AUSTIN - Typical of the tangle of interests and viewpoints that confront Texans when they set out to "solve the water problem" is the current hassle over Trinity River water.

Trinity development poses special problems. This second largest river in Texas (in volume of water) has a 455-mile channel that meanders through or near three major population centers-Fort Worth, Dallas and Houston. All are directly concerned, not to mention the smaller cities along the way.

In the current hearing before the State Board of Water Engineers, Houston nad the Trinity River Authority jointly seek permits to build two dams, both near Houston. One would be a reservoir at Livingston; the other, a salt water barrier at Wallisville.


