Immunization Clinic Offered

Loan Funds Available

The Farmers Home Administration has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Armstrong, Donley, and Collingsworth counties, Jacqueline E. Morgan, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged population groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those

who are eligible a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market, Morgan said.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office in their area.

Local Official Earns Award

Donley County Treasurer Wanda Smith was awarded the Texas Association of Counties (TAC) County Investment Officer Level I Certification on August 23, 1994.

Smith was honored for passing a comprehensive exam covering management of county investments after attending six monthly investment classes.

The course incorporates home study, classroom lecture (including computer training if needed) and field trips to various financial institutions such as commercial banks, the Federal Reserve Bank and broker/dealer firms. Level I concentrates on the provisions of the law relating to invest-

TAC first offered this program in 1992 in response to requests from county treasurers wanting to learn how to increase their counties' rates of return. Participants are concerned that changing interest rates will translate into higher taxes for their constituents-something they hope to avoid by learning more about capital markets. The goal is to make the most of the taxpayers' dollars to avoid cutting services or raising taxes.

Smith is one of only 22 people to complete the objectives for the CIO certification in 1994. The graduates are now eligible to begin the Level II course, where curriculum will include information about investment accounting and operational techniques.

BN, Santa Fe to Merge

Burlington Northern, Inc. [BN], and Santa Fe Pacific Corporation [Santa Fe], jointly announced on June 30, that they have signed a definitive agreement providing for the merger of the two companies subject to receiving ap-proval from the Interstate Commerce Commission. The combination will create a rail network covering the midwestern and western United States and provide shippers with single-line service connecting all principal West Coast ports with major midwestern and western markets and with ports and markets in the Southeast. Clarendon is located on the BN mainline between Fort Worth and Denver.

Santa Fe stockholders will receive 0.27 of a share of Burlington Northern common stock for each Santa Fe share. Separately, Santa Fe announced that it will distribute to its shareholders on September 30, 1994, the remaining stock which it owns in Santa Fe Pacific Gold Corp. That dividend was to be paid prior to the merger, and is not dependent on it. Both transactions are expected to be tax-free to shareholders.

Upon completion of the merger, Burlington Northern will change its name to "Burlington Northern Santa Fe Corporation", and the railroad will be called The Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railway Company. Gerald Grinstein, Burlington Northern's chairman and chief executive officer, will be chairman of the merged company. Robert D. Krebs, chairman, president and chief executive officer of Santa Fe will be president and chief executive officer of the new company.

"The combination of Burlington Northern and Santa Fe is a predominantly 'end-to-end' merger that will benefit shippers and the public," Grinstein said. "There is very little overlap between our two rail systems."

"The merged BN/Santa Fe network will provide single-line service across the key transcontinental corridor from Central and Southern California to the Southeastern gateways of Memphis and Birmingham. It will provide Midwestern grain shippers with a new single-line access to the West Coast and Gulf ports, and it will enhance shipping options to Canadian and Mexican gateways," he said

/Grinstein said that shippers prefer single-line service because it is more efficient, gives them one point of contact, and eliminates the costs and delays associated with interchanging traffic from one carrier to another. Enhanced single-line service also will open new markets for shippers.

new markets for shippers.

"This merger will create a strong, new rail carrier with a diversified traffic base and excellent financial prospects. For example, Santa Fe's strength in intermodal traffic will complement BN's strength in coal and grain," said Krebs. "This will benefit employees, customers, shareholders and communities

where both railroads operate."

Krebs continued, "The combination of BN and Santa Fe will help U.S. industries compete more effectively in world markets by linking the heartland more closely with the West Coast and Gulf Coast ports, providing better access to the Pacific Rim nations and other trading partners."

The merger has been approved by the boards of directors of both companies. It is subject to approval by the shareholders of both companies. The companies will file their merger application with the ICC and ask the ICC to rule on an expedited basis. While the ICC is reviewing the merger, BN and Santa Fe will operate as independent companies as before.

"We expect the merger to result in substantial cost savings,"

said Krebs.

Burlington Northern Railroad is one of the world's largest transportation and information services. It operates the longest rail system in North America, with rails in 25 states and two Canadian; provinces.

The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad operates in 12 states and offers service to Mexico at several ports-of-entry.

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

QUESTION: Would you comment on the violence in our society at large, and the forces which are propelling it? What do you think can and should be done

DR. DOBSON: There are few subjects that cause me greater concern than the exposure being given to crime and violence in America today.

A squadron of Los Angeles police cornered a desperate gunman in a residential area of the community. The fugitive had barricaded himself in a small house, and held three juvenile hostages inside. Television crews were on hand to photograph one of the children, a teenage boy, as he was forced outside and then shot in the head by his abductor.

The pathetic young victim died on the sidewalk in a pool of his own blood. I sat stunned, literally sick to my stomach, while the drama was broadcast in full color.

A flood of emotions ran through my mind as I gazed into the immobile, unfocused eyes of the dying adolescent. Mixed with deep pity and remorse was a sudden outpouring of indignation-a revulsion that had been accumulating for

I was angry at the profiteers who have nurtured violence in our society, and at those millions who seem to thrive on it. I was angry at movie producers like Sam Peckinpah, who have smeared blood and guts all over the silver screen. I was angry at theater patrons for demanding a dozen disembowelments per hour in their visual entertainment. I was angry at television networks for giving us continuous police stories, with their guns and silly automobile chases and karate chops and SWAT teams.

Know before you go Although there are no absolute guarantees, there are some

chances of satisfaction and minimize the likelihood that you'll end up with a lemon. Cars are highticket items. When making any major purchase, you should look before you leap. A bit of research up front can save headaches later

Before you begin looking at used cars, think about what car models and options you want, and how much you are able or willing to spend. Check out you local library - it has books and magazines that compare and contrast car models, reliability statistics, and prices. Libraries also can provide information about safety tests and mileage. Many on-line computer services have discussion forums where people trade infor-

When you settle on what you want, shop around. More than one place will offer you the car you

want, but the price may vary.

Kicking the tires Once you find the car you want, check it out thoroughly. You should consider having a knowledgeable friend or mechanic look over the car before you buy it. Some cities even have "lemonbusting" services that will come out and do a thorough and professional inspection of the auto for a reasonable price. An initial investment of a few dollars can conceivably save you from making a mistake worth thousands to you

There are some things you can do on your own. Don't believe everything you read. Investigations by our office in the past have uncovered odometer shops that roll back the mileage of cars and provide "legitimate" certificates of authenticity. So when you look at an automobile, see that everything is consistent with odometer. Are the brake pedals and seat worn and slick? that doesn't gibe with a reading of 40,000 miles.

Some people say not to buy a car that has had more than one owner. While that may be extreme, you can always ask to see maintenance records. The very existence of a record of oil changes and routine repairs may indicate that a car has had good care.

If you have problems If something goes wrong with your car and it is covered by a warranty or a service contract, there are several steps you can take to get service. First, read the warranty or contract; the document should have instructions on how to get service. Try to resolve the problem with the salesperson or owner of the dealership. However, if you think you are entitled to service, but the dealer disagrees, you can take other steps.

If the warranty is backed by the manufacturer, contact the local representative of the car company. This local, or "zone," representative, has the authority to adjust and make decisions about warranty service and repairs.




