#### **Board Approves** School Budget

The Board of Trustees for the Clarendon Public Schools approved a 1959-60 budget amounting to \$264,200.00 at their regular monthly meeting last Thursday night. This represents a cut of about \$20,000.00 over the 1958-59 budget. The reason for the lower figure this year is that the new vocational agriculture building eral Home in charge of arrangewas built last year at a cost of \$21,500.00.

A break-down of the expected expenditures is as follows: Administration, \$15,350; Instruction (includes all teacher's salaries library books and teaching supplies) \$172,578.00; Pupil transof plant, \$14,500.00, Maintenance ed Hedley 9 to 5 in an exciting Bronchos Scrimmage portation, \$28,610.00; Operation of plant, \$8,000.00; Insurance 5,060.00; Furniture and equipment, \$1,500.00 and debt service \$18,555.00.

Of the total budget, \$150,000.00 will come from the state and the balance from local taxes.
