They try to be dedicated to the people every time a call goes in for an ambulance to respond. They are looking for people with the same desire to serve. Their goal is to provide to this community the best care in the region. They are looking for people who are willing to help in this goal by helping during the day time.

The Association is in need of help during the day to help cover in the absence of personnel who have jobs that require them not to be able to respond during the day. If you are interested in helping you community, please contact and EMS personnel or leave your name and phone number at the Ambulance barn.

If you are interested in certification, there are four levels of certification that you can achieve. The first level is the ECA (Emergency Care Attendant) certification. This requires that you have a forty hour class of instruction on basic emergency medical care. The second is the EMT (Emergency Medical Technician). This certification requires one-hundred classroom hours, twenty hour in emergency room work and several ambulance runs. The other two levels of certification are EMT-I (Emergency Medical Technician Intermediate) and Paramedic. The EMT-I is more in-depth training than the EMT, and the Paramedic is the highest level of training in the EMS. All of these levels of training are state tested through the Texas Department of Health.

The Clarendon EMS Association and the Associated Ambulance Authority are looking for the people who care for this community and are willing to help. If you are interested, the Clarendon EMS Association holds its monthly meeting of the third Thursday of each month. You are welcome to attend and present your ideas or become a member. If you wish to help, please leave your name and address at the ambulance barn during the hours of 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, or contact any EMS member. Broncos Beat White Deer

The Clarendon Broncos hosted White Deer, Friday, September 23, and beat them by a score of 40-20 for their first win of the season. Lorenzo Moore rushed for 332 yards and two touchdowns to lead Clarendon to their win.

Moore scored Clarendon's first touchdown in the first quarter, by returning a kickoff 81 yards (Ebony Butler kick was good) making the score 7-0. White Deer came back to score a 62 yard run and made the extra point to tie the game at 7-7. Roy Williams of Clarendon then made a 2-yard run (kick failed) to make the score at the end of the first quarter, Clarendon 13 - White Deer 7.

White Deer came back with a three yard run and made the extra point to go ahead of the Broncos 14-13. Robert Taylor, quarterback, made a 15 yard touchdown and Lorenzo Moore ran the 2 points in to make the score 21-14 in favor of the Broncos at half-time.

The Broncos came back in the third quarter and Ebony Butler scored on a 25 yard run (kick failed), to bring the Broncos in at the end of the third quarter 27-14. In the fourth quarter, White Deer's Jeff Caffey scored on a five

yard run (kicked failed). The Bronco's Roy Williams made a 4 yard touchdown (kicked failed), and Lorenzo Moore ran 79 yards for the final touchdown, (kick by Butler good), for the final Bronco score. The Broncos played a great defensive and offensive game as can be seen by the score. They held White Deer to 9 first downs in comparison to Clarendon's 18. White Deer had 80 yards rushing and 265 yards passing for a total of 345 yards gained. Clarendon had 447 yards rushing and 17 yards passing for a total of 465 yards.

Extended CRP Grazing Period

The State ASC Committee has authorized an extension of the CRP grazing period for Donley County. This extension is for the period October 1 through November 30, 1994.

Drew Thornberry, Donley County CED said, producers who are currently approved may continue to graze those acres until November 30, 1994 at no additional charge. Producers who will graze CRP acreage for the first time after September 30, 1994, must meet the 40 percent loss requirement on hay and pasture. This grazing must be used to maintain their own livestock or may be sold only to an approved livestock producer in an approved county. The CRP owner must also prepay eight percent of the CRP-1 annual per acre rental rate times the acres to be grazed. Acreage that has been hayed cannot now be grazed & there is no extension for CRP grazing should apply in person to the ASCS office. No grazing is permitted without prior USDA approval.

New Generating Plant Needed

Golden Spread Electric Cooperative has filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission a notice of intent to apply for a certificate of convenience and necessity for construction of a new 400 megawatt generating plant.

Scheduled for initial operation in early 1998, the plant would consist of four 100 megawatt, simple cycle gas turbine powered generating units. Natural gas will be used as the primary fuel.

A final site selection has not

been made, but two preferred sites are currently under consideration. One site is located in Moore County south of Sunray, and the other site involves properties in Yoakum and Gaines Counties east of Denver City.

