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





Resourceful scoutmasters, beset with a rainy day, have discovered that a walk from the entrance, through every corridor and back by the same route, is an indoor 15-mile hike.

Honey Rice Is Delicious Dessert

Honey Rice Dessert is simply another delicious dish made of hot cooked rice. It presents unlimited possibilities for variation -will appeal to both young and old. We suggest that whipped cream be added either to the sauce, or to the rice (in which case the rice must be previously chilled) for a more dressy des-

Salted nut meats may be used for making the honey lemon sauce, or simply blanched unsalted ones and the salt added to the sauce. Make sure, however, that the nutmeats are finely chopped before combining them with the

INGREDIENTS ½ cup liquid honey

1/2 cup blanched toasted almonds chopped fine (other nuts may be used) 2 teaspoons lemon juice

1/8 teaspoon salt (if salted nutmeats are used omit this salt) 3 cups hot cooked rice PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE: Put 1 cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups cold water and 1 teaspoon salt in a two quart saucepan and cover with a tight fitting lid. Bring to a vigorous boil. Then reduce the heat as low as possible and steam for 14 minutes or until all the water rice grains with their full nutritional value. This makes very firm rice grains. (If you prefer more tender rice grains, add 1/3 cup more water and increase the slow cooking time 4 or 5 minutes). Remove the lid, permit the rice to steam dry to the desired



PLAN YOUR FERTILIZER PROGRAM AROUND SOIL TEST

College Station - An inventory of your soil now will provide a basis for planing a fertilizer program which will supply needed plant nutrients and help your crops produce nearer their

A soil test will give this inventory by determining the level of usable nutrients in the soil, says Bill Bennett, extension soil chemist who is head of Texas A&M's soil testing laboratory.

"Soil tests are somewhat like finding our your bank balance," Bennett said. "If it is low, it should be replenished. If it is well filled, you're in good shaps."

Slowly available nutrients which are not available now but will be in the future are important as well as readily usable nutrients, Bennett pointed out. Fertilizer recommendations based on soil tests take both forms into consideration.

Farmers should plan now to take inventory of their soil by getting a soil test, Bennett advised. Local county agents can




