
Clarendon College Holds Graduation

Bugbee's Work To Be Featured

The historic mural cycle in Pioneer Hall at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon is one of the most unique in Southwest, according to PPHM Curator of Art Michael R. Grauer. In honor of the sixtieth anniversary of the completion of Harold Dow Bugbee's first Museum Mural, The Cattleman, and to acknowledge Bugbee's achievements with public art, the PPHM will open "H.D. Bugbee: Mural Painter" on Saturday, May 14. The exhibit will open in conjunction with the 73rd Annual Meeting of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society.

Bugbee's illustrations and easel painting are well known; however, he had an equally auspicious career as a mural painter. This exhibition examines this facet of the artist's career. using sketches, studies, and actual murals, as well as letters pertaining to various mural commissions, the exhibition will discuss murals in general and probe Bugbee's mural-making



The drinking and all that went with it became a source of mental and emotional abuse. For Celia, the inner suffering and turmoil became unbearable.

The man refused to leave home and would not let her leave. Even if she had tried, he would have gone after her and brought her

Celia could not change him or her circumstances. The hopelessness that once camped on her doorstep now moved in with all its baggage of despair and depression. She could not take it anymore.

Thoughts of another kind of escape entered her mind. How nice it would be to leave her body and float up to be in heaven with the angels. He would never be able to chase after her and find her there.

One night, just after midnight fifty-nine years ago, this young mother reached over and kissed her little baby girl good-bye. She inched her way to the door and stepped out into the cold blackness of the night.

The love of the small life she left behind was not great enough to overcome the pain of desperation she felt inside.

Only those who have experienced this situation can know of the struggle that tormented Celia as she walked her last mile of life

Reaching her destination in the middle of the bridge, Celia turned and gripped the railing before daring to look below.

The ugly muddy waters of death terrified and yet seduced her at the same time. This last decision would rob her of choice forever.

Someone told her that those who commit suicide cannot be forgiven. She desperately wanted to be with Jesus, but what would he think of her last act on this earth?

The decision was made. She inched her way down the bridge and back toward trouble with dis-

Celia still died that night, but not in a watery grave. She died to self and her attitude of hopelessness, despair, and defeat. She surrendered her need to feel happy in order to fulfill her purpose on this

She returned home to a tiny helpless baby, who with gurgling sounds of happiness began reaching innocent hands toward its source of life and love. Celia know then that she could never contemplate this form of escape again.

Celia went on to give life to ten more children, who in turn gave life to thirty-two more children, who in turn gave life to thirty-eight more children. To date, this woman is responsible for giving life to eighty-one people on this earth. These children are not committing murder and mayhem in the streets. In fact, just the opposite.

Some became pastors or married pastors. Some became missionaries, working in China, Tibet, Japan, Thailand, Cambodia, Hawaiian Islands, Mexico, Haiti, Guatemala, Peru, Africa, Russia, and several other countries. The rest ran alcoholic rehabilitation centers, got involved in teaching, counseling, prison ministries, politics, and built businesses.

This is just the beginning! Many of the grandchidren and great grandchildren have yet to marry and have children.

There is yet to be a mountain of good created in this world because one woman refused to give in to her thoughts of suicide. Who is Celia you ask? She is

Celia Larson Dodge. She is my wonderful and lovely eighty-four year old mother.



It identifies Amarillo, the city; Texas, the state; then, makes the reader aware of the United States; a country; a continent; the world; the universe; and concludes with a sphere, planet, and space color. What a delightful introduction to geography! I'll recommend this again in the fall. The reading of this book to your students guarantees enjoyment for all of you while planting a little geographic seed. Why not check it out?

Wheat Certifications Due

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is currently accepting acreage for the 1994 farm program and other uses. All small grains planted for harvest, grazing, haying, or for cover crops on set aside must be reported. Farmers have until May 16 to report acres ant intended use of their wheat, oats, rye, and other fall-seeded grains.

"Small grain crops that are not reported by this deadline will

be ineligible for program benefits," ASCS official Drew Thornberry Before reporting, farmers

can request that ASCS measure their program acreage. The measurements are furnished at cost, and guaranteed for the crop year. Measurements service is not only valuable to program participants, but to any farmer who desires an accurate acreage for any reason.

Farm programs participants are required to correctly certify their entire farm after planting to be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and history credit. The reports contain crops, acreage planted, the uses to be made acreage conservation reserve (ACR), and conservation use acres for payments.

ASCS urges producers who have not certified their fall-seeded crops, to do so before May 16 deadline, please call 874-3561 for a certification appointment.

