end of this fiscal year. Second prong is to raise \$72,800,000 a year (\$145,600,000 for the next biennium) to cover spending from the general revenue fund.

Sources for this money would include: (1) a natural gas severance tax, (2) an increase in levies on motor vehicle sales, tobacco and corporation franchises and (3) unclaimed bank deposits, insurance policies and property, which the state would take over. Governor Daniel increased his previously recommended budget by nearly \$20,000,000 to include appropriations for retiring state bonds, providing medical care for people on welfare rolls, a driver education program and advertising for tourists and industry.

Total two-year spending from general revenue would be \$330. 000,000

to al producers of cotton is called "premeasurement."

Every year, Mr. Cooke said there are some farmers who either exceed or underplant their cotton allotments through inaccurate measurement on their own part or because of incorrect information about the size of permanent fields. In the case of overplanting, this can often cause unnecessary expense for fertilizer, seed, and soil treatment. Underplanting could cause loss of farm income.




