Allergy Season Approaching

It is allergy season again and parents will want to look for the "allergic salute" -- a sure sign that their child has allergic rhinitis or "hay fever," and not just a common cold.

The "salute," a rapid rubbing of the nose and eyes, is one sign the parents can watch for as trees begin to spread their pollen this allergy season, says a Baylor College of Medicine allergy expert.

"While allergies usually run in families, many parents may not recognize the symptoms," said Dr. Stuart Abramson, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor. "Early detection can pay off, because untreated conditions sometimes lead to significant illness. Recurrent sinus and ear infections, sleep problems, behavior problems, and jaw pain can all be symptoms of untreated allergic rhinitis."

Abramson says that allergic rhinitis in children is often confused with colds, since their symptoms are similar.

"A runny nose, red watery eyes, sneezing, a sore throat -- these can result from a common cold, or they can be warning signs of allergic reaction," he said. "The main difference is that children with allergic rhinitis have an unusually high amount of sneezing and itching in the nose."

Wheezing, too can be a sign of allergic reaction to airborne pollen, and should be taken seriously, he added, since nearly 80 percent of all children with asthma have seasonal or year-round allergies. This can cause an asthma attack, a potentially life-threatening condition, if not treated properly.

Allergic reactions can be divided into three categories.

Those that occur in the nose or sinus are called sinus, hay fever, or allergic rhinitis. If in the chest, it can trigger asthma. Allergic reactions of the skin are called hives.

Allergic rhinitis occurs when the child breathes in airborne allergens such as tree pollen. In allergy-sensitive people, the body produces an antibody to the pollen. This eventually leads to the release of histamine, a substance that reacts to the "invasion" of the pollen, which sets off a chain of events such as sneezing, itching, and red watery eyes.

Children 3 and older can be tested for sensitivity to airborne allergens if they display symptoms. Treatment can include decongestants and antihistamines for mild cases and allergy shots for more

severely affected patients.

"The big advance today is inhaled medications," he said. "They can often control inflammation of the nose and lungs."

New treatments include steroids such as topical nose sprays, and non-sedative antihistamines, which are given orally to children 12 and older.

Abramson says that it is not known why people have allergies, although it is hereditary.

"It does run in families, although not every child who has allergies has parents with allergies. That is why it is important for parents to know the signs," he said.

Travel Safety Tips

School's out and children are running and playing everywhere. Trooper L. Snider also reminds us that with our city driving, we need to be especially watchful for our children. "With the excitement of playing, children seem to forget the rules of safety and sometimes

dart into the street in pursuit of a misguided toy or ball. While driving in our residential areas be especially watchful for our smaller children," he said.

"In order to make this an accident free summer vacation, we need to take a more mature attitude towards safe driving. Let us all remember to slow down a little and live a lot by driving defensively each and every day this summer while school is out!" he added.

