### HIGH SCHOOL BAND TO PRESENT SPRING CONCERT

There will be no admission charge for this program and the public is extended a cordial invitation to attend. Spring interscholastic league contests were held last week on the campus at West Texas State in Canyon. In the overall results, the local group received a second

place rating in marching, a fourth place in concert, and a third place in sight reading.

Georgia Belle Harmon made a first division rating in student conducting and Larry Stewart a second division rating in student conducting.

Clarendon's Junior College Gymnasium will be the site Thursday evening, May 14th, of a banquet by the Texas Butane Dealers Association to honor Ray Noblitt who has been selected by his industry as the "Butane Dealer of the Year."

Mr. Noblitt, owner of the Noblitt Sales Company, was selected for the honor at the Association's Mid-Winter Meeting in Houston last January.

Butane dealers from all over the State of Texas will journey to Clarendon to take part in the ceremonies honoring the outstanding business man of their industry for 1959. It is expected that a great many of Mr. Noblitt's friends from the Clarendon area will also attend the banquet.

A mobile unit from Amarillo TV Station KGNC will record the evening's activities for later telecast throughout the Panhandle area. News stories will be sent from Clarendon to every newspaper and radio station in Texas, telling the "Butane Dealer of the Year" story.

M. G. Highnote, President of the Texas Butane Dealers Association, will preside at the banquet. Among those who will appear on the program include: W. W. Pinkerton, Superintendent of the Clarendon schools; Cal Farley, Founder of Boys Ranch and former business associate of Mr. Noblitt; J. E. Walling, Walling Butane Appliances, Haskell, who was president of the Association at the time Mr. Noblitt served on its Board of Directors; and Wm. J. Lawson, Executive Secretary of the Texas Butane Dealers Association.

### Clarendon FFA Judging Teams Top Area I And II Contests At Tech

Teams representing the Clarendon Future Farmer Chapter won top honors at the annual Texas Tech Contests at Lubbock Saturday in which over 160 schools from Area 1 and 2 participated. Approximately 2,500 youths from the two areas competed in the annual contests. Clarendon teams won the livestock and dairy products judging events and tied for sixth in dairy cattle judging.

Sam Wells, Carl Talley and Bob Longan made up the winning livestock judging team. Wells was the high man for Clarendon in this event. Gus Havens, Howard Talley and Ronnie Tyra finished second, third and fourth high individuals in the entire contest in the dairy products event as the teams trained by Vo-Ag Instructor J. R. Gillham won first for the second consecutive year.

Dennis Bradshaw was the second high individual in the entire dairy cattle judging contest. Gary Longan and Don Hudgins were other members of the dairy cattle team.

Each of the three teams qualified for the state judging contests to be held in College Station, Saturday, May 2nd.

