

Long Range Management Plans Should Be Made Now

Rangelands have improved greatly during the past three years. Most areas have received above average precipitation which has usually come at the right time. The sunflower stage of 1957 has passed which was followed by the winter weeds stage. This too has passed and almost everywhere the perennial grasses are covering up the ground.

Now is the time for ranchers to start thinking seriously about long range management plans. How about the need for cross fences to divide pastures that are too large? Water facilities should be checked to see if they are adequate for the proper dis tribution of cattle. A properly located pond might stop gully erosions as well as supply needed water for livestock. If there are bare or nearly bare areas around watering locations or near the headquarters maybe rotary pitting along with range seeding would be the answer. Grasses are much easier to establish during the wet cycles than during a drought. Brush control each of these grasses he has in a poor season. should be planned.



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
