Bob Grigg grew up near Brownfield, Texas, and graduated from Wellman High School in Wellman, Texas. During World War II, Grigg served in the U.S. Coast Guard as a Radio Technician from December 27, 1941, through November 15, 1945, with service in the South Pacific Theater

After the war, Grigg attended Abilene Christian University while living in Abilene with his wife and two sons. Residents Place In Penning Competition


Several residents from the Clarendon area were among those who had top times in the Pan-Team handle Penning Association's first sanctioned penning competition held recently in Hereford.



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

Check It Out

by Mary Beth Nelson

Are you familiar with the Time ife Books which have been some of America's top publications for several decades? Not only do these books portray the authenticity of America's colorful past, but contribute knowledge of numerous events which are, most likely, generally unknown.

I have just examined two of a three-volume set, African Americans Voices of Triumph, written by the editors of Time Life Books, which were donated to Burton Memorial Library by Time Life Publishing, a division of Time Warner, Inc. I have used the term. wealth of information" before, but the interesting information provided by these books almost exceeds that term. They have so much to offer.

The well-named titles, Perseverance (volume 1) and Leadership (volume 2) speak well for themselves. I think many of us have a tendency to limit our thoughts concerning African American history to days of slavery through the Civil War period without acknowledging the thousands of "unsung heroes" and their contributions to the positive development of America.

For example, stories of nurses, school teachers, ministers, U.S. Marshals, Sheriffs and other lawmen are told. Achievements of mountain men, scouts, cowboys, and frontier women during the Westward Movement might have never been known until the publication of these Time Life writings.

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Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 14th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1993. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1994.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing or postmarking 1994 renditions is Thursday, April 14. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 14 deadline.



Biddy Mason invested in real estate, and spent much time and money helping others as did Clara Brown who opened her home to anyone in need of medical care. Clara also helped start Sunday School and churches in towns where she worked.

If any of my former fifthgraders happen to be reading this article and remember a favorite story we read about Will Rogers' and bulldogger Bill Pickett's rodeo performance in Madison Square Garden, this same Bill Pickett was inducted into the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in 1971, the first African American honoree.

A black Frenchman, Pointe du Sable, was the first citizen of Chicago in the early 1800's, and was not officially recognized as Chicago's founder until well into the 20th century. Jessee Brown, the first black man to earn the U.S. Navy's "wings of gold" was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. In 1973, he was honored by the naming of a ship, the USS Jessee L.

The list of Black American heroes and heroines seems endless when you start reading these beautiful Time Life books which include contributions of scientists, researchers, NASA astronauts, military personnel, and people in other fields of American culture.

The third and remaining volume in this set, Creative Fire, will be published in September, 1994. Not only will Burton Memorial Library receive a donation copy as soon as it's published, but Time Warner has funded a grant to donate a complete set to every main branch public library and every public secondary school in the nation. What an educational contribution! Clarendon High School has also received its first two volumes. School Librarian, Jean Stavenhagen, tells me that student interest in the books was shown during their study of Black History last month. The number of actual job losses will not be known until midsummer, when the restaffing process is complete. During that process:

Many employees will fill their same or similar jobs; Some will change jobs or relocate within WTU or the CSW System; Some eligible employees will choose the enhanced early retirement or enhanced severance options; and Some will not have jobs.

Throughout the CSW System, the number of positions eliminated is about 10 percent of the system workforce of 8,800, and 726 employees are eligible for early retirement. Enhanced relocation packages and severance benefits are also provided for employees as part of the restaffing process.

WTU is one of four electric operating subsidiaries of CSW, an electric utility holding company based in Dallas, Texas (NYSE:CSR). The corporation also will gain efficiencies through CSW Production Services' centralization and coordination of planning, fuel purchases and operation of power plants throughout the CSW Sys-tem. This will help WTU and CSW stay competitive as low-cost energy providers.

The new structure includes fewer levels of management and broader spans of supervision. The organization has been "flattened" to improve internal communication, reduce cost and empower employees, especially those on the front lines dealing with customers.


"This new structure will put our employees in a better position to improve our customers' satisfaction, make faster decisions, be more flexible in their operations and reduce costs," Files said.

With the new structure determined, a systematic process of internal restaffing has begun to place the best available candidates in the new organization. "In our communication with employees throughout this reorganization process, we have emphasized our

intent to treat employees fairly, consistently and with dignity during the restaffing stage," Files said.

Most positions will be filled by early June, with most relocations and other changes completed by the end of the summer.

"By remaining competitive, we can help existing businesses grow, attract new industry, and contribute to the growth of our service territory," said Files. WTU serves 180,000 customers in 52 counties of West Texas from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

Medical Milestones

Hay Fever And Blue-Eared Mice

(NAPS)—Millions of Americans are tormented by the maddening



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symptoms of hay fever and other allergies. The best advice is to avoid the offending substance and to use medications to relieve the symptoms. Unfortunately, these medications

often induce undesirable side effects such as sleepiness and fail to provide long-lasting, complete relief to many people. Recently, working with genetically engineered mice, researchers reported progress toward developing a new class of drugs that may prevent allergic symptoms.

When a sensitive person encounters an allergen such as ragweed pollen, the immune system initiates a chain of events which produces symptoms like sneezing and watery eyes. One of the first events to occur is the production of a protein called IgE, a type of antibody that can bind to a specific allergen. Certain white blood cells have proteins on their surface called IgE receptors, which may, in turn, bind to the IgE-allergen complex, thus triggering the rest of the allergic chain reaction.

Researchers reasoned that interfering with the binding of IgE to its receptor might prevent this chain reaction from starting. Unfortunately, there are at least three types of IgE receptors and researchers were not sure wnich one was the culprit.

To answer this question, Dr. Beverly Koller and colleagues at the University of North Carolina genetically engineered a strain of mice that lacked one of the three receptors, called the high-affinity IgE receptor. Dr. Jean-Pierre Kinet and colleagues at the



National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases tested whether these mice could mount an allergic reaction.

They injected IgE antibodies into a group of genetically altered mice and a group of normal mice. The next day both groups received an allergen and a harmless blue dye. The normal mice quickly developed a severe allergic reaction, including an increase in the leakiness of their blood vessels. This caused the dye to leak into their tissues, turning their ears blue. Thus, within minutes, the scientists had visible proof of an allergic reaction in the normal

In contrast, the ears of the mice that lacked the high-affinity IgE receptor stayed pink-blood vessel leakiness or other signs of an allergic reaction never occurred.

As a result, scientists can search for ways to block the IgE receptor in humans and expect that it will block the allergic reaction. If an antiallergy drug results from these experiments, these blue ears may become the most famous mouse ears since Mickey's and Minnie's.

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
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

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