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
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College News



After moving to Clarendon from Massachusetts Bugbee studied art at Texas A&M College and the Cumming school of Art in Iowa. Frequent trips to Taos resulted in friendships with most of the major Taos artists including W.

and Frank B. Hoffman. From these artists, who often critiqued his work, Bugbee learned the lessons

of a successful artist. Easel painter and Western illustrator were two of his occupations throughout his career, but Bugbee added mural painting to his resume beginning in 1934. The Public Works of Art Project, President Roosevelt's first New Deal art program, commissioned Bugbee to paint a mural on Pioneers Hall's east wall. Bugbee's mural, The Cattleman, was installed in May 1934. Five years later under the WPA's Colorado Cuarto Centennial Commission, Bugbee painted his second Pioneer Hall mural, Ranch Headquarters, for the southeast

Bugbee also competed for the Amarillo Post Office mural commission inn 1939, but his work was rejected. Fortunately, his sketches were preserved and recently presented to the Society. These will be included in the exhibition. Bugbee also entered sketches for the El Paso Federal Courthouse competition but was again rejected.

In 1942, Guy Carlander asked Bugbee to paint seven murals for the Old Tascosa Room at the Herring Hotel, then being Herbert Dunton, Leon Gaspard, designed by Carlender. The next

year Bugbee painted three murals for the Amarillo Army Air Field.

Appointed Curator of Art at the Museum in 1951, Bugbee painted thirteen murals on American Indian Life for the original Indian Hall in the Museum's basement between 1952 and 1954. Later, Bugbee painted four additional panels of Indian dances. These have been in storage since the early 1970's and most will be included in the exhibition along with their preliminary sketches.

Plans are underway to re-install the murals in the current Indian Hall in late 1994. As the re-installation process is complex, the Society is currently seeking sponsorships for each mural to pay for material.

in 1956, Bugbee painted his Hide Hunters mural for pioneer Hall's east wall. He added Kiowa Hunting Buffalo to the north wall in 1957, followed by Working Cattle on the Open Range above the vestibule on the south wall in 1958, thus completing the entire mural cycle originally planned in 1934.

Bugbee's work as a mural painter panned the last thirty years of his career. "Working initially with ink or pencil sketches then moving to full-scale water-color and oil sketches, and augmenting his preparation with studies of different parts of the murals, Bugbee created some of the finest murals in the Southwest" said Grauer. "Through this exhibition, viewers will better understand the mural making process in general and come away with a greater appreciation for Harold D. Bugbee's contributions to the Museum, the Society, the Panhandle-Plains region, and the Southwest," Grauer continued.

In honor of Ben Carleton Mead's first Pioneer Hall mural, Coronado's Coming (1934), the Museum will also feature its collection of Mead's work in the Alcove Gallery. This exhibition will include original illustrations, oils, and drawing of Tascosa.

Members of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society and guests can preview this exhibit at a reception and gallery tour on the evening of the Society's Annual Meeting. The business meeting is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. in the Hazlewood Lecture Hall, the reception and gallery tour at 6:30 p.m., followed by the dinner and program at 7 p.m. in Pioneer Hall.

This year's speaker will be award-winning author John R. Erickson who will perform readings and songs from his many published books, accompanying himself on the 5 string banjo. Erickson's Hank the Cowdog series of books and cassette tapes are known all over the United States. His stories have won the Oppenheimer Award, Audio World Magazine's "Best Audio Tape for Children Award" and a spot of "CBS Storybreak."

Since he began his speaking career in 1984, Erickson has appeared at conventions, conferences, and banquets in 17 states and provinces; has been a keynote speaker at conventions attended by librarians, teachers of English, reading, special education, and drama; and has spoken at the Library of Congress, the Institute of Texas Cultures, the Houston Children's Museum, and the Witte Museum in San Antonio. Erickson has published 31 books, 19 bookson-tapes, and some 500 articles.

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Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

"the value placed on your property: "exemptions that may apply to you; "cancellation of agricultural

cancellation of agricultural appraisal; whether your property is taxable; which local governments should be taxing your property; or you think the appraisal district has done something else that

Your Appraisal District staff urges you to review the value records of your property at any time prior to the day of the Appraisal Review Board Hearings tentatively set for July 6, 1994, in the Donley County Courthouse Annex. Some protests result from errors or misconceptions which we are pleased to correct.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice a protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at the Donley County district office at the Donley County Courthouse Annex, P.O.Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court,

you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised you property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

DEADLINE FOR PILING PROTESTS WITH THE ARB*

Usual Deadline: On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines: For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.
