GALVESTON'S HORROR.

On last Saturday night the worst storm in America's history broke over the City of Galveston carrying death and destruction in its wake. The Johnstown horror promises to be only a pigmy by the side of this terrible affair. Conservative estimates place the death list at 5,000 while many believe that it will reach 10,000. One third of the residence portion of the city is entirely gone and with it churches school buildings the orphans home and public buildings of every description were swept away. Boats were found 12 miles from the beach on the prairie. It was found impossible to bury the dead in trenches, so many of them were cremated in the rubbish piles while others were buried at sea. The railroad tracks and bridges are all gone and the distress of the living is taxing the strength of the relief committee as a water famine must be contended with also. The governor has applied to the U. S. Department for rations and tents and an appeal has gone forth to the people of Texas that is meeting with a hearty response. The valuation in dollars cannot be estimated and the number of dead can only be ascertained by counting the living.

The service at the Methodist church last Sunday was up to the high water mark. There was a splendid attendance at Sunday school while the house was filled at eleven o'clock to hear the sermon on "Manhood," and every one even to the dudes seemed to enjoy it.

more people attend church in Clarendon, to the population, than any town in which we have ever lived. Think of it, Clarendon has seven church buildings and five stationed preachers.

ONLY BROOKES' LIES.

A Petition Circulated and Extensively Signed Denouncing The Champions Course.

A DISGRACE TO THE TOWN.

"It is needless for us to take time and space in publicly denouncing the above paper as unreliable, but simply say as we have said before that its editor is without character among those who know him and it is of public record that his oath has been impeached in the courts here. His slanderous articles are in no part justified by facts, and the good people of the town bear the Advocate out in saying so, and proving it if necessary."—Amarillo Western Advocate.

AN EXPLANATION.

Possibly some of our friends wonder why we did not reply to the Champions' last blackmailing article on us. We were compelled to do so by grace of the law, but as Brooks failed to send us a copy of the paper we did not know what he said until a few days ago we chanced to see a copy and in the meantime we got a letter from Amarillo stating that he had been whipped like a dog and looked as though he didn't have a friend on earth and to let him alone, and so we did and we should never have paid any more attention to the matter had not a friend of ours suggested that we make a short statement of facts which are these:

"We delivered a sermon on Sunday night to a packed house in Amarillo, on the evils of the town in which we scored things, both officers, judge and jury and at the conclusion we took a rising vote of the people in which they endorsed our position and the enforcement of law and no man was louder in his praise of our position than Brooks both privately and publicly and now to try and take up something by telling a thousand lies, only shows the destitute of all principle. We did go before the grand jury and urged them to find bills against the gamblers and prostitutes but all he states about our spying, that is positively false. It was not necessary as every juryman knew that public bawdy houses were being run and had seen as well as ourselves, time and again, many of the prostitutes on the streets. Brooks himself had to pass them as he does now with his family within full view of these bawdy houses and much of our information was from him of what he had seen in passing. As to the district judge being called in and threatening to send us to jail unless we testified in his favor and any one that would believe one word of the statement was made, was shown by asking Judge Phillips, for he was the one who

judge then as now. So there is no use to notice anything Brooks says as it is a constitutional impossibility for him to tell the truth and there is only one way to deal with him and that has already been done."

THE SHOW.

The Sell's & Gray's show has come and gone, and a worse fake is seldom ever seen. The chief attraction consisted of a crowd of gamblers and nigger 'crap shooters,' a few monkeys and a muley cow. Surely it was the completest humbug that ever passed this way under the guise of a show. The county health officer and a number of our citizens thought it should be quarantined as it was coming from a town where small-pox existed, but as the saloons favored its coming, it was allowed. Quite a number of men and boys were robbed out of from \$5. to \$10 dollars by the old dodge of making change. We had no idea there was so many suckers in this country. Many got a one dollar bill back instead of a ten. The show beat everything from the county up, only paying fifteen dollars license for an opportunity to rob the town and community. We think the Legislature should try its hand once more and make a law that could not be so easily ignored; but then the people love to be humbugged and are now ready for the next "bite" that comes along.

While many of our citizens were robbed by the show, we suppose they left the larger part of it at the Showman's Saving Bank, the saloon, as there was a stream going in and out of these dens that one could scarcely pass down the street. One of the show hands come up town to buy a pair of shoes but returned as barefooted as he came into the world with two bottles of poison, such as they sell here for whisky in his pockets. No wonder the saloons wanted the show to come. We understand that three gambling tables were running all night at one of these vile dens with a door keeper to see that nothing but their sort got in. Any body is eligible for membership that won't hesitate to swear a lie when he is brought before the grand jury.

There has been considerable talk; both among our friends as well as our enemies about the recent advertisement of the show being in the Agitator and the editor has been severely criticized for the same. We wish to say to our many readers that it is positively against our principles and the policy of the paper to advertise such things, but we were away from home holding a meeting and know nothing of it until the paper was published. The advertising agent of the show gave his word of honor to the manager of the paper that it was a clean, decent affair and that it was to be just as their card to the public announced. These were the circumstances under which it appeared and we beg the pardon of our readers and promise them now that it will be a long cold day before another set of fakes and gamblers get a display card in the Agitator.

There is not any use in denying the fact that gambling dens are run in connection with two of the saloons in this town. Of course this business could be stopped if an honest effort was put forth.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOL.