Open House Scheduled

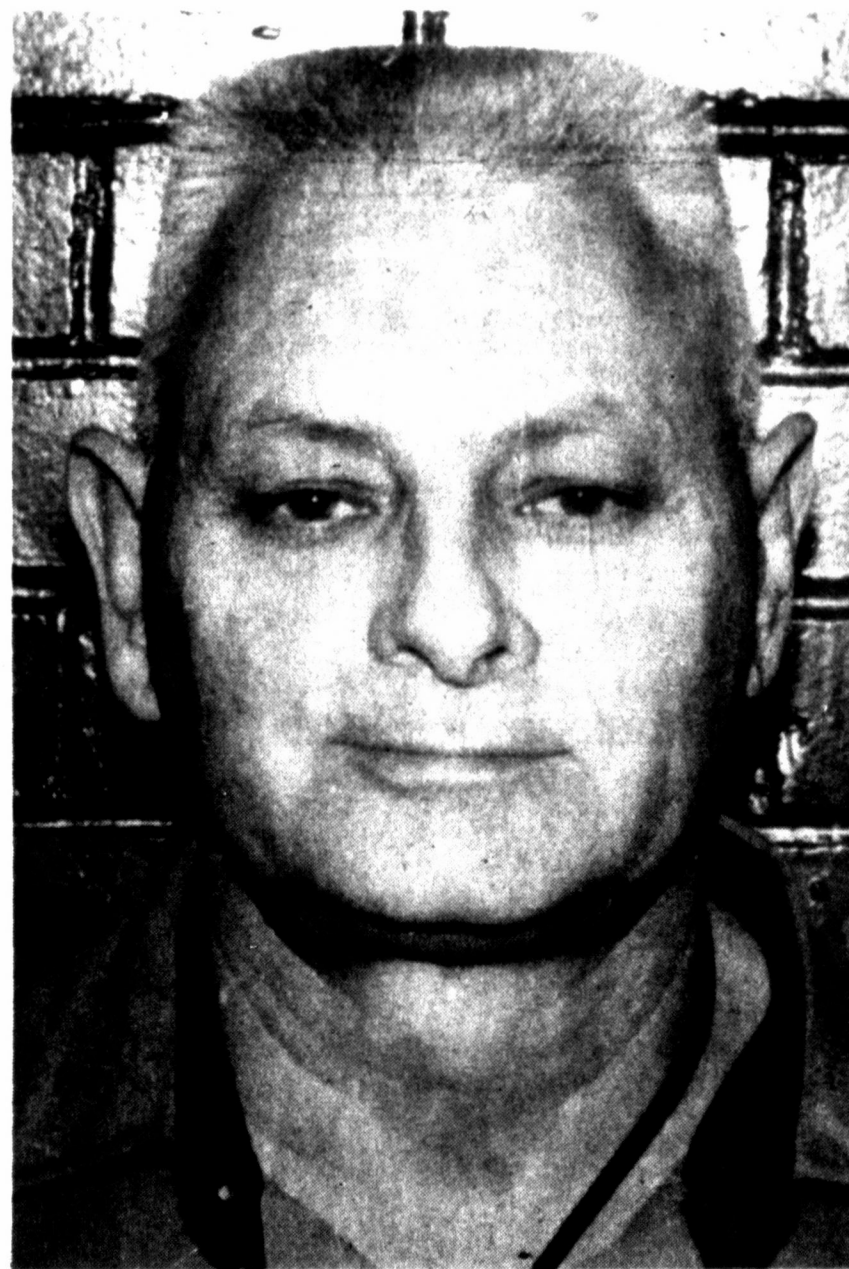

Former Coach To Retire

Carl W. Irlbeck of Plainview, Texas will be retiring from coaching. Carl coached boys and girls basketball in Clarendon from 1966-1971. He took the boys to the State Championship in 1969 and 1970. He also coached boys and girls tennis and took teams to Regional and boys tennis to state 4 years in a row 1967, 1968, 1969 and 1970. In 1980 he led Abernathy's boys basketball to a state title and girls tennis for three years ('79,'80,'81). He took the boys' tennis team to state seven years. His boys' Cross Country team from Abernathy won State Champion in 1970. He has just been named TABC Coach of the Year for the State of Texas.

Newspaper Prices to Increase

For more than six years, every issue of the Clarendon paper has been 40 cents. Now, to keep up with rising costs, the paper will raise its rates, beginning June 1, the paper will cost 50 cents.

Bob Williams, publisher of the paper, said, "I regret that this is necessary, but the expenses associated with getting the paper out

have increased considerably in the past 10 years."

Subscription prices will also go up. Williams pointed out the drastic in the charges of the United States Postal Service. "In 1989 the paper took a check to the Post Office each week for \$40. Now that figure is about \$90." In-county subscriptions have been \$16.50 and out-of-county rates were \$20 per year. The new figures are \$18.50 and \$22.50. However, the