Approval by the Texas Utility Commission of the notice of intent will only give Golden Spread the right to file an application for a certificate of convenience and necessity, which is the authorization needed before the project

could be constructed.

In its filing, Golden Spread advised the Commission that it also intends to solicit proposals from the other utilities and independent power suppliers for both new capacity and demand side control options. The solicitation will be made in about three months and will include a request for purchased power or other supply options.

Golden Spread currently purchases wholesale power from Southwestern Public Service Company and from West Texas Utilities Company. SPS' 1993 load and capacity resource forecast, which includes the Golden Spread loads, shows a need to construct 486 megawatts of new gas turbine generating capacity to serve area loads.

Golden Spread President Robert W. Bryant said, "Our proposal does not duplicate any existing generating facilities. It simply means that SPS can defer the construction of additional generating plants on its system, and that will benefit SPS retail consumers."

Golden Spread's member systems are Bailey County Electric Cooperative (Muleshoe), Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative (Hereford), Greenbelt Electric Cooperative (Wellington), Lamb County Electric Cooperative (Littlefield), Lighthouse Electric Cooperative (Floydada), Midwest Electric Cooperative (Roby), North Plains Electric Cooperative (Perryton), Rita Blanca Electric Cooperative (Dalhart), South Plains Electric Cooperative (Lubbock), Swisher Electric Cooperative (Tulia) and Tri-County Electric Cooperative (Hooker, Oklahoma). Golden Spread's member systems serve 90,000 retail con-

sumers in the Panhandle and on the South Plains of Texas and in the Panhandle of Oklahoma.

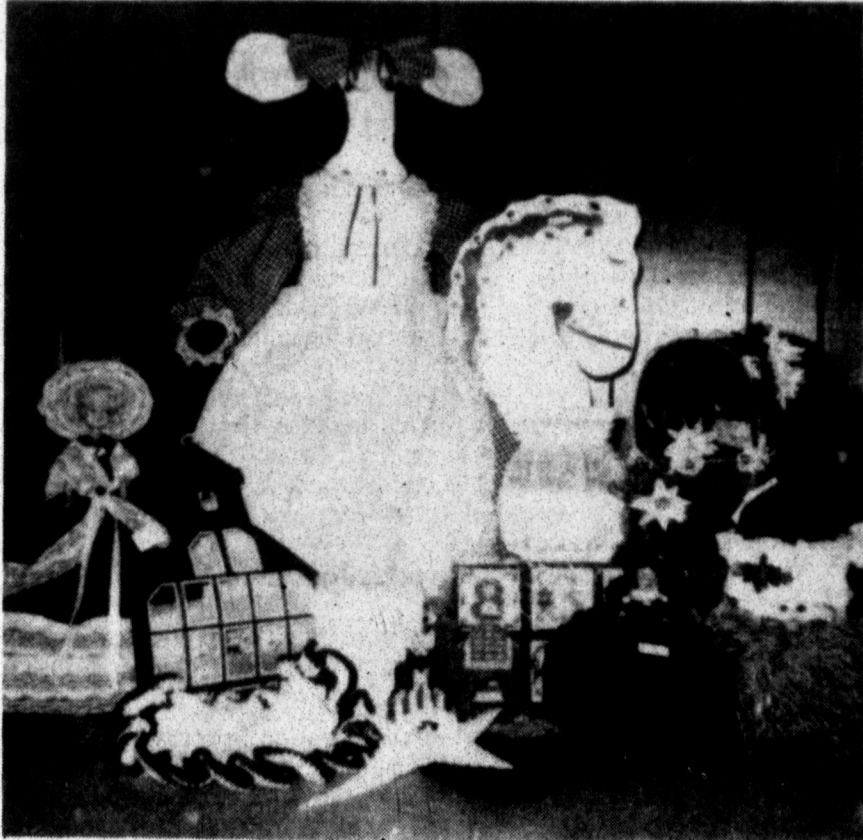

Baby Boomers Can Avoid Retirement 'Sticker Shock' Through Planning

Memo to baby boomers: it seems that major life transitions do not, Repeat Do Not, get any easier.

According to a 1993 survey, 12 percent of newlyweds find the transition from single life to married life difficult; 23 percent of new parents find the transition from being a couple to having kids difficult; but 36 percent of people aged 60 and over find that the adjustment from working to retirement is difficult!

