thereare several steps you cin take to get service. First, read the war ranty or contract; the documen should have instructions on how to get service. Try to resolve the problem with the salesperson or
owner of the dealership. However, if you think you are entitled to service, but the dealer disagrees, you can take other steps.

If the warranty is backed by the manufacturer, contact the

company. This local, or "zone," representative, has the authority to adjust and make decisions about warranty service and repairs.

You might also consider using a dispute resolution organization
