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Broncos Ride Rough Over Boys Ranch, 24-7

The Clarendon Broncos got an evening. early wake-up call Friday night when Cal Farley's Boys Ranch scored a touchdown less than three minutes into the football contest.

It was their first and only touchdown as the Broncos went on to score 24 unanswered points leading Clarendon to a 24-7 victory and a 2-0 record heading into a big match-up Friday at 8 p.m. with undefeated Spearman at Spearman.

Spearman dominated last week's contest with Clarendon District 2AA rival Memphis, 25-7.

Broncos Head Coach Kent Allison said Spearman is a wellbalanced team that is able to adjust in unbalanced formations. "They play good defense and they're patient on offense."

"The grind out the yards and they'll try to wear out the defense."

Seventeen lettermen return for the Lynx, which beat Clarendon in a heart-breaking loss 20-14 in 1994. But Allison believes the Broncos showed a great deal of character last week coming back in a ball game in which they were down 7-0.

"We sort of had a mental lapse before the game," Allison said. "We realized we had to get after it."

Robert Taylor rushed for 153 yard on 27 carries and two touchdowns, and Quarterback Phillip Hearn chipped in the other tow TDs, rushing for 59 yards. Hearn passes for five yards and was two for six, with no interceptions on the

TJ Update Scheduled

Broncos fullback Robert Taylor responded and barrelled in from the 4-yard line at the 11:16 mark in the second quarter to bring the Broncos within one point, 7-6. The kick failed.

Hearn brought the Broncos ahead for good two minutes later with a 22 yard run. The pass failed, and Clarendon headed into the locker room with 12-7 lead.

It didn't take the Broncos long to put some insurance points on the board with another 10-yard run by Taylor with 7:32 left in the third quarter. The run failed.

The junior Hearn hit paydirt again at the 7:12 mark in the fourth quarter on a 16-yard run. The run

The defensive corps did outstanding work in the second half allowing one first down and 32 yards total offense, Allison said. He credited linebackers Evan Williams, Clint Green, and Drew Jeffers for the second half shut-out. Defensive tackles Chris Brown and Clemmie Smith held their own on the line and allowed the linebackers to do their job.

Robert Taylor and Kareem Abdulah were workhorses on offense, Allison said. Abdulah had a punt return of about 30 yards, and Smith also rushed for about 60 yards.

The offensive strategy was altered due to the absence of Lorenzo Moore, Allison said. The offense was patient and ground out the yardage instead of cashing in on the big run. Taylor, Hearn, and Smith carried the offense with great effort by the offensive line.

Kennedy Attends Judge's Seminar

Judge Ann Kennedy, Justice of the Peace for Donley County Precincts three and four, was certified at the recent 20 Hour Justice of the Peace Seminar held Sept. 10-13, 1995, in Lubbock, Texas.

The seminar was sponsored by the Texas Justice Court Training Center, headquarters at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. The seminar is one of five held for elected Justices of the Peace so they can fulfill their Continuing Judicial Education Requirements as set forth in Article 27.005 of the Texas Government Code.

The Seminar addressed topics such as Judicial Ethics, Contempt, Criminal and Civil Jurisdiction and Venue, Parks and Wildlife Laws, Trial Procedure, Alternate Sentencing, Bad Checks, Examining Trials, Regulatory Laws, Small Claims, Administrative Hearings, Civil Law, Criminal Law, Dealing with Anti-Government Groups, Traffic Laws, Alcoholic Beverage Laws, Juvenile Laws, Landlord and Tenant Law, and Inquests.

Ambulance Authority

The Associated Ambulance Authority (AAA) hopes to train at least 50 citizens of Clarendon on what to do when a person has a heart attack. The training program was greatly enhanced when the National Automobile Dealers Charitable Foundation and Chamberlain Motor Company of Clarendon presented a Resusci Anne training unit to the organization in formal ceremonies on Thursday, September 14.

In presenting the CPR unit, which is essential for cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training, Mr. Trey Chamberlain of Chamberlain Motor Company said, "If the right kind of treatment can be given a heart attack victim within seconds after he or she is stricken, the chances are good that life can be saved. CPR training teaches a person how to keep the heart beating while professional help is coming."

