Are you interested in volunteer work within the community? The Clarendon EMS Association is looking for people who are willing and interested in working with the Ambulance Authority.

The Clarendon EMS Association is a volunteer group of people who are interested in the welfare of the citizens of Donley County. They try to be dedicated to the people every time a call goes in for an ambulance to respond. They are looking for people with the same desire to serve. Their goal is to provide to this community the best care in the region. They are looking for people who are willing to help in this goal by helping during the day time.

The Association is in need of help during the day to help cover in the absence of personnel who have jobs that require them not to be able to respond during the day. If you are interested in helping you community, please contact and EMS personnel or leave your name and phone number at the Ambulance barn.

If you are interested in certification, there are four levels of certification that you can achieve. The first level is the ECA (Emergency Care Attendant) certification. This requires that you have a forty hour class of instruction on basic emergency medical care. The second is the EMT (Emergency Medical Technician). This certification requires one-hundred classroom hours, twenty hour in emergency room work and several ambulance runs. The other two levels of certification are EMT-I (Emergency Medical Technician Intermediate) and Paramedic. The EMT-I is more in-depth study than the EMT, and the Paramedic is the highest level of training in the EMS. All of these levels of training are state tested through the Texas Department of Health.

The Clarendon EMS Association and the Associated Ambulance Authority are looking for the people who care for this community and are willing to help. If you are interested, the Clarendon EMS Association holds its monthly meeting of the third Thursday of each month. You are welcome to attend and present your ideas or become a member. If you wish to help, please leave your name and address at the ambulance barn during the hours of 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, or contact any EMS member. This is your service, let's make it proud and strong.

Old Photos Needed

Austin- Dig into the attic and forgotten trunk. Resurrect the old handed-down picture albums and scrapbooks.

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) is interested in acquiring or copying historic photographs, documents, publications, or ephemeral items relating to the history of the Texas State Cemetery in Austin. Many of the cemetery's some 3,000 monuments, as well as the historic greenhouse and fountain, need repair and maintenance. Plans for restoration of the cemetery are now underway, and the THC is acting as a restoration advisor for the project.

According to Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who referred to it as the Arlington National Cemetery of Texas, the State Cemetery should rank among Texas' most cherished landmarks, and the condition of its monuments and other elements should reflect its status. After a recent visit to the cemetery, Bullock called for the cemetery's restoration, and directed numerous state agencies to oversee the work over several years.

"Early photographs, documents, and other materials would help make our research for a historically accurate restoration of the cemetery possible," said Gerron Hite, preservation architect with the THC. The materials also may be used for an exhibit in a visitor center that is being planned for the 18-acre graveyard that dates to the mid-19th century.

The Texas State Cemetery contains the graves and monuments of many of Texas' greatest

military leaders, pioneers, government officials, educators, and literary figures who contributed to the growth and history of Texas. The graves and monuments of Stephen F. Austin, Gen. Albert Sidney Johnston, William Alexander Anderson "Bigfoot" Wallace, and folklorist J. Frank Dobie are among them.

Check It Out

Oil, Taxes, and Cats: A History Of The DeVitt Family And The Mallet Ranch by David J. Murrah has been recently received at Burton Memorial Library with compliments of the CH and the Helen Jones Foundation in Lubbock, Texas. According to a notice received with the book, it was given to the library "in appreciation of the dedicated librarians and their library patrons who continually seek to enhance knowledge and pleasure through books."

The Mallet Ranch, which includes 50,000 acres of pastures; 5,000 acres of Farm land; and more than 1,000 oil wells, is located in the southwestern quarter of Hockley County, and was established in 1895 by David M. DeVitt. The author interestingly relates events from the time when the DeVitt brothers were sheepmen with a flock of more than 3,500 sheep in Midland County. Information concerning their journalism experiences, railway companies, and real estate ventures before gradually moving into the cattle business and oil stock purchases are also acknowledged. The book reveals worthwhile causes in Lubbock and the South Plains in which millions of dollars poured annually form the enormity of wealth from the Mallet Ranch.

After the death of D.M. DeVitt, age 78, Christine, his oldest daughter, was determined to continue the cattle business and handle the ranch which she did, regardless of a stormy decade of many conflicts. She is described in the book as obstinate, tough, caring, clever, spendthrift, generous, smart, and "just plain onery". She exhibited all of these characteristics at various times.

