from the County ASC Committee

Soil Bank - Conservation Reserve

To those farmers who have placed land in the Soil Bank Program, the county committee would like to urge each one of you to carefully carry out your part of the contract. Some of these things which you have agreed to are:

1. Not to harvest any crop(s) in any way from these acres during the life of the contract, unless authorized by the Secretary of Agriculture.

2. Not to graze or permit grazing or have stock on the leased land during the life of the contract.

3. Control of noxious weeds—cocklebur, Russian thistles, and sunflowers.

4. To establish and maintain on the leased acres a satisfactory cover during the time the government has the land leased.

5. Breaking out of land not classified as cropland without approval of the county committee and failure to restore the same acreage or an equal acreage of cropland on the farm to non-crop uses shall constitute a violation of the contract and will require forfeiture or refund of annual payment.

Change in Farm Operators

The end of the year is about here and many of the farms have changed owners or operators. If there has been a change in your operations, please advise the county office in order that the records can be kept current.

Checking Disposition of Acres in Excess of Wheat Allotment

A rate of \$4.00 per farm plus \$2.00 for each plot over one was set for checking disposition of acres in excess of wheat allotment.

A rate of \$5.00 per farm plus \$2.50 for each plot over one will be charged for remeasuring acreages which the farm operator believes to be in error.

The performance work for wheat will start about January 4th if weather permits.

Bulldogs Nip Hutchinson, 91-85

Clarendon's Bulldogs took the Hutchinson, Kansas, Blue Dragons into an overtime battle here last Wednesday night and finally came out with a hard fought 91 to 85 victory. Oscar Bronniman, sharp-shooting freshman from Adrian, sank a 20 foot jump shot with just four seconds left on the clock to bring the Bulldogs into a 79-79 tie at the end of the regulation game and sent the game into the overtime period.

Alva Carter, big center from San Jon, New Mexico, was outstanding for the Bulldogs as he made seven field goals and 12 free throws for a total of 26 points. He also gathered in 17 rebounds. Bobby Lesley, freshman from Hedley, made 23 points and was followed in the point production column by Felix Johnson with 13, Johnny Hudson with 11, Bronniman and H. D. Yarbrough with seven each and Jimmy Humphreys and Dee Blevins with two each. John Alexander played but failed to dent the score column.

The Blue Dragons smothered the Bulldogs under a 99 to 61 score at Hutchinson two weeks ago but the Bulldogs were ready for this one. This left the Bulldogs' season record at seven wins and two defeats. The two defeats both came on the Kansas road trip at the hands of Hutchinson and Pratt. The Bulldogs are building up quiet an impressive record on their home court. They have lost only one game at home during the past four seasons and are undefeated at home so far in the past three seasons.

The program committee for the Donley County Fat Stock Show met in the office of county agent H. M. Breedlove Tuesday night and set the premium list for the 1959 Donley County steer show which will be held at the Fair Building today (Thursday). C. L. Lewis presided at the meeting. Those present were C. L. Lewis, President, E. S. Ballew, Vice President, W. H. Cooke, Supt. of Shows, H. M. Breedlove, Secretary and Manager, Herman Boone, Jerry Hawkins, and J. R. Gillham. The board voted to have three classes of Hereford steers, three classes of Angus steers, one class of Short Horn steers and a group of two steers fed by one boy or girl.

The prize money for each class of Herefords, Angus and Short Horns was: First, \$10.00; 2nd, \$7.00; 3rd, \$5.00; 4th, \$3.00; 5th, \$2.00; 6th, \$2.00; and \$1.00 for the rest of the steers in the class. Each breed champion will receive \$5.00 and the reserve breed champion, \$2.00. The breed champions of each breed to compete for grand champion steer of the show and the reserve breed champion of the breed having the grand champion to move up to compete for reserve champion of the show. The grand champion steer will receive \$25.00 and the reserve champion will receive \$10.00. The judge is Richard Ligon of Texas Tech College.

All steers will be in the barn by ten a.m. The weighing committee is Chuck Longan, C. L. Lewis and W. H. Cooke, III. Each breed of steers, after weighing, will be average up and split in to three classes, with exception of short horn which will show in one class. Premium money for best group of two steers fed by one 4-H or FFA member is \$10.00, \$7.00, \$5.00, \$3.00, \$2.00, and \$1.00.

Approximately fifty-four steers will be in the county show with the judging starting at 1:00 p.m. 4-H and FFA members will leave for the Odessa Sand Hills Hereford show on January first at five a.m. and be gone one week.

