Crop Insurance Deadling Set

Drew Thornberry, County Executive Director of the Donley County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, (ASCS) said today that the recently enacted crop reform bill contains important deadlines for those farmers concerned with maintaining eligibility for USDA benefits such as farm program payments.

The new law, signed by President Bill Clinton on October 13, requires producers of insurable crops to take out at least the minimum, catastrophic level of insurance to remain eligible for USDA benefits. Drew said that while producers of fall-seeded crops have until early next year to sign up for catastrophic coverage and remain eligible for benefits, those who wish "but-up" coverage on their fall-seeded, insurable crops must do so by October 31. He urges these producers to check with their local private crop insurance agent to determine applicable crops and other options.

"Buy-up" coverage is available only through private crop insurance agents but farmers seeking only catastrophic coverage may sign up within the next few months at either their local ASCS office or with private agents.

The new law--the Federal Crop Insurance Reform Act of 1994-- combines the crop insurance and disaster assistance programs into one program beginning with next year's crop. Its provisions virtually eliminate the possibility of future crop disaster assistance programs.

Mr. Thornberry said, however, that for 1994 weather-related disasters, the current ASCS crop disaster assistance program will continue much like it has in recent years. He said the target date for farmers to begin applying at county ASCS offices for partial reimbursement on their 1994 weather-related crop losses is early December.

Nominations For The ASC Committee Needed

Farmers are asked to nominate candidates of their choice by October 31 to be on the ASC Donley committee ballot says Drew Thornberry, County Executive Director.

ASC committees are responsible for managing federal farm programs on the local level. To meet the needs of individual producers, ASC Committee members must be concerned and responsible individuals. County farmers and ranchers have the opportunity to nominate people they feel would best serve the farm community.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected, must be signed by at least three eligible farm votes in the ASC community, and must be received in the county ASCS office by the October 31 deadline.

Farmers may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as they choose. Anyone wishing to nominate a farmer for the ASC committee election may contact the county ASCS office for full details, including eligibility re-quirements for office holders.

Farmers should petition for and elect those individuals they feel would do a good job as a member of the ASC committee. The election of concerned farmers to positions on ASC committees is essential in the administration of farm programs.

The ASC Donley County committee election will be conducted from November 25 to December 5 by mail ballot.

Mr. Thornberry further explained that the county ASCS office welcomes all valid petitions. The opportunity to nominate, vote, and be elected to office is guaranteed to all farmers regardless of race, color, religion, sex, age, marital status, handicap, or national origin.



Influenza and Pneumonia Season Approaches

American Lung Association of Texas Urges Senior Citizens and Others at **Risk to Get Annual Influenza Vaccine**

AUSTIN-Each year millions of Americans are afflicted with influenza and pneumonia. Those most at risk are the very young, the very old, those suffering from chronic lung or heart disease and those with weakened immune systems.

This fall, the American Lung Association of Texas urges all those who are considered high risk to get a flu shot. You are at high risk if you are over age 65, have chronic lung, heart or kidney disease, reside in a nursing home or other long term care facility or if you have other chronic diseases. In addition, health care workers should be immunized to reduce the chances of spreading this condition to highrisk people. The shot is recommended every year because the influenza virus strain changes annually. The ideal time to receive flu

vaccine is between October 15 and November 15.

According to the Lung Association, both influenza and pneumonia are deadly. "Influenza s a highly contagious, potentially life-threatening lung disease," said Dr. William Paul Glezen, epidemiologist at the Influenza Research Center at Baylor University. "Since 1960, pneumonia has been the leading killer by infectious disease in the U.s. It is both the most common and most deadly complication arising from influenza," he explained.

"Combined, influenza and pneumonia are the fourth leading cause of death among all American women and fifth leading cause of death among all Americans over the age of 65," Dr. Glezen said. Lung disease, including influenza

and pneumonia, is the third leading cause of death in America. **Influenza Fact Sheet**

 Influenza is a potentially life-threatening, contagious disease that is caused by a virus. When the flu attacks the lungs, the lining of the respiratory tract is damaged. The tissues temporarily become swollen and inflamed, but usually heal within two weeks.

Influenza and pneumonia (the most common complication of the flu) combined are the fourth leading cause of death among all American women and the fifth leading cause of death among all Americans over the age of 65.

* In 1991, there were more than 129 million estimated cases of the flue, nationwide, resulting in 249.6 million bed days at a cost to our nation of more than \$11.5 billion. In addition, influenza and pneumonia resulted in 77,860 deaths.

• For healthy children and adults, influenza is typically a moderately severe illness. For unhealthy people, influenza can be very severe or dangerous. In a flu epidemic year, from 20 to 50 percent of people not immunized may contact influenza.


* Adults 65 years of age and older who contract influenza are much more likely to have serious complications from this illness, which can affect their health and independence.

* A person can have influenza more than once because the virus that causes influenza may belong to different strains of one of three different flu virus families. A, B or the rare type C. Type A viruses tend to have a disproportionate affect on adults, Type B viruses have a disproportionate affect on children. Both A and B have strains that cause illness of varying severity. The influenza A family has more strains than the B family.

Flu can be prevented with influenza vaccine. This vaccine is produced each year so that the vaccine can contain influenza viruses that are expected to cause illness that year. A yearly influenza vaccination is about 75 percent effective in preventing flu and reducing the severity of the flu.

* Target populations for flu vaccine are people 65 years of age and older, and others with chronic