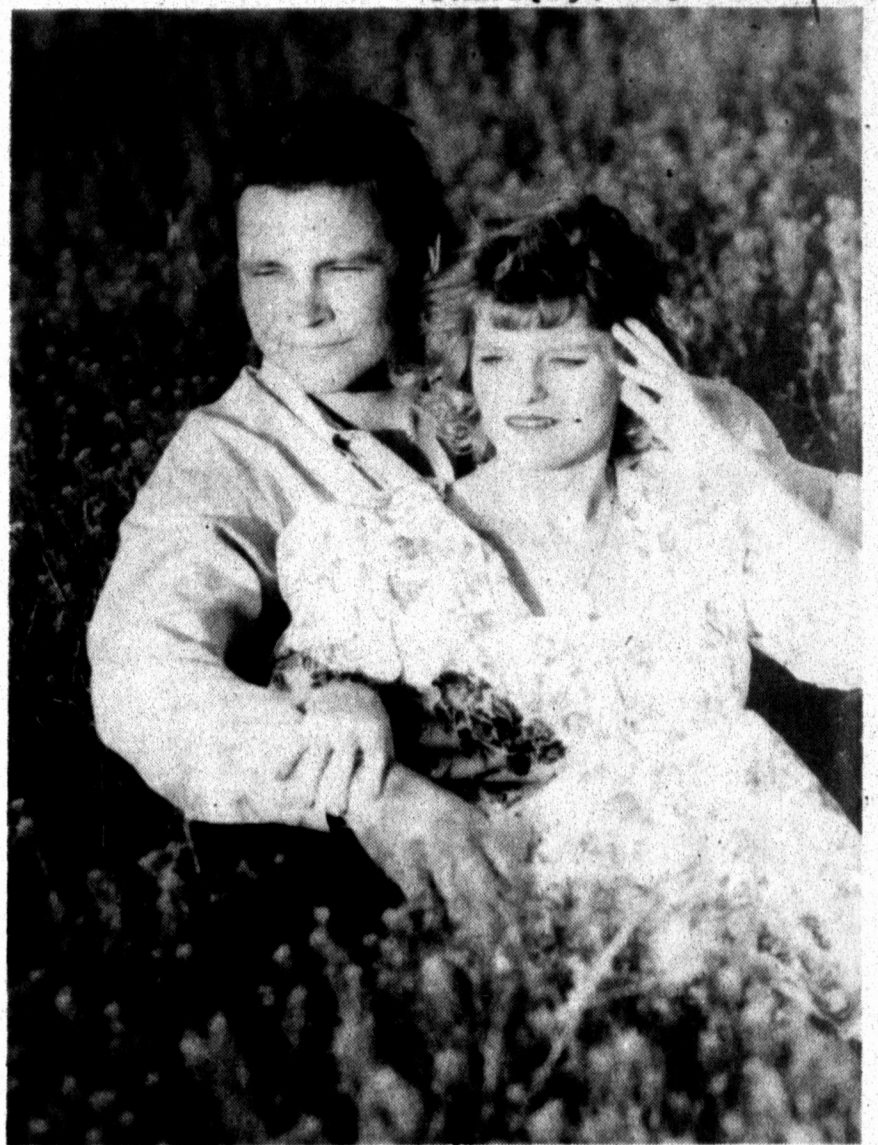
Museum News

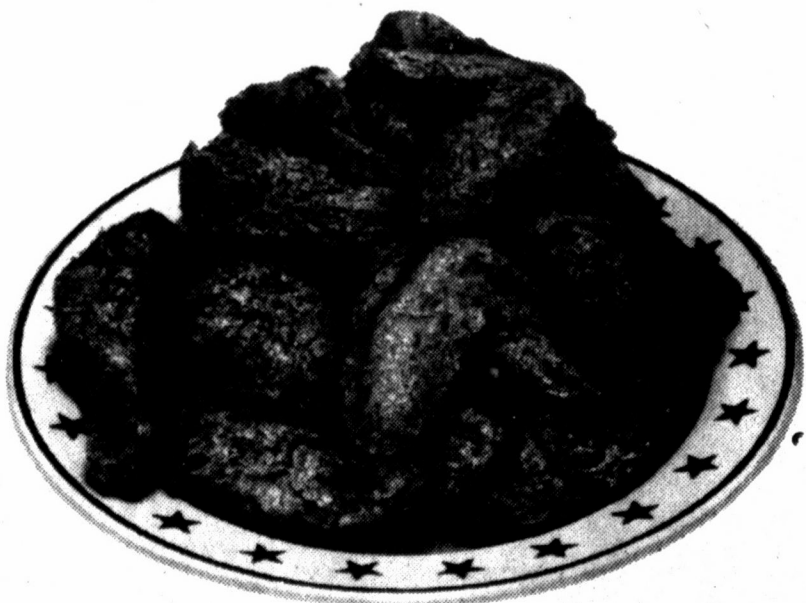

Check It Out

Can a weed possibly be beautiful? Before you respond with an automatic NO, *Decorating With Texas Naturals* by Quentin Steitz, found in Burton Memorial Library, is likely to change your mind. Ms. Steitz has brilliantly combined interesting information, accompanied by 150 full color photos, about 44 Texas plants. Grasses, pods, vines, and weeds are included. Early and prime stages of each plant's growth, with photographs, followed by design

and notes of interest make up the format of the book. If floral arrangements are your interest, you'll be especially delighted with the "design section". Not only does it offer unusual suggestions for outstanding decorative creations you would be proud to display in your home, but a full page color photograph on the opposite page allows you to see the finished product. The lines and shapes of the plants are artistically complimented by the lines and shapes of elegant vases and other types of containers. I occasionally use trumpet vine flowers in summer and early fall bouquets, but I never thought of using the pod capsules in an arrangement. On page 77, the pods have been placed in an ornate vase, resulting in a most unique style every bit as lovely as the florals. You nature lovers are bound to be intrigued by the contents of this book which is part of the library's Texas Collection.

Last week is the first time I have browsed through the Texas books in awhile. Librarians, Mary Linn Bills and Mary Green, have attractively arranged this collection in the northwest corner of the


library. New books are continually being acquired. The Quentin Steitz book previously described as one of the newest arrivals along with *Trails to Texas* by Terry G. Jordan; *Land of Bright Promise; Texas, A Modern History* by David G. McComb; a biography of *Mary Austin Holley*; and Nigel Pride's *Crow Man's People* which was written after Mr. Pride recently spent three seasons living with the Navajo Indians in Arizona. More than 300 tantalizing recipes have been contributed to *Taste of Texas Cook Book* edited by Jane Trahey. Comments from contributors and the author's introductory descriptions before each "category" also provide interesting reading.

