The Clarendon Junior College Bulldogs will meet the powerful Hutchinson, Kansas, Junior College here next Wednesday night. Game is scheduled to begin at 8:00 o'clock. This will be the second meeting of the two teams this year. The Bulldogs played at Hutchinson on Tuesday night of this week but the results were not in at press time. Hutchinson is rated No. 7 in the nation among junior colleges so far as basketball strength is concerned. They finished fourth in the National Tournament last year and have a number of their starting players returning this year. The Bulldogs won their fifth straight game without a defeat here last Friday night when they took a convincing 84 to 57 victory from Lamar, Colorado, Junior College. They played Pratt, Kansas, on Monday night of this week before meeting Hutchinson on Tuesday night. They also play Midwestern University "B" team at Wichita Falls on Friday night of this week. Lamar offered the Bulldogs little opposition last Friday night as Coach Young cleared his bench in the last half and gave all the boys a chance to play. Every player on the Bulldog roster scored as H. D. Yarbrough led with 15 points. All the Bulldogs looked good in the game, but Yarbrough, Oscar Bronniman, Johnny Hudson, Bobby Lesley, and Dee Blevins looked especially good. Coach Young will take his Bulldogs to Big Spring on Dec. 31 where they will enter the Howard County Junior College Tournament along with seven other teams. Their first opponents will be Wharton County College. The next home game following the Hutchinson game next Wednesday will be on Jan. 5 with Sayre, Oklahoma, Junior College.

111 Motorcides Predicted For Holidays

One-hundred and eleven persons will die violently in Texas traffic accidents during the forthcoming Christmas - New Year holiday if predictions released today by the Texas Departments of Public Safety hold true.

The ominous forecast came from Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Department of Public Safety, for a 12 day period extending from 12:01 a.m. Dec. 23, through 11:59 p.m. Jan. 3.

The 111 predicted motorcides are included in an estimate made by Department Statistician N. K. Woerner, which indicates that 200 persons will die in violence during the period. The breakdown is as follows: Motorcides, 111; homicides and suicides, 47; accidental deaths non-traffic, 42; grand total, 200.

Colonel Garrison named several reasons for the prediction that this years holiday period will be one of the most deadly for Texas motorists in several years.

"This Christmas - New Year's holiday is expected to be one of the most dangerous for drivers that we have experienced for some time. Not only is the holiday period longer in the number of days it covers, but this has been a prosperous year for driv-

ers and more cars are on the road.

"This year's accident rate is running considerably ahead of that of last year and we can naturally expect this trend to carry throughout the holidays. One factor adds to our dim forecast. Both Christmas Day and New Year's day fall on Friday, mak-

ing two extra long week ends within the holiday period.

"The best I can say is that I hope we are wrong. We can be wrong if Texas motorists will take common sense precautions in driving."