The survey did not state the reasons for each, but common wisdom might suppose that money is a factor in each case, i.e.-

- *two cannot live as cheaply as one;
- *three/four/five cannot live as cheaply as two;
- *and golf course dues and exotic travel cannot be paid for with ticket stubs from Grateful Dead concerts.

So what's a boomer with the Great American Retirement Dream to do?

For a generation to whom CD is more likely to mean compact disk than certificate of deposit, the answer may not be welcome: save. Put a little something aside.

Recently, a series of focus groups was conducted across the country by the National Academy of Social Insurance. Among the findings was this interesting fact: there was "deep disappointment from some who said that they had been led to believe that Social Security by itself would be sufficient to sustain them at the standard of living at which they were now living. These participants had the notion that current earnings would completely be replaced dollar for dollar by Social Security benefits."

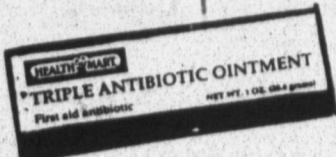

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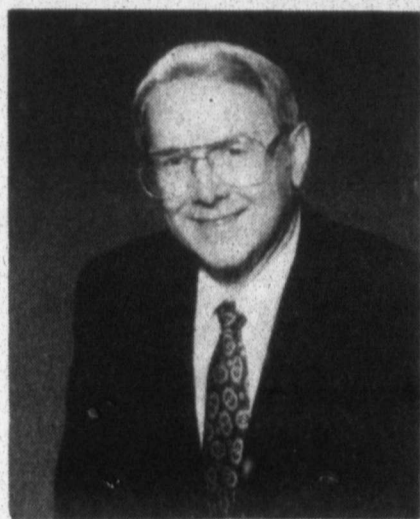
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Dr. Dobson Answers Your Questions



QUESTION:What is your view of TV, generally? Should parents attempt to regulate what their children watch?

DR. DOBSON:Most television programming is awful! According to Dr. Gerald Looney, of the University of Arizona, by the time the average preschool child reaches 14 years of age, he will have witnessed 18,000 murders on TV and countless hours of related violence, nonsense and unadulterated drivel.

Furthermore, Dr. Saul Kapel states that the most time-consuming activity in the life of a child is neither school nor family interaction. It is television, absorbing 14,000 valuable hours during the course of childhood! That is the equivalent to sitting before the tube eight hours a day continuously for 4.9 years!

There are other aspects of television which demand its regulation and control. For one thing, it is an enemy of communication within the family. How can we talk to each other when a \$1 million production in living color is always beckoning our attention?

I am also concerned about the current fashion whereby each program director is compelled to include all the avant-garde ideas

—go a little farther, use a little more profanity, discuss the undiscussable, assault the public concept of good taste and decency.

In doing so, they are hacking away at the foundations of the family and all that represents the Judeo-

Christian ethic. In recent seasons, for example, we were offered hilariously funny episodes involving abortion, divorce, extramarital relationships, rape and the ever-popular theme "Father is an idiot."

If this is "social relevance," then I am sick unto death of the message I have been fed.

Television, with its unparalleled capacity for teaching and edifying, has occasionally demonstrated the potential it carries. "Little House on the Prairie" was for years the best program available for young children.

I would not, therefore, recommend smashing the television set in despair. Rather, we must learn to control it instead of becoming its slave. When our children were young, they were permitted to watch one hour of cartoons on Saturday morning and one half-hour program each afternoon, selected from an approved list. That still sounds like a reasonable schedule for elementary-school children.

QUESTION: Many American colleges and universities are permitting men and women to live coeducational dormitories, often rooming side-by-side. Others allow unrestricted visiting hours by members of the opposite sex. Do you think this promotes more healthy attitudes toward sex?

DR. DOBSON: It certainly permits more sex, and some people think that's healthy.

The advocates of cohabitation try to tell us that young men and women can live together without doing what comes naturally. That is nonsense.

The sex drive is one of the strongest forces in human nature, and Joe College is notoriously weak in suppressing it. I would prefer that the supporters of coeducational dormitories admit that morality is not very important to them.

If morality is something we value, then we should at least give it a wobbly-legged chance to survive. The sharing of collegiate bedrooms hardly takes us in that direction.