Oil, taxes and cats! Is there really a connection between these three subjects? You'll agree that Mr. Murrah did an excellent job of the combination in his book. It's an understatement to say that Christine was "just fond" of cats when you read about the houses she bought, especially, to shelter over

100 of the feline animals. It was stated that the first half of century of the Mallet Ranch's existence was predominantly cattle, and during the second half century, oil began to equal cattle in importance, thus, the reason for the word, "oil", in the title. As far as the inclusion of the word, "taxes",...well, that's just something you'll need to read and form your own opinion. Why not check it out?

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Dr. Dobson Answers Your Questions

QUESTION: Do you ever favor removing a child from one school to transfer him to another?

DR. DOBSON: Yes, there are times when a change of schools—or even a change of teachers within a school—can be in the child's best interest.

Educators are reluctant to approve these transfers, for obvious reasons, although the possibility should be considered when the situation warrants.

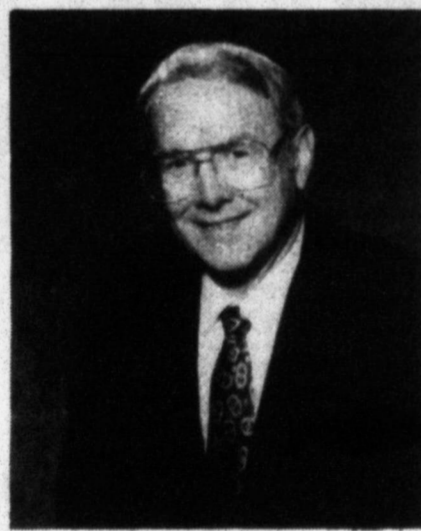
For example, there are occasions when a young student runs into social problems that can be resolved best by giving him a "clean start" someplace else. Furthermore, schools vary tremendously in their difficulty; some are located in higher socioeconomic areas where a majority of the children are much more intelligent than would ordinarily be expected. The mean IQ in schools of this nature may fall between 115 and 120.

What happens, then, to a child with average ability in such a setting? Although he might have competed successfully in an ordinary school, he is in the lower 15 percent at Einstein Elementary.

My point is this: success is not absolute, it is relative. A child does not ask, "How am I doing?" but rather, "How am I doing compared to everyone else?" Little Johnny may grow up thinking he is a dummy when he would have been an intellectual leader in a less competitive setting.

Thus, if a child is floundering in one academic environment for whatever reason, the solution might involve a transfer to a more suitable classroom.

QUESTION: I am an adult who is not coping so well with the problems of self-doubt. I feel ugly and unrespected and unworthy. What encouragement can you offer?



DR. DOBSON: Isn't it about time you made friends with yourself? Aren't there enough headaches in life without beating your skull against the old brick wall of inadequacy, year after year?

If I were to draw a caricature that would symbolize the millions of adults like you with low self-esteem, I would depict a bowed, weary traveler. Over his shoulder, I would place the end of a mile-long chain to which is attached tons of scrap iron, old tires and garbage of all kinds.

Each piece of junk is inscribed with the details of some humiliation: a failure, an embarrassment, a rejection from the past. He could let go of the chain and free himself from that heavy load which immobilizes and exhausts him, but he is somehow convinced that it must be dragged throughout life. So he plods onward, digging a furrow in the good earth as he goes.

You can free yourself from the weight of the chain if you will but turn it loose. Your inferiority is based on a distortion of reality seen through a child's eyes. The standards by which you have assessed yourself are themselves changing and fickle.

Dr. Maxwell Maltz, the plastic surgeon who authored *Psycho-*

Cybernetics, said women came to him in the 1920s requesting that their breasts be reduced in size.

In King Solomon's biblical love song, he asks his bride to overlook his dark skin that had occurred from exposure to the sun. In his day, right meant white. But now bronzed Solomon would be the pride of the beach. False values!

Modern women are ashamed to admit that they carry 10 extra pounds of weight, yet Rembrandt would have loved to paint their plump bodies.

Don't you see that your personal worth is not really dependent on the opinions of others and the temporal, fluctuating values they represent? The sooner you can come to accept the transcending worth of your humanness, the sooner you can come to terms with yourself.

I must agree with the writer who said, "While in the race to save our face, why not conquer inner space?" It's not a bad idea.