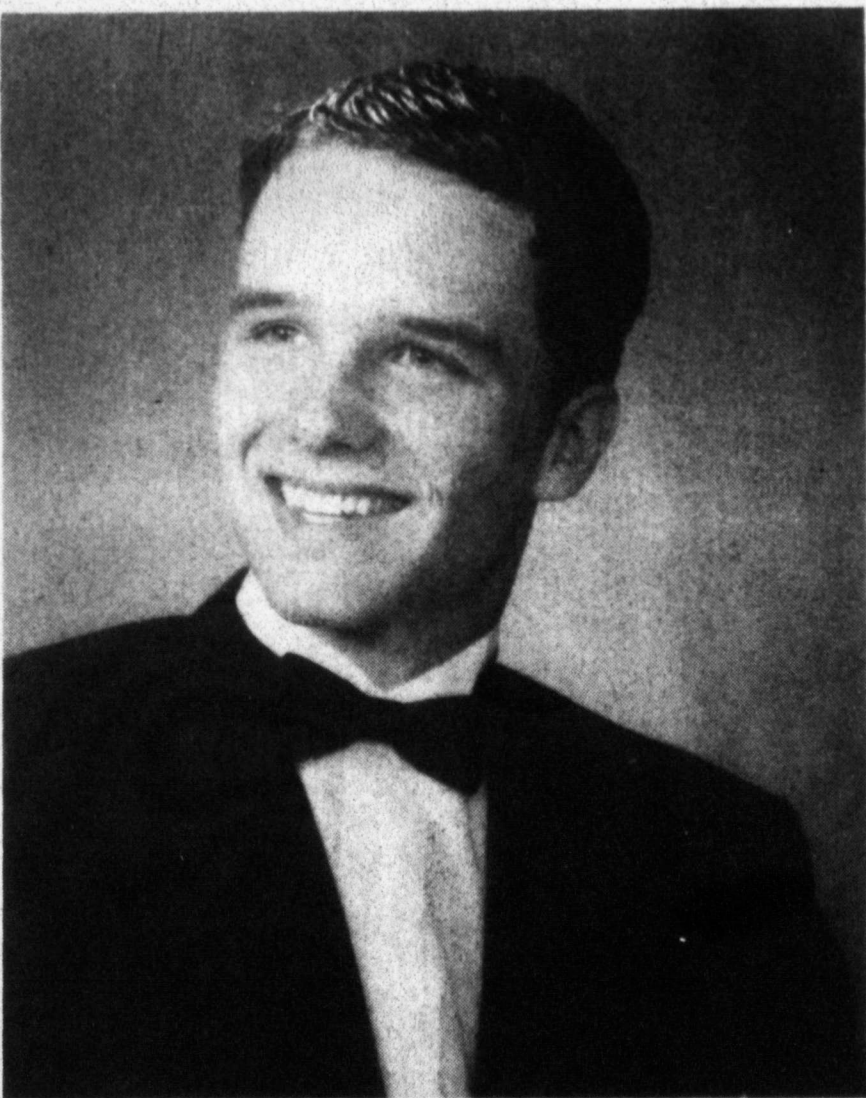

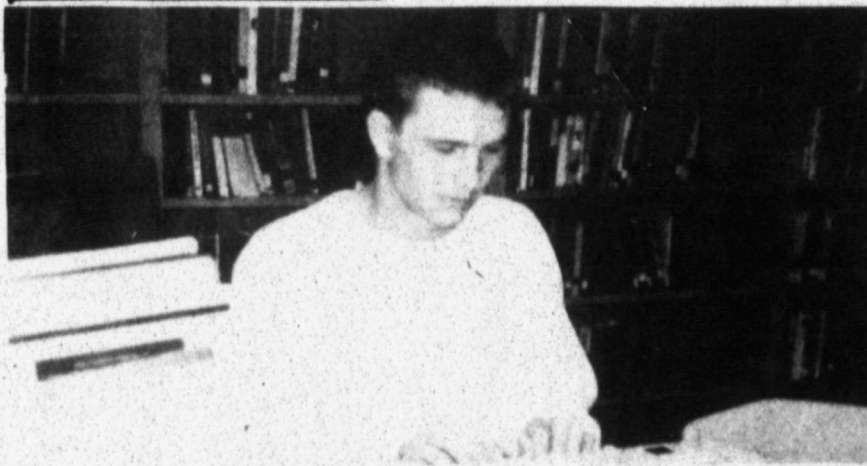

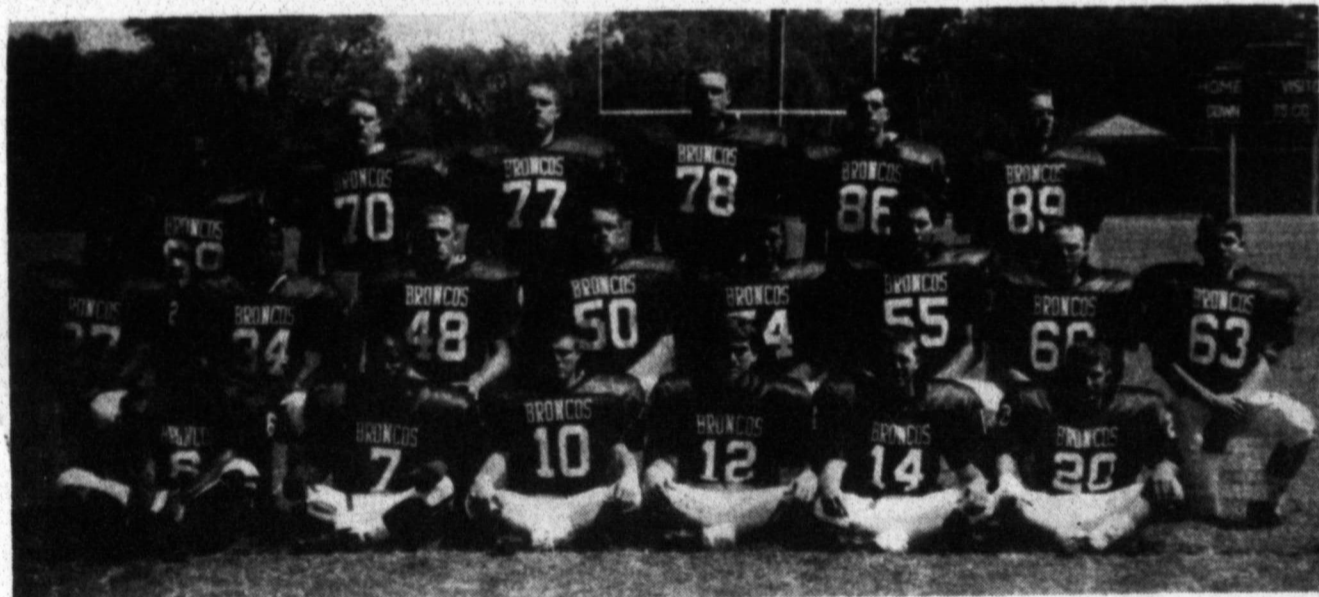

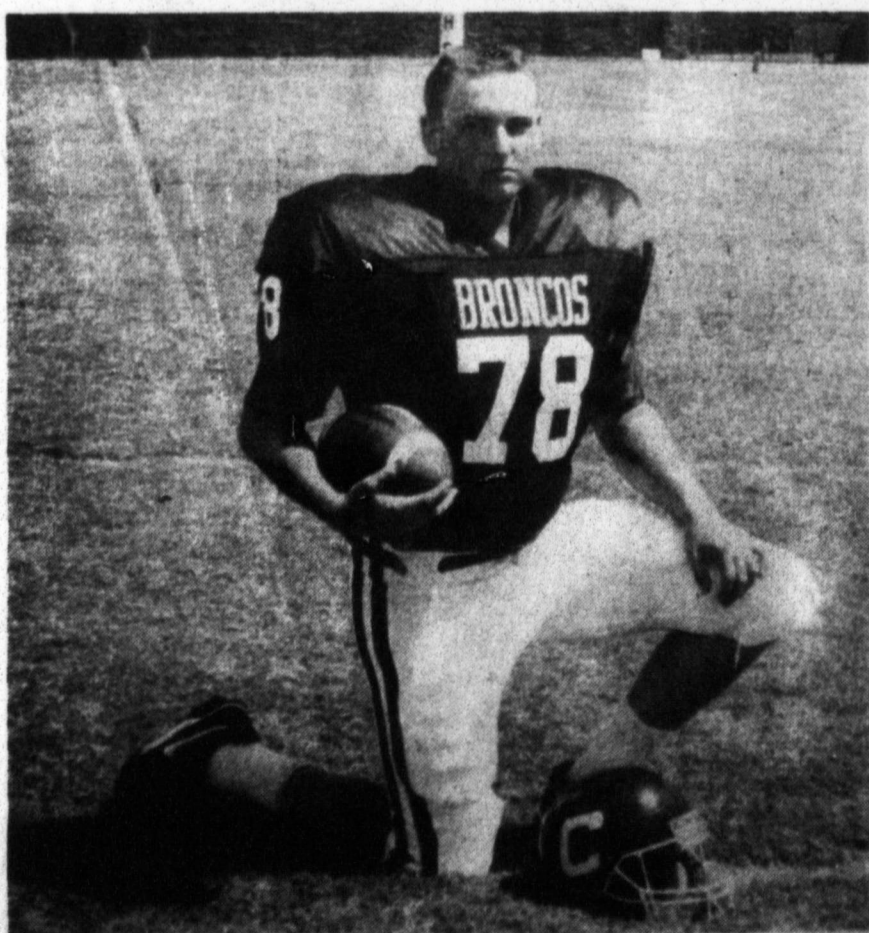

Music, Arts Education Stage Comeback With New National Standards
Local Action Needed for Success, Supporters Say

(NU) - It is impossible to estimate the number of children who might have grown up without receiving the benefits that music and arts education provide. But it could have been millions had it not been for the efforts of concerned individuals and organizations.

