FARM EFFICIENCY AND FARM INCOME

Efficiency is essential to continued success in any business but increased efficiency has not provided farmers an equitable

For example, between 1950 and 1958, output per farm worker increased 26 percent. During the farm income dropped from \$983 to \$967 and per capita income for even more from \$751 to \$658.

The trouble is, of course, that increased efficiency on the farm has little influence on many off the farm forces which determine the economic pattern in which farmers operate.

SOIL BANK CONSERVATION

Before you can receive costshare for re-seeding Conservation Reserve acres, you must get the approval from the County Committee. Be sure and bring your sales receipts for the seed you plant on your Conservation Reserve acres and also tag, showing the purity and germination. ATTENTION COTTON

FARMERS Producers are urged to remember that the Government support rates do not apply on any farm that is in excess of that particular farm's cotton allotment. If this farm remains overplanted then it will be considered a penalty farm and will require a payment per pound on the yield of the excess acreage. This penalty payment rate has not been set as of this date. The 1958 rate was 19.3 cents per pound of lint cotton.

This is a reminder that we started measuring cotton June 8 and will measure as many farms as possible before July 1st.

Each farm operator or his representative will be expected to assist the reporter in making the measurement since he will be required to use a steel tape as we are not allowed to use a measuring wheel in checking compliance Morning Prayer and Sermon | Also, we would like to point out the importance of measuring





For the vast majority of Texans, odds have probably increased state, or local officials. since January 1, that the bird they select will not have been inspected for wholesomeness.

This state of affairs developed when the federal government, effective on the first day of this year, made it mandatory that all poultry products shipped across a state line must first be checked for wholesomeness by a federal

What this means is obvious: Texas poultry products which are not of sufficient quality to pass federal inspection and subsequent out-of-state marketing are going to be marketed at

Texas has no mandatory statewide inspection law for poultry. Rather, it has legal provisions whereby a poultry plant can voluntarily-and that's the key work-arrange for inspection services and thereby win the right to atttach an official legend of approval on wholesome birds.

You're lucky if you happen to live in Houston, Pecos, Wichita Falls, Midland, or Brenham. Of all Texas cities only these five presently are known to have local ordinances prohibiting the sale of uninspected poultry products.

Similar ordinances are pending in Tyler, Lubbock, Amarillo, Odessa. Waco, and Big Springs. Every other city in the State faces the possibility of becoming a dumping ground for unfit

Under present circumstances, the only way a city can be sure the consuming public is not being victimized is by spelling out in ordinance the fact that all poul-

So-called "spot checks" won't do. Adequate, health protecting inspection of poultry means having a trained, full-time man in the plant.

Housewives shopping for poultry can tell if the bird they chose has been inspected by looking for a tag showing "Inspected and Passed" by the agency which made the check.

Don't mistake the large wing tag reading "Grade A" to mean the bird has been inspected for wholesomeness. It may or it may