Mr. Vargas said that since the massive involvement of Americans training in CPR, there has been an increase in long-term survivors from ventricular fibrillation. There are many cases where the training is given to citizens showing that many heart attack victims who otherwise die have been saved and returned to normal activities. The training takes from three to five hours of intensive practice and lec-

In accepting the CPR training unit, Mr. Vargas said the organization had set a goal to train at least 50 people in the next year.

The CPR unit gives signals telling when the trainee is applying the right pressure in the right spot or breathing correctly into the victim's mouth. With the training. the students learn the "feel" of giving quick, lifesaving emergency treatment.

Ala. 1995), Settlement ("*Price* Settlement"), and is thus defined as chlordimeform or any chlordimeform-containing product, either manufactured, formulated, packaged, distributed or sold by or on behalf of Ciba-Geigy Corporation or related parties, regardless of the trade name of the product; or any metabolite of Galecron[®], in-cluding the substances known as 4-COT or 5-CAT.

The Woodward Settlement Class is defined as:

(1) All persons who fall into one of the following categories, and who reside in the United States as of the date of filing of the Class Action Complaint, who have been exposed in the United States to Fundal® only, but not to Fundal® and Galecron® or to Galecron® only ("NOR-AM Exposed Persons"):

as determined by the Court. The total attorney fee award to be requested will not exceed 20% of the benefit conferred upon the class. The benefits of the NOR-AM DCA Fund will continue as long as the NOR-AM MMT Fund continues, or until the NOR-AM DCA Fund is exhausted. If the NOR-AM DCA Fund is exhausted, NOR-AM may continue paying for compensable claims. If NOR-AM does not continue to pay for these compensable claims, Woodward Settlement Class Members will be able to opt-out of the NOR-AM DCA Fund and pursue any legal claims they may have, except for claims for medical monitoring, medical treatment, fear of illness or cancer, or increased risk of illness





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

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature may exempt from ad valorem taxation income-producing personal property and mineral interests that have a taxable value which is insufficient to recover the costs of administering the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution No. 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 68 proposes a constitutional amendment that allows the legislature to raise the current ad valorem tax exemption for disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and minor children. The tax exemptions would be raised based on a veteran's disability

Ag News

Several calls have been fielded by our office and the TVMDL in Amarillo concerning nitrate levels in the haygrazer/sorghum/millet type forages that are being harvested or grazed at this time.

The prevailing hot, dry weather conditions over the past weeks have been conducive to nitrate accumulation. The cool, overcast conditions we are now experiencing are not going to alleviate the problems.

Nitrates accumulate because of a lack of moisture, sunlight or temperature, limit the plants ability to metabolize nitrates in amino acids and protein. This problem occurs on both fertilized and unfertilized

Nitrogen fertilization will enhance the problem because of the increased quantity of nitrogen available to the plant. Plants such as pigweed, Russian thistle (tumbleweeds), johnsongrass, and others are nitrate accumulators and can be a source of toxicity. Nitrates will not disappear once a plant is cut and baled or ensiled.

Another problem that may occur with the rain and cooler temperatures that we are now experiencing is prussic acid or cyanide poisoning in the sorghum-type forages. The problem will be seen in new growth that is initiated after the improved growing conditions. The primary concern here is with grazing livestock. Prussic acid will disappear once forage is cut for hay or silage.

If problems with grazing cattle arise, be sure to determine whether the problem is from nitrates or prussic acid. Your local veterinarian should be of some assistance with isolating the cause of the problem.

Please make your producers aware of the nitrate problem. Forages can be tested by the TVMDL-Amarillo or other commercial labs. Feeding and grazing guidelines can be developed based on these tests.