The National Coalition for Music Education has fought against seemingly impossible odds to reestablish the importance of music and arts education in American schools, because according to Jack Schechinger, president of the American Music Conference, for even one child to have to go without these benefits would have been too many.

A major victory has been won

through the establishment of the National Standards for Arts Education, part of the initiative outlined in the Goals 2000: Educate America Act. The arts standards were presented in March to Secretary of Education Richard Riley. They describe what every U.S. schoolchild should know and be able to do in music, dance, theater and the visual arts at the completion of grades 4, 8 and 12.

The Work Is Not Over
There is still much to be done to end the lingering national educational crisis in music and the other arts.

"These standards are national in name only," explained Dr. John Mahlmann, executive director of the

Music Educators National Conference (MENC). "They are intended to raise the quality of arts education throughout the United States, but they can only do that if they are adopted and implemented in virtually every American school district."

MENC and others are calling for parents, teachers, school officials and other concerned citizens to convince their state legislatures and state and local boards of education to implement the standards in their schools.

There is good reason to do so, supporters say.

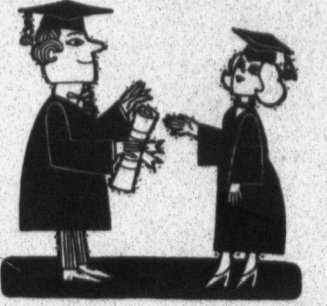
Research demonstrates that arts education can "improve a child's overall academic performance" and is "especially effective in enhancing self-esteem and self-discipline," according to Dorothy Straub, president of MENC.

Researchers also have found that music programs can enhance problem-solving and decision-making skills. And recent findings suggest

that music may be a necessary "nutrient" that can help develop abstract thinking skills, which can affect the entire educational process.

"If the public responds to the new standards," said Schechinger, "we can go from being a nation that is overall deficient in music and other arts education for all children to one that is incomparable," he said.

Anti-Smoking Efforts Focus on Teens

(NU) - More than one-fourth of U.S. high school students smoke and the rate is gradually increasing. In bygone days, teen smoking was considered a social problem. Today, however, research has shown it to be a matter of life and death.

Experts agree that the earlier a person begins to smoke, the more likely the habit will result in premature disease and death.

That's one of the alarm bells sounded by a new radio documentary, "Teens and Smoking," which follows U.S. Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders' acknowledgment that young people who smoke are far more likely to abuse drugs and be sexually promiscuous.

In the documentary, a number of prominent experts outline the devastating results of smoking on young people and their families.

The report continues a series, "Times and Seasons," produced by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and distributed free to about 750 radio stations and to schools, service clubs and community organizations. Earlier documentaries in the 30-part series have focused on numerous social problems, including drug addiction, child abuse and religious tolerance.

The documentary's producers counter that message by reporting on how young nonsmokers are "turned-off" by the tobacco odor and stained teeth of potential dating partners.

Experts discuss how tobacco has been shown to be a gateway to other drugs. One specialist describes how secondhand smoke can harm children and others in a household even if they never smoke themselves.

Also featured is "Jeff," a former smoker who took up the habit at 15, but has since gone through the painful process of overcoming his addiction. Despite Jeff's success, only 1.5 percent of teens who start smoking are reportedly able to quit the habit.

Other findings include:

- The lower the education, the higher the smoking rate.
- Poor self-esteem contributes to young people smoking.
- Although selling tobacco to minors is illegal, the law is rarely enforced.

Authorities interviewed, such as Allen Davis, a vice president of the American Cancer Society, say that educational efforts and parental example can prevent young people from taking up smoking.

They also say personal commitment and motivation can help those already addicted to give up the habit.

