





crease in highway accidents. John Bury, of the Bureau, claims that alcoholic beverages are one of the major causes. The reflexes of the driver are slowed down and without realizing it he becomes a reckless driver while he has a false feeling of complete safety. Speeding is another major cause of fatalities. Most driving speed restrictions are placed on the road for a reason and should be adhered to.

Another cause of highway col lision is crossing the center line. Don't pass other cars where there is a double line and be sure when you do pass in a passing zone, that you have plenty of room.

Mr. Bury listed a number of other causes of accidents such as: poor physical condition of the driver, usually overtiredness; bad weather conditions; heavy traffic and poor roads where speed should be cut down.

If we take all the necessary precautions we can reach the point where the accident rate will begin a downward trend. Careful driving and close attention to local driving regulations coupled with keeping cars in good shape will help to cut down the rate. It is up to every driver to contribute to the best of his ability to cut down the highway death toll.







Average yields under irrigation are approximately 25 bushels per acre, but some relatively large plantings have produced 30 to 40 bushels per acre. Soybeans are adapted to about the same soil and climatic conditions as corn or cotton. They properly-drained soils if water i

They are usually planted in 36 to 42-inch rows at a rate to give 10 to 12 plants per foot of row Date of seeding is important because of the sensitivity of the plants to day length and temperature. Optimum planting dates occur when the minimum soil temperature is above 65 degrees and the day length reaches 141/2 hours-May 15 to June 15 in about all areas of the state.



Parcel post was authorized by Congress, back in 1913, as a supplementary service to the private package carriers. It was specifically stipulated that it was not to supplant these carriers, or to unfairly compete with them.

It was also stipulated that parcel post charges were to fully and fairly reflect the costs to the Post Office Department of providing the service.

These stipulations have constantly been violated.

Direct losses attributable to parcel post-losses which can only be made up by the general taxpayers-have run far past the billion point. Indirect losses have added heavily to the taxpayerborne deficit. And it would be hard to find a better example of unfair competition with private enterprise, which must pay taxes, and meet every cost of operation, direct and indirect, out of pocket.

Let parcel post users pay for what they get-just as they pay for what they get when they patronize any private business. What could be fairer?