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PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS

OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 7, 1995

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature by general law may authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not exceeding \$300 million to finance educational loans to students. The maximum interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation the property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas if the property is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization as defined by general law. The Comptroller's Property Tax Division has dentified the Grand Lodge of Texas, also know as the Masonic Lodges, as the primary organization which would qualify for this tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides that the farm and ranch finance program fund shall be administered by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority and not by the Veterans' Land Board, as provided by current law. In addition, the proposed amendment provides that the proceeds of \$200 million of the \$500 million in bonds authorized by the Texas Constitution for the farm and ranch finance program fund may be diverted to the agricultural fund and the rural microenterprise development fund, also authorized by the Texas Constitution, to be used for agricultural and rural economic development programs.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products."

PROPOSITION No. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 46 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition. In divorce and probate situations, a piece of property may be owned jointly by two or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the property. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the chase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resolution 46 would allow the lending institution to foreclose on the homestead property for an owelty of partition if the purchaser defaulted on the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would allow the refinance of a lien against a homestead. Finally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affiant.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinance of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 34 proposes : constitutional amendment which would increase by \$500 million the constitutional authorization of the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the state to provide housing financing to Texas veterans. The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans' Land Board, approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear

on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' hous-

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

ing assistance fund II.

House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and re-main the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

the amendment.

"The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person.'

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would reduce the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for the superconducting super collider fund from \$500 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment reducing the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million.

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 80 proposes a constitutional amendment abolishing the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties. In Mills County, the office of constable is abolished, and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff. In Reagan and Roberts counties, the office of constable is abolished and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff only if a majority of voters in each of the respective counties favors the proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts

PROPOSITION NO. 9

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia. Currently, such investments are prohibited by article XVI, section 70(r) of the Texas Constitution, which would be repealed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia.

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the constitutional office of state treasurer effective September 1, 1996. The transfer of specific constitutional powers and duties to the comptroller of public accounts takes effect on that date. The statutory powers and duties and the property and other obligations of the state treasurer are transferred to officers and agencies of state government as the legislature provides by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state treasurer."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a

constitutional amendment requiring that land devoted to wildlife management be taxed on the basis of its productive capacity. The proposed amendment also adds a temporary provision to the Texas Consti-tution validating the changes to the law made by Chapter 560, Acts of the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1991, which amended the Tax Code to allow land used for wildlife management to be appraised as agricultural land. The temporary provision also provides that a property owner is not authorized to claim a refund of taxes paid unless the tax payment was challenged before the effective date of the proposed amendment. The temporary provision expires on January 1, 1998.

PCS Receives Money For Outstanding Performance

Executive Director of Panhandle Community Services, Johnny Raymond, was informed by the Department of Housing and Community Affairs, (TDHCA), that the FTT (Families In Training) Program, would be recognized for assisting low-income persons toward the goal of self-sufficiency.


The recent event was held in Austin and the TDHCA Executive Director's Conference. These CSBG (Community Service Block Grant) top performance awards were for 1993 and 1994. Johnny Raymond and Phyllis Cook, FTT Coordinator, accepted the incentive fund awards for 1993 of \$5,328, and the top award in the state for 1994 in the amount of \$15,140. Presenting the awards was Sam Guzman, Director of Administration, TDHCA. Also in attendance was David C. Galvan, Manager, Community Services Section, TDHCA, and Donald Sykes, Director of Community Services of the US Department of Health and Human Services.

Panhandle Community Services, (PCS), Families In Training program is an educationally driven housing program offered in 26 of the Texas Panhandle Counties. Benefits consist of rental assistance, case management, and other services to low-income parents who are pursuing postsecondary education. Recognizing that education is the key to successful employment, FIT eases the burden for participants of managing the roles of parent, caretaker, wage earner, and student. The program provides financial assistance, emotional support, and information to families who are healing the scars of broken homes, poverty, and in many cases, abuse. PCS can document education, housing assistance and resource coordination provide the necessary support to help people escape welfare and become financially independent.

Once selected, participants receive individual career counseling. personal development seminars, and support from other PCS services, such as energy and transportation, emergency food, information and referral as well as important rental assistance while in their career training. Ideally, participants complete their educational goals within two years; however, if all program requirements are met, they may remain in the program until they complete their education. In return, participants must maintain grade point average and comply with other FIT case management requirements.