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT

MORALS
This newsletter is being written after my arrival in Washington for a continuation of the Goldfine hearings. You will recall that Mr. Goldfine is the man who was under investigation last year because of alleged questionable practices in the operation of several businesses in purported violation of Federal laws. His activities in these businesses brought into the public limelight a number of public figures, including Mr. Sherman Adams, the Assistant President of the United States. You will also recall that shortly after the revelations uncovered by these hearings Mr. Adams ceased his connection at the White House as Assistant President. Mr. Goldfine's re-appearance was to permit him to answer eighteen questions which he had refused to answer at the previous hearings. His refusal to answer the questions resulted in his being indicted, tried, and convicted of contempt of Congress. The court gave Mr. Goldfine a jail sentence and a fine, but suspended the same on the condition that Mr. Goldfine answer the eighteen questions. In

other words, if Mr. Goldfine had refused to answer the questions he would unquestionably be remanded to jail and ordered to pay the fine. Therefore, he did come before the Subcommittee and answer the questions.
The answers to the questions proved to me that the corporations in question were not being operated in compliance with the laws with which other corporations are required to comply. They also proved to me that these activities had extended over a number of years. This of course gives rise to the further question of why such activities were permitted and who was interceding in high government circles to permit Goldfine to so operate. We attempted to get more information on this subject from Mr. Goldfine by trying to get him to tell us the names of the real parties in interest in the ownership of a valuable piece of business property in Boston. Mr. Goldfine refused to answer this question on the constitutional grounds that the answer thereto may tend to incriminate him. In other words, he pleaded the Fifth Amendment. In my opinion, there were a great many activities relating to the operation of these corporations and others operated through Mr. Goldfine and his associates which have not yet come to light. Under the circumstances, I think it is highly important that full information on this subject matter be revealed.
One of the most serious challenges that this country has faced in many years, and one that is equally as serious as Communism, is the decay in the moral standards that were so long the bedrock of our form of government. If Mr. Goldfine was allowed to exercise powers in high government places which were denied to others, no one can deny that such practice was immoral.

Certainly moral decay found in high government places could do more to destroy our way of life than anything else. It must be fully aired and cleaned up.
The many revelations of moral corruption that seems to be running rampant throughout our country is most frightening. The rigged T.V. quiz shows are a good example of what is happening in many areas of our country. The impact of what was uncovered in these hearings may serve as a warning to the American people of what can happen right before your eyes. One of the disturbing factors to me in this whole sordid mess is the attitude of some of the people who have been writing syndicated articles on the subject. One columnist, who referred to these quiz shows as shabby and fraudulent, took the position that because the public was not out of pocket anything, no one should complain. It is this kind of thing that makes one wonder if we have reached the point where fraud, in order to be fraud, must have a dollar-and-cent price tag on it. Apparently this columnist places no value on basic morals as such. This sort of thing would lead to the inevitable conclusion that it is all right to lie so long as you don't get caught. This country was not founded on that sort of thinking, nor will it survive on such. No one can deny that our moral standards have suffered measurably in the last

two decades, as is evidenced by the many scandals which have come to light in recent years, including the most recent New York meat scandals, fraudulent advertising procedures, gross misrepresentation of the value of products, the strenuous efforts on the part of some to flood the mails with salacious literature, the increasing crime rate, the juvenile delinquency problem, the questionable practices of government contractors and government individuals dealing with those contractors. These are only a few of the things which can be mentioned. It is much better that we be realistic about the whole situation and face up to it now, than to sweep it under the rug and permit it to continue to eat at the vital structure of our government.

In the words of a taxicab driver with whom I was riding the other day, "Things might be a lot better if everyone had stayed in a small town where everybody knows each other and you have to behave yourself."

There's no profit in having the right-of-way if the other fellow has a truck.

AUSTIN — As the year draws to an end, it appears Texas' big political question of the moment will not be answered until next year.

That is the question of whether the Legislature will be called into special session to raise teacher salaries.

Gov. Price Daniel has said that if he does call a session, it will not begin until after Feb. 1, filing deadline for the primaries. Next few weeks are to be spent in study and conferences with legislative leaders on possible methods of financing.

Governor Daniel said that in answer to his poll a majority of lawmakers (77 House members and 20 Senators) had written him they favored teacher raises. Many of these, however, attached "ifs" and "buts" that left considerably less than a majority in favor of plunging right into the task in a special session.

