

All manner of organizations, representing farmers, manufacturers, motorists, truckers and others have bone on record in opposition. Their case is a powerful one. To begin with a 41/2 cent federal tax imposed on top of the average state tax of 6 cents would mean a total 101/2 cent tax. That, as a researcher points out, would amount to 92 per cent of the refinery price of gasoline, 64 per cent of the tank wagon price, and 48 per cent of the retail price Even extreme luxuries do not carry so heavy a tax-much less an absolute necessity.

If all the federal taxes collected from special levies on highway users were allocated to the highway fund, where they manifestly belong, the deficit would be eliminated. In the last fiscal year these special taxes totaled \$3.6 billion. But \$1.5 billion-42 per cent-went for nonhighway federal functions. This heavy diversion brings on the deficits.

Congress should vote down the proposed tax increase-or stretch out the construction program so that available funds are adequate to do the job.