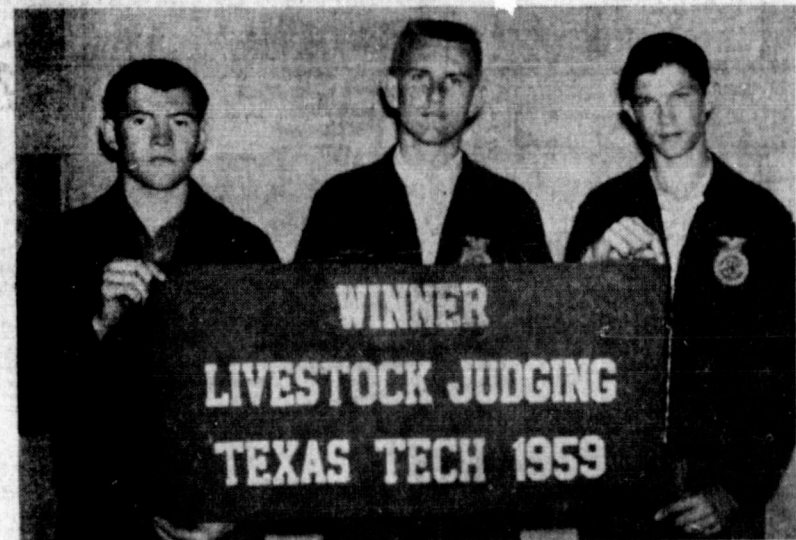
### CITY NOTICE

### Miss Ryan To Sing With National FHA Chorus

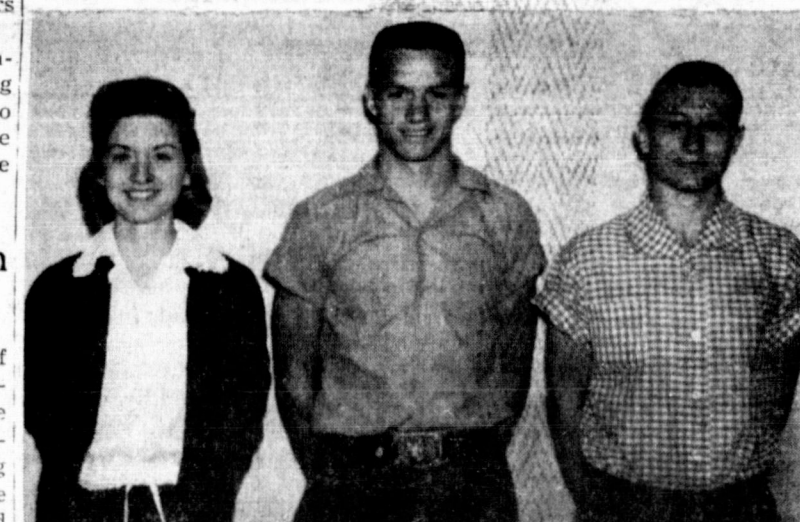

obtained by writing the Association's office at 1623 South Lamar, Austin. All persons knowing Mr. Noblitt are invited by the Association to join in honoring this outstanding Clarendon business man.

The Texas Butane Dealers Association's Clarendon activities will begin with a Board of Directors meeting at the Dixie Cafe. Following the Board meeting, the Association's officers and directors, as well as butane dealers from all over the State of Texas, will attend the banquet at the Junior College Gymnasium in honor of Mr. Noblitt.

TBDA's Board of Directors established the "Butane Dealer of the Year" program last fall as a part of the Association's program of work for 1959. The project was designed to give some well deserved recognition to a member of the Association who has done an outstanding job in running his operation and also who realizes the importance of taking part in his Association's activities and his local community affairs.

Early last fall each of the 18 districts making up Texas Butane Dealers Association were asked to nominate a butane dealer from that district for the industry's top honor. All 18 districts entered nominees and these 18 nominees were presented to TBDA's Selection Committee at the Association's Mid-Winter Meeting last January in Houston.

The announcement of the selection of Mr. Noblitt for the "Butane Dealer of the Year" honor was the climax of the Association's Houston meeting. President Guy Highnote made Mr. Noblitt's selection known at the meeting's final banquet.

Following the announcement of his selection he was interviewed by Houston radio station KTRH and received state-wide recognition.

Members of District 18, which is made up of butane dealers from the upper Panhandle Counties which include Armstrong, Carson, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, and Wheeler, nominated Mr. Noblitt for the industry's top honor for his record in Civic and Association work as well as the outstanding operation of his butane firm.

Mr. Noblitt entered the butane business in 1943, and since that time has taken a very active part in Association activities. He has served the Association as District 18's Director and has given his support freely to Association projects both at state and district levels. At the present time he is a member of the Association's Industry Training and Development Committee.

His civic activities include the Lions Club, past President of the local Chamber of Commerce, and he also served the Chamber on its various project committees, has promoted the drilling of irrigation wells in his trade area, has been called on to give speeches at the various civic clubs in his local community as well as surrounding communities and has helped organize the Donley County Industrial Foundation for the purpose of bringing industries to the Clarendon trade territory. He is now serving on the Board of Directors of that organization.

**TAXES . . . TAXES . . . TAXES**

The major item of conversation around the State Capitol is, of course, TAXES. The Governor's escheat-custody bill met rough sledding in the House and barely squeezed by with a two-vote margin.

Then the House turned around order the giant omnibus tax bill which the Tax Committee had reported out. Indications are that this particular bill will meet with considerable opposition when it comes before the floor for debate.

**NEWS SPECIAL SALES TAXES**

This bill, H.B. 727, is chock full of special sales taxes on such items as sporting goods, boats, motors, automobile parts, lube oil, restaurant meals, hotel rooms, business machines, cigars, cigarettes, commercial rentals, and on and on and on. The bill also includes tax raises on natural gas corporation franchise taxes, liquor, radios, T.V., and cosmetics.

**PREDICT WILL NOT PASS**

At the risk of sticking my neck out, I predict that this particular bill will not pass at this regular session. I still believe that we are going to have a special session for our tax problems. It looks more and more like they cannot be solved in the short remaining portion of this regular session. I'm glad the Legislative Halls are air-conditioned because both the weather and the debate are likely to be plenty hot before this Legislature finally adjourns.