In the report of State Superintendent, J. S. Kendall, which has just been issued, the apportionment for the Clarendon school amounts to \$1,558.00 with a total enrollment of 328 pupils. The pro rata this year is \$4.75, and places some four hundred dollars more to the credit of the public school here over last year. This is one of the strongest arguments that can be made in favor of the growth and advancement of our town. One of the strongest factors in this increase has been the Clarendon College. Every pupil that came here for the purpose of taking advantage of this institution were enumerated and their pro rata has gone to swell the public school fund. More of the increase can be attributed to this fact alone than to all other causes combined, and how any sensible man can oppose such an institution as Clarendon College is a mystery to us.

J. S. Stephens.

Horses Poisoned.

Forest B. Stocking and R. B. Hawkins each lost a valuable horse last Saturday night from poisoning. It seems that Charlie Moore had been poisoning prairie dogs and had left some of the corn in a covered wagon near his place. The cover became removed so that the horses got to the corn. One of them died at the wagon and the other got but a short distance away. We understand that Mr. Moore has agreed to satisfactorily adjust the matter by paying for the horses or replacing them with other animals. This should be a warning to all parties who are inclined to be careless with poison.

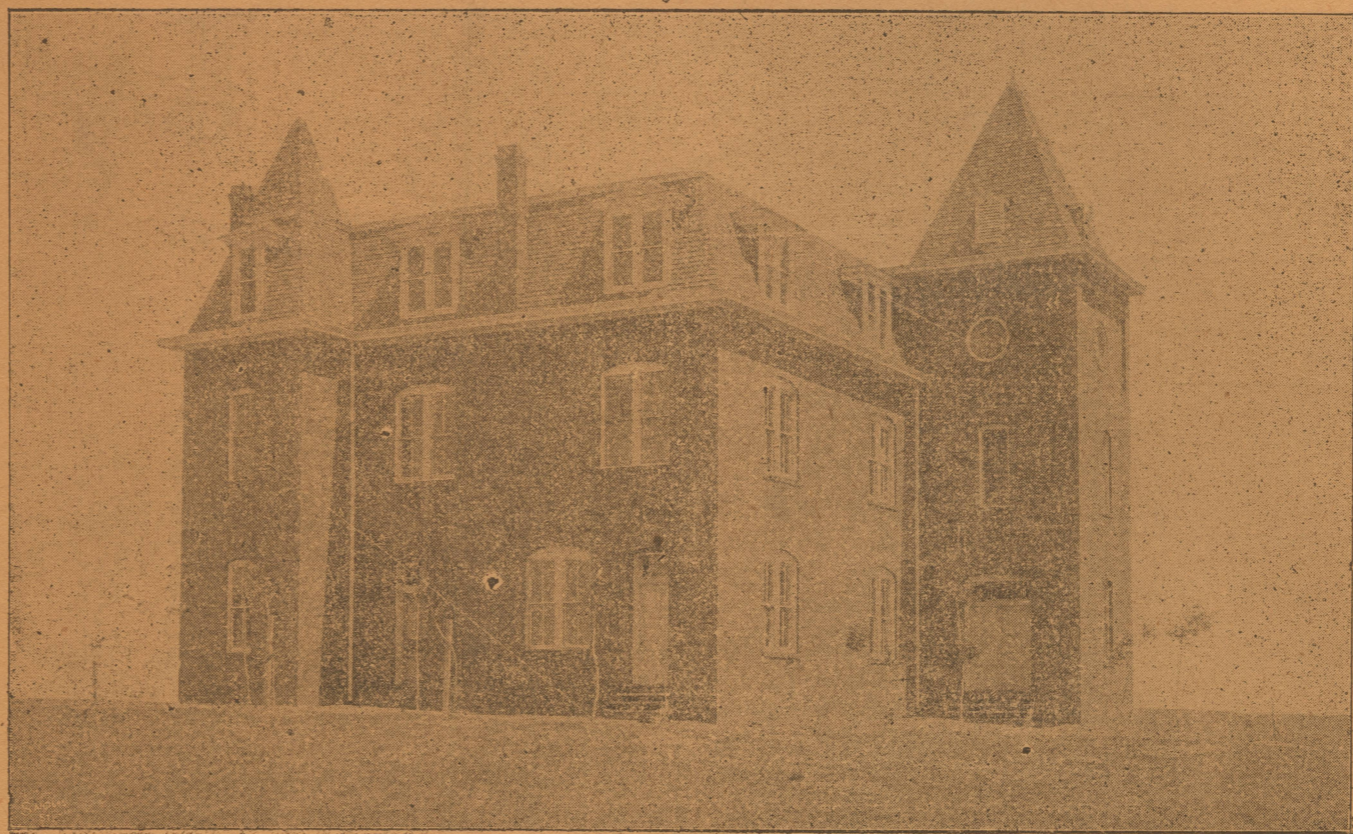
Miss S. H. Green of Philadelphia, Pa., sends the Inter-Ocean the following which may be worthy the attention of physicians, nurses and patients:

Reading of the ravages which diphtheria is making in your city I am moved to send for publication in your paper a prescription which has been published and is known to have been successful in instances where the sufferer has been given up as incurable.

Take a spoonful each of turpentine and liquid tar; put them in a tin pan or cup and set fire to the mixture, taking care to have a large pan under it as a safeguard against the spread of the flames. A dense reisonous smoke arises making the room dark. The patient immediately experiences relief, the choking and rattle stops, the patient falls into a slumber and seems to inhale the smoke with pleasure. The fibrous membrane soon become detached and the patient coughs up microbes, which when caught in a glass may be seen to dissolve in the smoke. In the course of three days the patient entirely recovers. Before using the ingredients named it is well to remove or cover up closely any article in the room that will be injured by the thick smoke.

If you will spread the knowledge of this simple remedy many lives may be saved. It is always necessary after diphtheria to avoid any exertion whatever until perfect strength has been restored. Many people do not know the danger of heart failure when the patient seems convalescent.
