's end 658 million acres had been mapped in sufficient detail for the soil and water conservation planning of farms and ranches and small watershed projects. This is about 34 percent of the total land area of the country and about 53 percent of the agricultural land in the nation's 2,861 locally-governed soil conservation districts.

Soil surveys are made by about 1,200 field soil scientists who examine soils field by field and record their findings on aerial photographs, which then become soil maps. USDA officials explained. Information recorded includes the kinds of soils; their properties, such as behavior, productivity and response to management; slope or gradient, losses of soil by erosion, stoniness, salt accumulation, and evidence of poor drainage; location of natural drains, rock outcrops, lakes and ponds, roads and railroads, power lines and buildings.

During the year 38 soil survey reports and maps were published and 27 additional reports were prepared and made ready for

COVER CROPPING

In the Donley County SCD cover cropping usually refers to rye. Rye is one of the best suited and best adapted cover crops for Donley County. It grows especially well on sandy and medium textured soils.

The main purpose of using rye as a cover crop is it provides the protection of cover. It provides this cover on areas subject to erosion when the major crops such as cotton and grain sorghum do not furnish adequate protection.

A good example of cover crop use is planting rye in cotton middles. This year it is presumed that there is more rye in cotton middles than ever before. Most of this rye is well established and doing well. It is furnishing more than adequate protection against erosion.

Also another good purpose for rye is that it maintains and improves the physical, chemical, and biological condition of the

soil. This adds up to more cotton yield than without rye. This increased yield alone would more than pay for the establishment of the rye.

A number of cooperators with the Donley County SCD have installed rye in their cotton. Among these are Coleman Shields, Mrs. Ora E. Bray, Richard Finch, V. T. McPherson, plus many others.

A good method of installing rye up to now has not been used much in Donley County is seeding rye with your last cultivation. This would save time and money. A small whirlwind seeder mounted on the front of a tractor would scatter the seed and the cultivation operation would cover them. This seeder is inexpensive and is run off the battery.

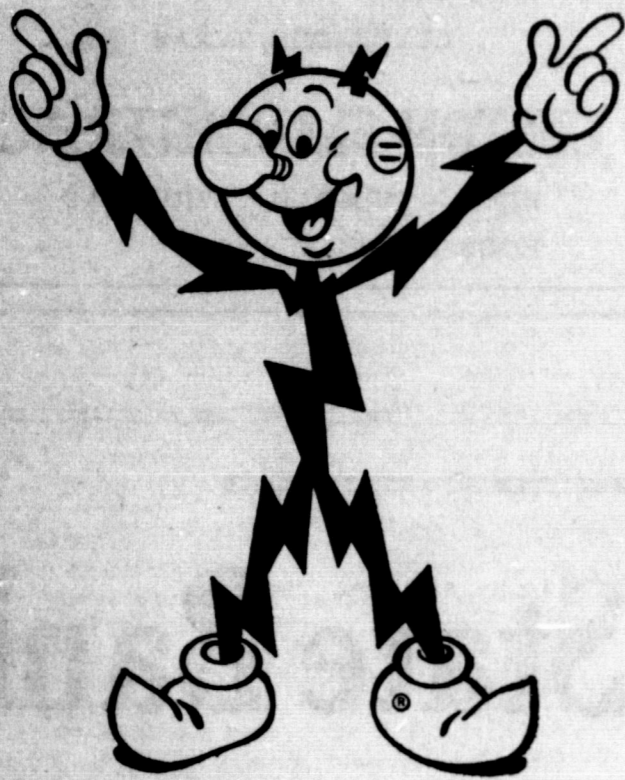

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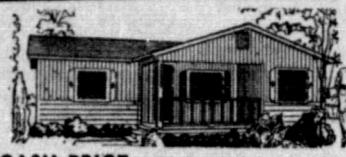

Jan. 31 Deadline For Getting Most Grain Liens
Farmers have until January 31, 1961, to cover their grains and a number of other 1960 crops under the price-support program. For wheat, compliance with the individual farm allotment is required in order to be eligible for price support on the crop. The 1960 crops for which Jan. 31 is the deadline for obtaining loans or purchase agreements include wheat, barley, oats, grain

sorghums, rye, flaxseed and soybeans. The County Committee reminded growers that good storage, which must first be approved by the County ASC Committee, is a requisite for obtaining a price-support loan on any farm-stored crop. While the farmer himself is responsible for storing a crop covered by a purchase agreement, the condition and quality of the crop will be a determining factor in the amount of the support he

receives should he decide to deliver his crop under the support program at the end of the season. For the third time since he took office, President Eisenhower signed a bill with press and newsreel cameras covering the event. 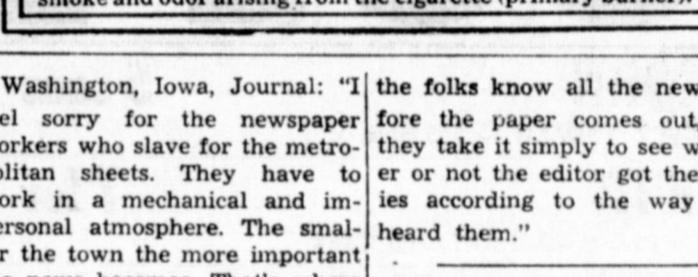