It's hard to believe that America was founded to avoid taxation.

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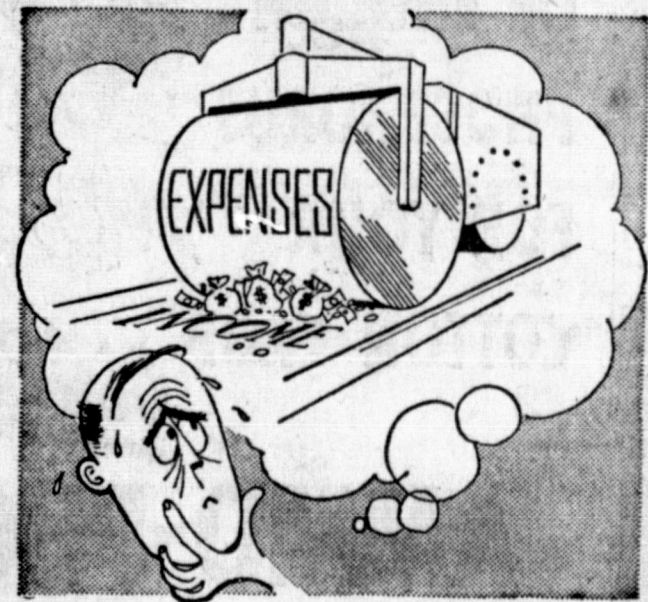
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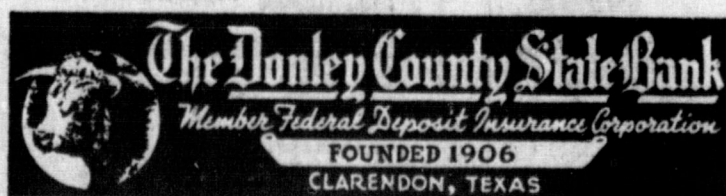

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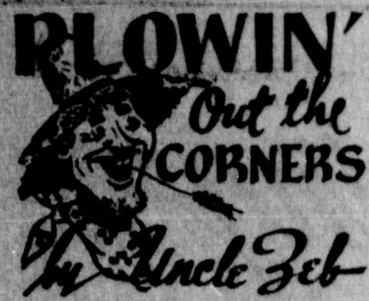

## Many Motorists Fail To Appear In Court

Department of Public Safety officials said today there is a large number of motorists who fail to appear in court after giving their written promise to appear on a traffic violation.

Major R. A. Crowder, Commander of Region No. 5, issued a reminder to motorists that a charge of "Failure to Appear" can be filed in addition to the original traffic charge in the event the defendant fails to appear in court for violation of the Uniform Traffic Act. The motorist may be found guilty of a misdemeanor and fined up to \$200 for failing to appear even though found not guilty of the original traffic violation.

The Major said that the problem is serious, in that serving warrants on motorists who fail to answer a traffic summons requires many man hours away from necessary patrol duties of traffic supervision.

In an effort to combat this, Crowder stated that he has issued instructions to all personnel under his command to advise those persons arrested that they may have a charge of this nature filed against them if they fail to appear in the proper court within the designated time. When the defendant realizes that one additional charge was brought about by his failure to keep his promise that he made when he signed the traffic ticket, he may think twice before disregarding the next summons.

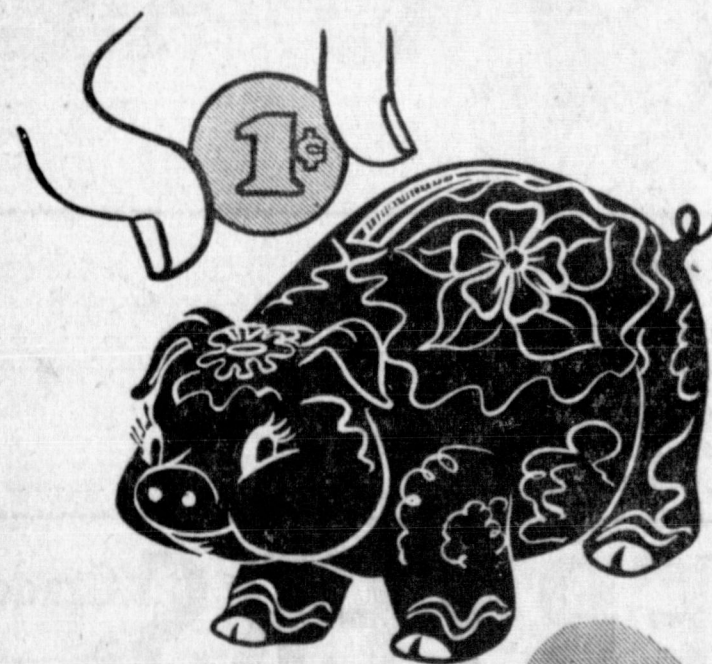

According to the sergeant this brings the total rural traffic accidents in Donley County for 1959 to 12 as compared to 15 for the first three months of 1958.

