When President Franklin D Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act on August 14, 1935, which is by, no means complete. His words were prophetic.

1935 covered a limited number of workers in commerce and in10 workers are covered and benefits are being paid to one out of six persons in the population. They are retired and disabled workers and their families, and the Tilies of deceased workers.

elderly. Unemployment among older workers was estimated at 30 percent. Fewer than 18 persons out of a hundred were covered by pension plans. And those who had businesses were bankrupt. Many savings institutions had folded, so Families and charities found it a very heavy burden to provide for the elderily. But what could they

signed established two social insurance programs on a national scale to meet the problems of old-
age and unemployment: a federal age and unemployment: a federal
system of old-age benefits for retired workers who had been employed in industry and commerce; and a federal-state system of unemployment insurance. Oldage and unemployment were the
natural priorities to be covered: the depression had wiped out much of the lifetime savings of the aged and had reduced opporunities for gainful employment. The Social Security Act also provided for federal grants-in-aid
to the States to help them give to the States to help them give
financial assistance to three groups of needy persons- the aged, the blind, and dependent children. It established other federal grants to enable States to extend and
strengthen maternal and child strengthen maternal and child children, and child welfare services. The retirement, survivors, and disability program of contributory social insurance is what
has become known as the Social Security program.
