

TIME OF YEAR TO BE CAREFUL OF SNAKES

This is the time of year when poisonous reptiles, such as the very unpopular but wellknown rattlesnake, are coming out. According to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary, Texas Game and Fish Commission, March is the month when the weather is just cool enough to keep the snakes in their dens and just warm enough to make it nice for an outing.

"This situation will not last long," declares Dodgen. "Once the warm weather arrives in force, the rattlers will leave these dens and begin to slip through the brushlands just to lie behind rocks and drowse in the sun."

There are still plenty of rattlers around. Some 4,000 rattlesnakes were captured during the two-day hunt held recently on ranches near Sweetwater.