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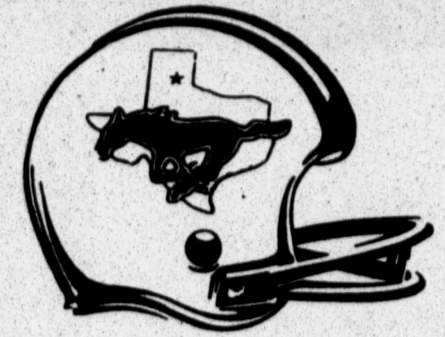
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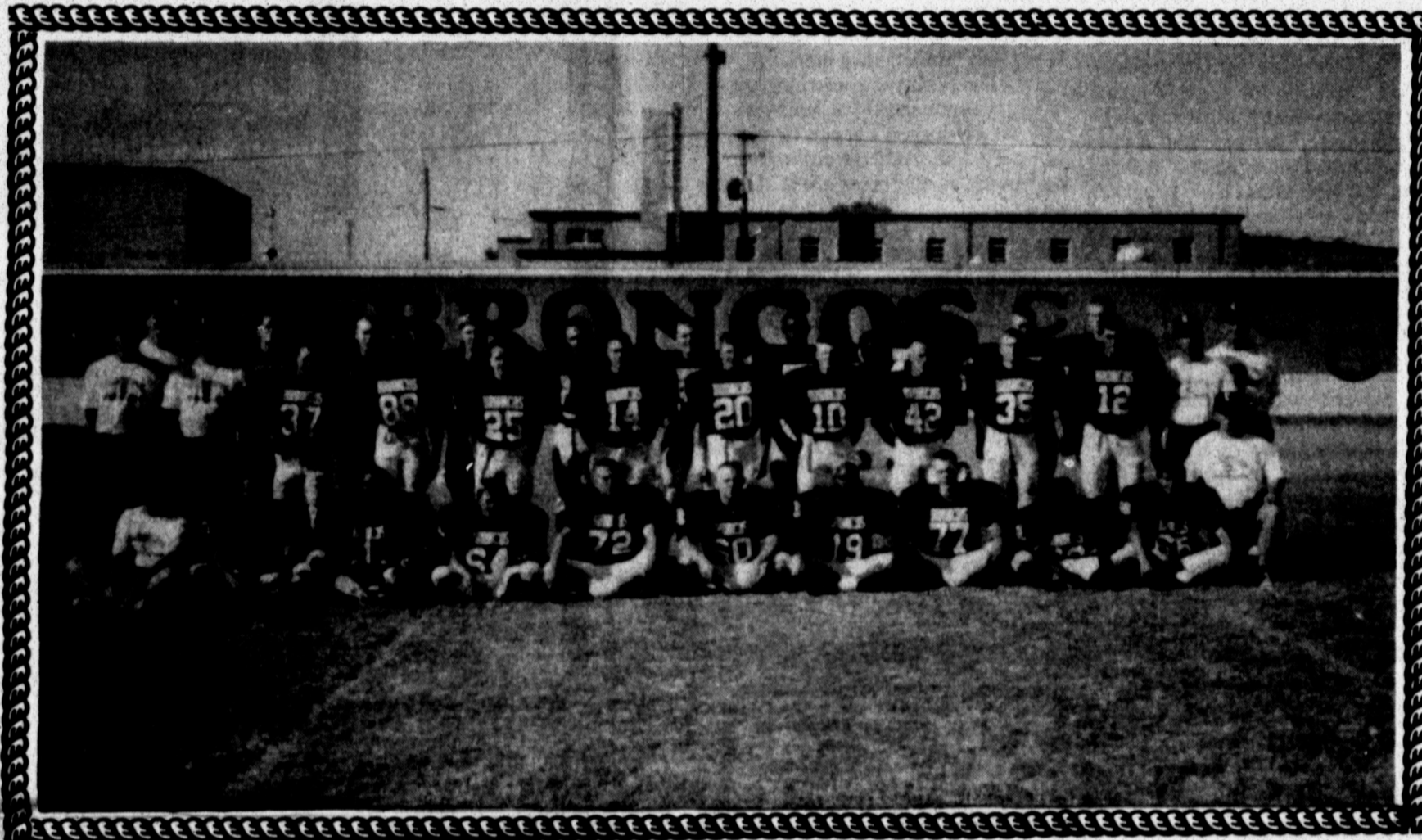