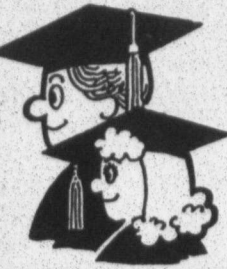

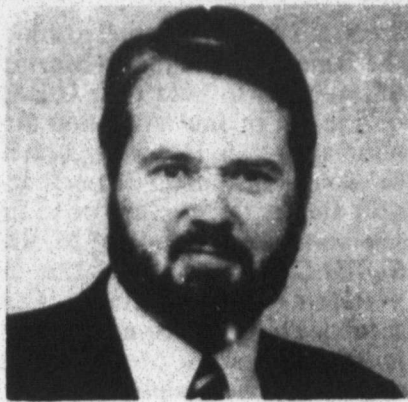
Public Notice

On March 23, 1994, GTE and Contel ("The Companies") filed applications with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC") to restructure the Companies' Switched Transport rate category and reduce the Carrier Common Line (CCL) charge of its Switched Access Service. The tariff sheets in GTE and Contel's applications, if approved, will bring the Companies' state access tariffs into structural parity with their interstate tariffs for the Local Transport rate category, which became effective on December 30, 1993.

GTE and Contel propose to implement the new tariffs on a revenue neutral basis. The Local Transport category of GTE and Contel's Switched Access Service is primarily for interexchange carriers.

Schwarzkopf's Suggestions

You must have clear goals and you must be able to present them plainly. I'm glad Schwarzkopf put this high on the list.

Give yourself a clear agenda: Every morning write down the five most important things you want to accomplish that day.

Let people know where they stand: The grades you give the people you report to you must reflect reality.

Set high standards. Too often we don't ask enough of our people. People generally won't perform above your expectations so it's important to expect a lot.

Though the general didn't say it, he sets the standard by example. Most leaders do.

Lay the concept out, but let your people execute it: Step back and allow your people to own their work.

People come to work to succeed. Schwarzkopf doesn't feel that you need to watch people closely.

Never lie, ever. All it serves to do is undermine your credibility with your people.

When in charge, take command: Leaders are often called to make decisions without adequate information.

they should make a decision, monitor the results and change course if necessary.

Do what's right: Schwarzkopf said, "The truth of the matter is that you always know the right thing to do.

It's Easier to Succeed than to Fail was written by Truett Cathy, founder of the Chick-fil-A Company. Cathy is known in the fast food industry as a man of faith and principle.

This book is an easy read. If you enjoy reading about ordinary folks who become successful in business, and if you really want to succeed, pick up a copy and invest a couple of hours of your time.

How To Succeed Cathy includes the following exchange in the introduction of the book:

A highly successful person was asked, "How did you become successful?"

He replied, "By making the right decisions."

"How did you know which decisions to make?" was the next question.

"By the experiences I've had."

"How did you gain experience?"

"By making bad decisions," he responded.

Over the years, I've observed the lives of many very successful people. They are not lucky, they are not perfect, and most will readily admit to making many mistakes.

The winners learn from failure, grow because of dis-

appointments and most of all stay focused on success. They eventually win because they put into action what they learn.

Cathy boils his more than 40 years of business success into three key ingredients:

- 1)You have to want to succeed and you must be willing to make sacrifices along the way. 2)You have to develop know-how. Cathy supports formal education as an important part of this process. 3)Finally, he says, you have to do it.

Other Success Thoughts

Here are some other success tips from Cathy's book: To succeed try this suggestion for success: Save 10 percent, give 10 percent, work 10 percent harder.

Associate yourself only with those people you can be proud of whether they work for you or you work for them.

Learn to love your work, and you'll never have to work again.

Winners concentrate on winning. Losers concentrate on getting by.

Ideas come from God. They are pleasant and exciting, but they won't keep. They have to be acted on.

We make a living by what we get...But we make a life by what we give.

It's always easier to dismiss a person than to train him. No great leader ever built a reputation on firing people.

We never realize our greatest potential until we perform at our very best.

Perhaps the most important theme you'll find woven throughout the book is this one: We glorify God in our successes rather than our failures.
