## Sales Off Slightly, but Economy May Be OK

According to State Comptroller John Sharp, Texas' economy is healthy. While retail sales largely remained flat compared to a year earlier, Sharp reported that, "Texas employment rose by 269,600 jobs to stand at 7.9 million, a 3.5 percent increase since August 1994.

Donley County's figures were disappointing, however. After slight increases for several reporting periods, the county was off both in comparison to August, 1994 and the 194 Year-to-Date figures. Donley County reported a -12.74 for the month, and -7.99 for the YTD.

This month's payments include local sales taxes collected by monthly filers on June sales and by quarterly filers for April, May and June. They were reported to the Comptroller in July.

Clarendon was down (-)11.23 for the month's sales and down (-)8.19 percent for the YTD. Hedley's numbers were - 31.75 percent and (+)5.24 percent. Howardwick's figures were - 11.90 and -11.90.

Other area counties and cities reported similar results. Armstrong chalked a minus 36.58 percent on June Sales, and minus 23.48 for the longer period. Briscoe County [Quitaque and Silverton] sagged -15.09 percent and -0.55 percent.

Carson County, with its towns of Groom, Panhandle, Skellytown and White Deer, turned in mixed results, down for the month, (-)5.52 percent, but up (+)6.45 YTD. Childress also reported mixed signals: -4.60 and +1.02, respectively.

Collingsworth County (Wellington) did not quite make it up to 1994 levels, with -4.59 and -1.35. Gray County (Lefors, McLean and Pampa) was similar, with a -12.81 and -4,31. Hall County reported -3.22 percent and -2.8.

Canadian (Hemphill County) followed the regional trend with -6.10 and -1.09 percents. Hutchinson County (Borger, Fritch, Sanford and Stinnett) was -8.59 and -3.71. In the opposite direction, Motley County has a similar economic experience, -6.49 and -0.97.

The metropolitan counties around Amarillo did a bit better. Potter was a mixed bag, with -3,10 percent and (+)5.26 percent. A few miles to the South, Randall County got two plusses 11.26 and 1.33 percent, respectively. Roberts County (Miami) followed the pattern of the other rural counties: -14.69 and -3.15 percent. Somehow, though, Wheeler got a positive YTD, with -4.20 and (+)6.51.

The sales figures for June--or for any other single month--do not necessarily indicate a trend. With more jobs available in the state, sales should logically increase in coming months. Locally, several merchants report that their sales are going well. New store construction and various renovation projects would suggest that retailers in Clarendon are generally optimistic about economic growth. On the national level, some pundits are predicting record sales from Thanksgiving through Christmas. It may be that 1995 will be an exceptionally good year.

## Where Will The Next **Road Go?**

Transportation (TxDOT) will reveal its current Transportation Improvement (TIP) at an August 31 public meeting. The Transportation Improvement Plan is the listing of proposed projects which will be considered for funding over the next three-year period. The plan includes all area of the Panhandle and the City of Amarillo.

Some of the project in the proposed TIP include: Loop 335 from IH40 to RM 1061, Amarillo Boulevard overpass at SH 136, and US 87 from Hartley to Dalhart widened to a 4-lane divided highway.

ment officers stop a family with out-of-area license tags and award them with a free restaurant meal "on the town." (Total for Year 21.09 Other businesses can contribute gift certificates for the family to use here. This promotes Clarendon as a friendly place to stop and stay a while.

Additional promotional ideas came up to increase publicity for events, to establish community festival weekend such as an "airing of the quilts" or "oktoberfest" style function, and creation of detailed placemats and brochures displaying local maps and lists of sights and events.

Members want to maximize recognition of the communities assets such as Greenbelt Lake, Clarendon College, the museum, and historic buildings. One suggestion is to create a computer data base from lake permits for the purpose of notifying visitors year round of special events there and in area communities. Establishing a family playground area as well as general lake promotion ranked high in the discussions.

"Welcome Wagon" bags of coupons, maps, church schedules, and similar items for new and returning college students would help them relate to the community, and help us get to know them. Other education-related ideas included a school/community sponsored activity each month; restaurant values linked to student IDs; a chamber scholarship based on an essay contest about a local interest or concern; recognition of athletes at all schools; promoting Internet access to students, community members and businesses; and a school-to-work committee to promote career exploration.

Some of the ideas in the leadership category will serve to promote this area too. Executive Secretary Pat Archuleta will lead a "Texas Friendly Spoken Here" training program this Fall to motivate and educate employees of local businesses about benefits in Donley County.

A leadership institute drawing on fresh expertise offered by new community members Dr. Scott Elliott and Dr. Janie Noble is in the works. A speakers bureau to staff out-of-area fairs and gatherings; better interagency cooperation; and Chamber ambassadors are other new or improved ways the Chamber will demonstrate leadership.

## Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:

In this issue of the Clarendon News, we have published notice of a significant increase in Water District taxes. I would like to explain why we were forced to increase the taxes to that extent.

The Panhandle Found Water Conservation District is statutorily charged, under Section 52.151, of *The Texas Water Code*, with "enforcing rules to provide for conserving, preserving, protecting, recharging, controlling subsidence, and preventing waste of the underground water reservoir" for this generation, as well as future generations.

In April of 1994, the District was sued by QUIXX Corporation, a subsidiary of Southwestern Public Service Company, in 251st District Court, in Amarillo. This declaratory judgement suit challenged the validity of the District's rules and statutory authority to regulate groundwater. Since early June of 1994, we have tried diligently to settle the suit out of court. Apparently, we have been unsuccessful.

The District has used its reserve funds to pay for attorneys and the technical experts needed in the effort to settle this suit. Since the District has not raised taxes in the past four years, our reserves have been depleted and we have been forced to make the increase in taxes this year. We are aware that the increase seems high, but when you realize that the average home owners taxes will about to about the cost of a hamburger at McDonald's, we believe that it is well worth it and justifiable. The District must insure that our precious water resources are conserved and used wisely.




These volunteers received training in a ten-week course in the Spring of 1995, instructed by Amy O'Neal at Clarendon College.



Also September 1, concealed handgun program instructors certified by the DPS may begin offering the 10 to 15 hour classes which applicants must take to become licensed. 





Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced-price meals for their children. Applications are also available at the principal's office of each school or the school cafeteria. To apply for free and reduced-price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits, households receiving food stamps or AFDC only have to list their child's name, food stamp or AFDC case number, and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the applications does not have a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available by writing the word "NONE". The application must be signed by an adult household

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy the Elementary Principal will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal a real for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to the Superintendent, P.O. Box 610, Clarendon, Texas 79226 or call (806) 874-2062.

Households that list a food stamp of AFDC case number must report when the household no longer received these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. 
## Simmons **Attends Camp**

## Athletes **Beware** Of Syndrome


Houston - Football players who suffer a head injury are at risk for "second-impact syndrome."

"An initial concussion during any contact sport can lead to significant problems later if followed by a second concussion," said Dr. Albert C. Hergenroeder, an expert on adolescent sports medicine at **Baylor** College of Medicine in Houston.

The danger lies in athletes who return to the sport too soon after the original head injury. Another blow to the head can produce an extremely high level of blood flow to the brain. Subsequent rapid swelling of the brain can cause death.

Because second-impact syndrome is rare, Hergenroeder said trainers, coaches, and physicians need to be warned of the problem and its potential consequences.

"The physician and coach may decide to keep a player out of a couple of games until the player has fully recovered from the first blow," Hergenroeder said.