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WTU Reaches Settlement

Clenn Files, president and chief executive officer of West Texas Utilities Company, announced that WTU has reached a settlement in principle regarding the company's pending rate review, the pending court appeal of WTU's 1987 rate case and deferred accounting issues now before the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

Under the terms of the settlement in principle, WTU would lower its base rates by \$13.5 million a year, of which \$5.9 million has been in place on an interim basis since October 1994. WTU also would freeze its base rates for three years and make a refund of \$21 million. The \$21 million refund would include the effect of the retroactive reduction in base rates back to October 1, 1994.

The settlement would resolve both WTU's rate review as well as the deferred accounting issues. The PUCT was scheduled to consider the deferred accounting issue during its final orders meeting held recently. Testimony on WTU's rate review was scheduled to begin September 7. The specific provisions of the settlement are subject to a final written agreement being reached and the approval of the settlement rates by the PUCT. The timing of the PUCT's approval cannot be predicted, officials for WTU said.

WTU had filed testimony with the commission showing a \$14.6 million retail revenue deficiency but later revised the amount. On October 1, 1994, the company had implemented a \$5.9 million interim decrease in base rates and began settlement discussions by offering to make that reduction permanent.

The deferred accounting issue stems from a PUCT administrative law judge's recommendation to overturn an eight-year-old commission decision that the financial treatment known as deferred accounting was required in

order to maintain WTU's financial integrity.

The PUCT in 1987 had granted WTU deferred accounting by allowing it to capitalize and defer costs of financing and operating its Oklaunion Power Station from December 24, 1986, the date the unit went into service, until it was included in rates. WTU was also allowed to adjust its rates to pay for the plant in December 1987. During this regulatory lag period, WTU incurred \$32 million in expenses, taxes, and costs to operate the plant.

"We're pleased to have reached a settlement to resolve the current rate review, the court appeal of WTU's last rate case dating back to 1987 and the deferred accounting issues," Files said.

"This settlement will allow WTU to maintain its rates at a competitive level, while striking a balance among the concerns of all the parties," Files said. "It also eliminates the need for lengthy and expensive hearings."

Hearing Explains School Taxes

A public hearing on increasing taxes for Clarendon CISD drew several interested citizens on September 7. Board President, Johnny Floyd, and school superintendent, Phil Barefield, presented the proposed tax rate and explained how the rate would affect most citizens. Extra attention was drawn to the fact that those with over 65 exemptions taxes are frozen and will not increase at all.

Barefield explained that though the rate is 14.9 percent above the effective tax rate, this is an increase of \$0.0812 on the actual tax rate. The Donley County Appraisal District has calculated that on a \$25,000 home, taxes would increase \$17.86 per year.

The School Board adopted the \$1.23905 tax rate on September 12. While the rate for maintenance and operation of the school declined from \$1.1340 for the last school year to \$1.110 for the 1995-96 school year, the rate for debt service increased from \$0.02385 for last school year to \$0.12905 for the 1995-96 school year. Recent school improvements were the primary reason for the increased debt service requirements.


For those in attendance at the tax rate hearing, Barefield presented an explanation of recent school improvements, both in academics and in facilities. This list included the following information:

- Two new classrooms with accompanying rest rooms will serve Clarendon students and fulfill their space needs as reflected in the CISD 22:1 waiver request to the Texas Education Agency.
- The girls dressing room facilities have been modernized to satisfy a major need as indicated on their facility planning committee.
- Eighty-two computers were purchased, place, and networked to provide Clarendon students the opportunity to be successful in today's world. Clarendon CISD is now poised to be on the leading edge of educational technology.
- The 1980 Ford activity bus has been supplemented with a 1995 Blue Bird that should give years of excellent service.
- Discipline in the classrooms and in extracurricular activities is a major focus of this administration.

 Community support of the direction of the district has been very positive.

- The high school band program totals 60 students. Quality is good but with increased participation comes additional expense. The seventh and eighth grade band has an enrollment of 74.


