Some people have horse sense, and a few more have common sense. Ken Dorris, Vice President for Commercial Loans at FirstBank Southwest, has Number Sense.

"Actually, Number Sense isn't something you have, it's something you do." Ken stated and he should know. Ken has had a passion for numbers all his life, which is probably why he eventually graduated from Baylor in 1987 with a degree in Economics and Finance. As a senior at Clarendon High School in 1983, Ken took first place in a University Interscholastic League Number Sense competition by solving 80 complex math problems in a mere ten minutes.

So what, exactly, is number sense? "Basically, it's a way to supplement memorized math principles with certain "tricks of the trade" to break down problems into easy to solve elements." explained Ken. He also pointed out that this was an easier way to solve problems than the traditional ways we all learned in school, and was certainly faster.

But faster is of little use if the answers aren't correct. To prove the value of Number Sense, he agreed to a contest against a pocket calculator. The first problem, the square of 125, was correctly answered by Ken just as the calculator displayed 15,625. He decided that was too easy and tried a more difficult problem, 373 X 525. This one took slightly longer to solve, but still Ken's answer matched the calculator's.

Although it looks like nothing but a math club party trick (and Ken admits he does get requests at parties to display his skill), there are practical applications for Number Sense. "Here at FirstBank Southwest, I deal with people who trust me to help them with their finances. It makes customers nervous to see a calculator, because then they think we're talking about sums to big for even a banker to comprehend." said Ken, who uses his math skills to develop a more customer-friendly business environment. "When I can determine large figures quickly, it generates customer confidence by alleviating their fear of numbers."

If historical romance is your favorite type of reading, I recommend three delightful books authored by Jean Peart, writer of several best sellers. Each of the paperback books, found in Burton Memorial Library, offer light-reading fiction on less than 200 pages. Interestingly enough, they are writ-ten against an Orphan Train background, thus, the reason for referring to them as the "Orphan Train Trilogy". Jean Peart dedicates each book to the "real riders" of the Orphan Train which, she says, were the inspiration for this series.

Events in the lives of three fictitious girls, Kit, Laurel, and Toddy, are entertwined as the eight year olds leave Boston's Greystone Orphanage to start their journey together on an Orphan Train, vowing to always be friends and to never lose track of each other as they grow up. Dreams of a Longing Heart is Kit's story; Quest for Lasting Love is Laurel's story; and Homeward the Seeking Heart is Toddy's story. Even though the

girls have similiar backgrounds, the author's imagination creates three entirely different stories. Jean Peart skillfully portrays the girls' personalities as they mature with their new families, as they cultivate friendships, and as they become romantically involved. Even though the stories are not true, it's possible for the reader to visualize true circumstances that occurred in the lives of Orphan Train children as they became older. I almost guarantee if you read one of these books, you're going to want to complete all three.

Incidentally, in Burton Memorial Library's Youth section, the young adult in your family will find an appealing book series entitled The Orphan Train Quartet. This series, written by Joan Lowery Nixon, includes four books, Caught in the Act, In the Face of Danger, A Place to Belong, and A Family Apart. Just from "skimming" the books, they appear to capture the American pioneer spirit as well as providing high quality mystery and suspense. Gilkey, Gary Hunt, and Jiggs Mann. College Officials present: President, Dr. Jerry Stockton; Dean of Instruction, Kelvin Sharp; Dean of Students, Tex Selvidge; Joel Zehr, and Darlene Spier. Others present: Tom Bowen and Chris Meredith with Honeywell.

Board action that minutes of regular meeting on January 13, 1994, and minutes of special meeting on January 27, 1994 be approved. Board action that the financial statement for the month of January, 1994, and the agency funds financial statement for the month of January, 1994, be approved as stated. Motion by W.R. Christal with a second by Susie Shields that bills be allowed and ordered paid in the amounts of State Appropriation Fund \$23,327.60; General Fund \$115,965.50; and Carl Perkins Fund \$942,64. Whereas, the laws of the state of Texas provide that an election for regents for said Junior College district shall be held on the first Saturday in May in even numbered years and further provide that said election shall be ordered by the Board of Regents.

Therefore, be it ordered by the Board of Regents of Clarendon College District: That an election be held in said District on the first Saturday in May, the same being the 7th day of May, 1994, for the

purpose of electing four (4) members to the Board of Regents of said Junior College District, said members to be elected to fill three term positions at large on said Board of Regents, and one unexpired term of four years. That said election shall be held at Clarendon Public School Administration Building, with Willard H. Skelton as Presiding Judge. The polls at the designated polling place shall on election day be opened from 7:00 a.m.

Cula Jo Trout is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Mary White is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at the Clarendon Public School Administration Building within the boundaries of the above named district, and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least 7 hours each day for absentees which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may

Any resident qualified elector of the district may have his or her name placed as a candidate on the official ballot for any of the positions to be filled at said above mentioned election by filling a written statement, signed by the can-didate, with the secretary of the Board not later than 5:00 p.m. of the 45th day before the day of the election. An application may not be filed earlier than the 30th day before the date of the filing deadline. All candidates shall be resident qualified voters of the district.

This order shall serve as notice for said election, and the president of the Board of Regents is hereby authorized and instructed to cause a copy of this combined election order and notice to be published on time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county

where this school district is located. Said publication shall not be more than 30 days or less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with the order of the Board of Regents, the secretary posted written notices of the date, place, and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board, located in the Administration office, a place convenient and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice, having been posted, it remain posted continuously for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting, and in addition, the secretary furnished a notice to the County Clerk of the County in which most, if not all, of this District's public reside, and also give notice by telephone or telegraph to all news media requesting such notice and consenting to pay any and all expenses incurred by District in providing special notice. Motion carried unanimously 6-0-0.

Motion by Mike Butts with a second by W.R. Christal to adopt proposal to change Clarendon College's mission statement a follows: "Clarendon College, speaking through its faculty and Board of Regents, has an opportunity and responsibility to offer to the people of its service area a program of post-secondary education adapted to their needs. It believes that for the people of the Clarendon College District and the surrounding area this necessary higher education can best be given in the familiar and homelike atmosphere of a Junior College. Thus, the college is maintained to provide educational opportunities for people in its area. Accordingly, the college seeks to provide four types of programs: 1. General college academic and preprofessional courses for students who plan to enter senior colleges and universities with junior standing; 2. Vocational/technical education for students who plan to enter the workforce; 3. Adult vocational lasses; and 4. 90% of students mastering TAAS spelling, capitalization, and punctuation; summarization skills; problem solving and problem solving in mathematical representation. Goals for the Junior High to improve by the 1997-98 school year writing, reading, and math skills to achieve a level of 90% of students mastering TAAS spelling, capitalization, punctuation; English usage; relationships and outcomes; summarization; and problem solving. Mr. Word stated that teachers felt they were making good progress, but felt the area of outlining needed more emphasis.





Ken displayed some locally purchased, easily understood paperback books on the subject, and in recommending their study he told an interesting success story. All wasn't the only Number Sense enthusiast at Clarendon High School." he explained. "In fact, the District champion was at Clarendon High School for four years, and I had to wait for him to graduate so I could go on and take first place as a senior."