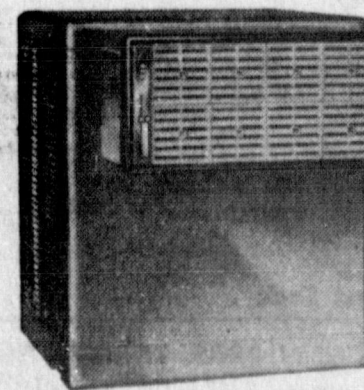
The sergeant advised that traffic deaths in Texas are 12 per cent higher than they were at this same time last year.

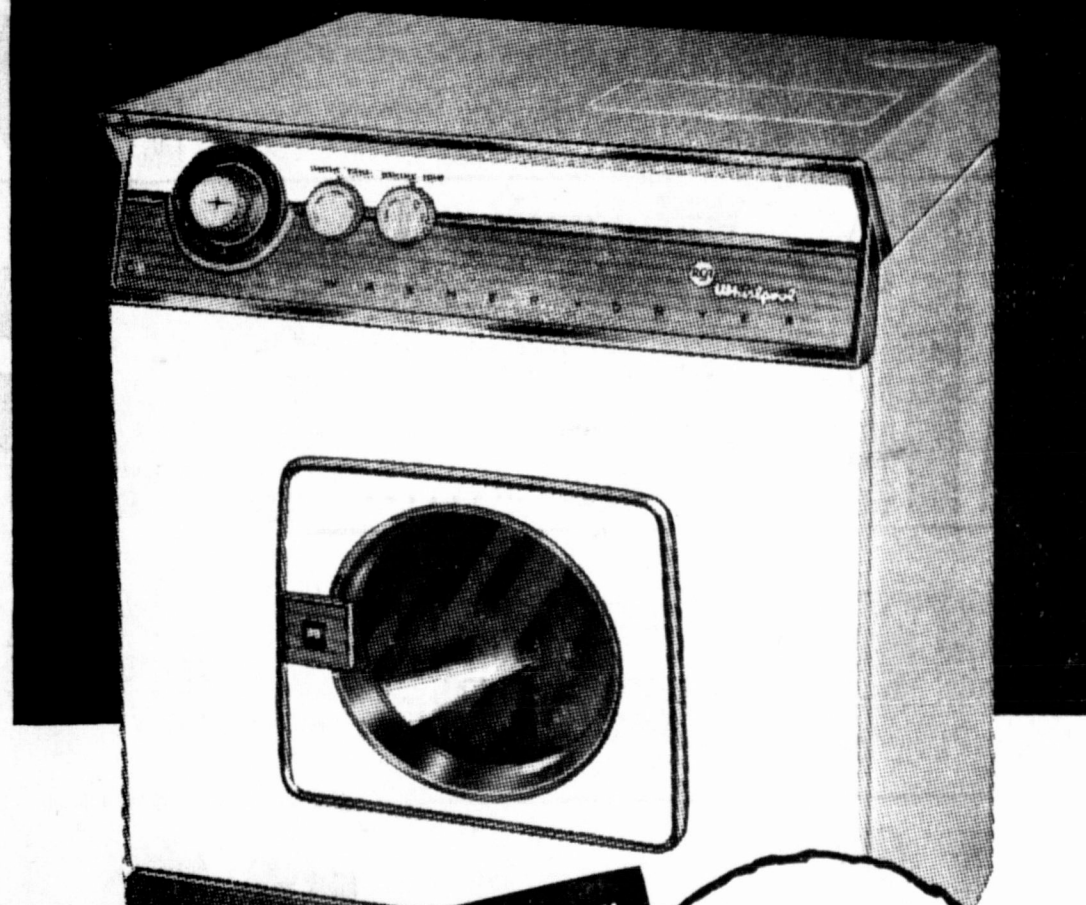
