

The first thing to do is to check your Christmas card list very carefully - make sure that each address particularly on name, street and number, city, zone and state. He went on to say that by a

little advance planning, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the Chirstmas rush is on. The Postmaster suggests that you stock up now on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape, for use in securely packing wrapping your Christmas gifts. Remember, also, that you can include your Christmas card on letter inside your gift package if you'll just add the appropriate First Class mail stamps to the postage for the package it

Be sure to use only First Class four cent, or seven cent Air Mail postage on your Christmas cards. All cards sent by First Class mail may include a personal handwritten message, whereas a signature only is authorized on cards that are mailed at the three cent, Third Class rate.

The Postmaster says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christ mas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to both you and your friends in keeping your mailing lists up-todate.