Fifty-four Representatives did not send answers to the governor, and it is generally assumed they do not favor a session.

Besides teacher pay, the governor said a special session would also be asked to raise money to pay for medical aid for people on the state welfare rolls. He will not call a session, said the governor, unless he feels

reasonably sure its tasks can be accomplished in the 30 days. But he isn't giving it up, he added, as long as it seems possible "with some hard work to get it over."

TOO LITTLE TIME? — Among those with doubts about the probable success of a special session is House Speaker Waggoner Carr.

In his answer to the governor's poll, Carr said he felt education was too important a subject "to be legislated upon under the extreme pressures of a . . . 30-day limitation."

Carr also called on the governor to spell out well in advance of any session the tax proposals he would submit so legislators would have time to talk them over with their constituents.

Governor Daniel shot back that he would submit, for one, the abandoned property bill which would allow the state to take over unclaimed funds held by banks, insurance companies and other firms. This bill was repeatedly voted down in the House earlier this year.

NO YEN FOR BENCH — Though his political future is not settled, Governor Daniel has definitely ruled out the possibility that he might become a state or federal judge.

There had been some specula-

tion that Daniel, who already has held a raft of high offices, might succeed retiring Chief Justice of the Supreme Court John E. Hickman or the late Jimmy Allred as a federal district judge.

Daniel said he great respect for the judiciary, but whether as public official or private citizen, he wouldn't want to be sidelined from the fight for "progress, good government and fair taxation."

He would not say that he would not run for governor or lieutenant governor.

"BOTTLE CLUBS" UNDER FIRE — For years Texas law against selling liquor by the drink has been no hindrance to the thousands who belong to "bottle clubs."

Serving of mixed drinks to members and guests of private clubs was assumed to be the same as serving liquor in the home.

But the thing has gotten out of hand, says Liquor Control Board Chairman Coke Stevenson, Jr. He said there are many clubs selling mixed drinks that are not private, non-profit clubs but are operated like business concerns to make money.

Stevenson and Atty. Gen. Will Wilson have announced a state-wide drive to close up the illegal clubs. Proposed new laws also are being drafted to define clearly what sort of club is legal. Present law neither bans nor recognizes "bottle clubs."

Private bars got started in the swank country clubs, then sprang up over the state in business and professional clubs. Individuals then started their own social clubs. It is the latter — the public "clubs" — which are

ADOPTION CASE CLOSED — State Supreme Court has made final its ruling in a case that some say may cause uncertainties in the legal procedure for adoption of babies of unwed mothers. It upheld the decision of a lower court in returning to its natural mother a child she had previously agreed to have adopted.

State Department of Public Welfare had requested a re-hearing in the case. Atty. Gen. Will Wilson, representing the department, said the ruling might result in more "black marketing" of babies.

STATE RELIEF DROPS — As more people become eligible for social security, the number of Texans seeking state old age pension is decreasing.

State Department of Public Welfare reported the number of old age pensioners dropped by 1,426 in the past fiscal year. Number of Texans receiving aid through the Welfare Department was 224,113, only about two-thirds of the 368,418 getting social security checks.

Total monthly welfare payments for the state were some \$11,685,333, compared with \$20,622,190 a month in social security.

CRIME RATE RISES — Texas' fast-growing cities seem to be surging ahead in crime faster than in almost any other area.

Houston had in the first nine months of the year 89 murders, same number as Los Angeles, four times as large a city.

Figures released by the Federal Bureau of Investigation showed these murder figures for Texas' ten top cities: Houston, 89; Dallas, 67; Fort Worth, 40; San Antonio, 37; El Paso, 15; Beaumont, 11; Lubbock, 10; Austin, 6; Corpus Christi, 5; Waco, 4.

SHORT SNORTS — Nineteen candidates will campaign through the holiday season in hopes of winning places in the Legislature Jan. 9. Four posts were vacated by resignations. Special elections usually attract many candidates, since the high man wins without a runoff . . . U.S. Dept. of Agriculture has estimated the 1959 Texas cotton crop at 4,500,000 bales. This is lower than previous estimates, but better than the 4,308,000 bales ginned in the state last year. Average yield per acre will be about 377 pounds . . . One-eighth, or six of the 48 persons executed for crimes in the U.S. last year, were executed in Texas. California, Georgia and Ohio also had six executions each. So far this year Texas has had only three execu-
