





that in a baseball game the players are salaried, while the contestants in a television quiz program are after prizes. I must confess these reasons do not make sense to me as being even remotely connected with the question of honesty and dishonesty. The fact of the matter is that the American public has been led to believe these quiz programs were fair and honest contests between two unrehearsed contestants in a battle of wits or mentality. A boxing match is a physical contest between two individuals who employ their fists, under certain rules. The physical activities coupled with the mental processes could be applied to all other contests. They are all performed at least partially for entertainment. The American public is entitled to assume that neither of the contestants has been afforded an unfair advantage. Any arrangement creating a contrary situation is a fraud upon the spectators, whether they be sitting in the stands of a football stadium or in a comfortable chair in their living room watching television, and any person who is a party to such a scheme or device, whether he be the owner of the show, the sponsor, the network, the station owner, or a contestant is guilty of a flagrant, dishonest misrepresentation to the viewers of the contest or the program. The main concern of a number of these people seems to be the possibility of criminal prosecution, rather than their moral responsibility and obligation. It is entirely possible they may not be held criminally liable because of the absence of particular statutes on this subject. However, it is my belief these hearings will result in the adoption of legislation which will control the activities of those who seem to believe that anything is all right as long as you can get away with it. in 1957. Estimates prepared by the Agricultural Marketing Service show that Texas ranks 1st among states in realized net farm income Realized net is the income farm operators have to spend after paying their production expenses Average realized net income

per farm in Texas amounted to 3,430 in 1958, compared with \$1,774 in the preceding year. The Texas farm operators ranked 17th among the states in realized net income per farm. Farm operators in Texas built up inventories of crops and live-

stock in 1958 by \$46.4 million. When realized net income is adjusted to allow for the change in inventories, the total net farm income of Texas operators was \$1,047.9 million. It was \$719.1 million in 1957.

Cash receipts from sales of farm commodities yielded Texas farmers \$2,372.6 million in 1958 compared with \$1,702 million in 1957. Government payments to farmers totaled \$122.2 million, \$9.5 million more than in the preceding year. The gross farm income of Texas farmers amounted to \$2,684.3 million in 1958, a loss of \$697.7 million from 1957. 




