WordPerfect Class Offered

The main campus of Clarendon College will offer a beginning class of WordPerfect starting Thursday, February 10 in Clarendon. The class will meet for four consecutive Thursday's from 6 to 10 p.m. Business Department Chairperson Pam Denney will teach the class.

The beginning class is designed so that students can learn the basics of WordPerfect. Class participants will also receive hand-on computer training of the WordPerfect program.

Local Judge Attends Seminar

Judge Jimmy B. Johnson was certified at the recent 40 hour Justice of the Peace Basic Seminar held in Austin, January 16-21, 1994. The seminar was sponsored by the Justice of the Peace and Constables Association of Texas and is conducted by the Texas Justice Court Training Center headquartered at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. The school is held in compliance with rules adopted by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and Statute (Art. 27.005) Texas Government code requiring newly elected or appointed Justices of the Peace to attend a 40 hour course within one year of taking office. Topics covered at this basic school were as follows: Court Management, Setting-up Your Court, Liabilities, Judicial Ethics, Financial Management, Court Security, Criminal Jurisdiction and Venue, Parks & Wildlife Laws, Traffic Laws, Alcoholic Beverage Laws, Civil Jurisdiction and Venue, Forcible Entry and Detainer statutes, Basic Civil Procedure, Peace Bonds, Emergency Commitments, Duties of a Magistrate, Truancy, Administrative Hearings, Rules of Evidence, Search Warrants, Vital Statistics and Inquests.

Facts About Migraine Headaches

By Dr. Brian E. Mondell (NAPS)—Migraine is a pervasive condition. It imposes both social and economic strains on patient, family, friends, coworkers and society in general. Recent studies have indicated that the majority of sufferers do not seek help and that the prevalence of migraine is on the rise in the United States.

Each year, more than 17 percent of women and five percent of men in the United States report one or more migraine headaches. This means that 8.7 million women and 2.6 million men are moderately to severely disabled by migraine headache annually.

Yet, migraine still is underdiagnosed and undertreated by health-care professionals. Its cause and cure are still scientific mysteries and there are many questions without answers. In my practice, I am asked a variety of questions by patients about migraine.

A question I have been asked a lot recently is, "I've heard about a nasal spray pain reliever that relieves pain fast; what is it and how does it work?" The question often comes from patients who have not responded to sumatriptan, a new migraine medication.

In fact, sumatriptan is considered by many to be a breakthrough drug for migraine pain. It is the most recent drug to be developed specifically to treat the entire migraine process. For many patients, sumatriptan starts working within ten minutes and provides relief for more than 70 percent of patients within one hour. Side effects generally include temporary injection-site reactions, feelings of flushing, dizziness, warmth and heaviness, and tingling or tightness in various parts of the body, including the chest with the remote possibility of cardiovascular events.

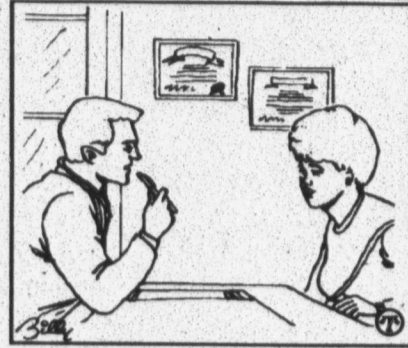
For patients who do not respond to sumatriptan, and for those for whom the drug is medically unsafe, and for patients for whom other abortive drugs do not work, there is a nasal spray that is often

an excellent treatment for the rapid and convenient relief of migraine pain.

Butorphanol tartrate is available in a nasal spray, a new drug delivery system, for relieving various types of pain. It offers rapid, long-acting relief from moderate-to-severe pain in a convenient dosage form ideally suited for outpatient use. It is particularly effective in the outpatient management of migraine pain. The nasal spray can be self-administered in any setting, thereby often avoiding the need for expensive emergency room or office visits.

Technically, butorphanol tartrate is an opioid analgesic and is part of a large group of compounds in widespread clinical use. The most common side effect associated with the nasal spray pain reliever is drowsiness. Other significant side effects reported during clinical studies were dizziness and nausea and/or vomiting.

When patients are suffering debilitating migraine pain, they want relief fast. In many cases, the nasal spray will provide rapid and convenient relief from this pain. Because it is comparable in potency to an injection of an opioid analgesic, I advise patients not to drive or operate dangerous equipment immediately following

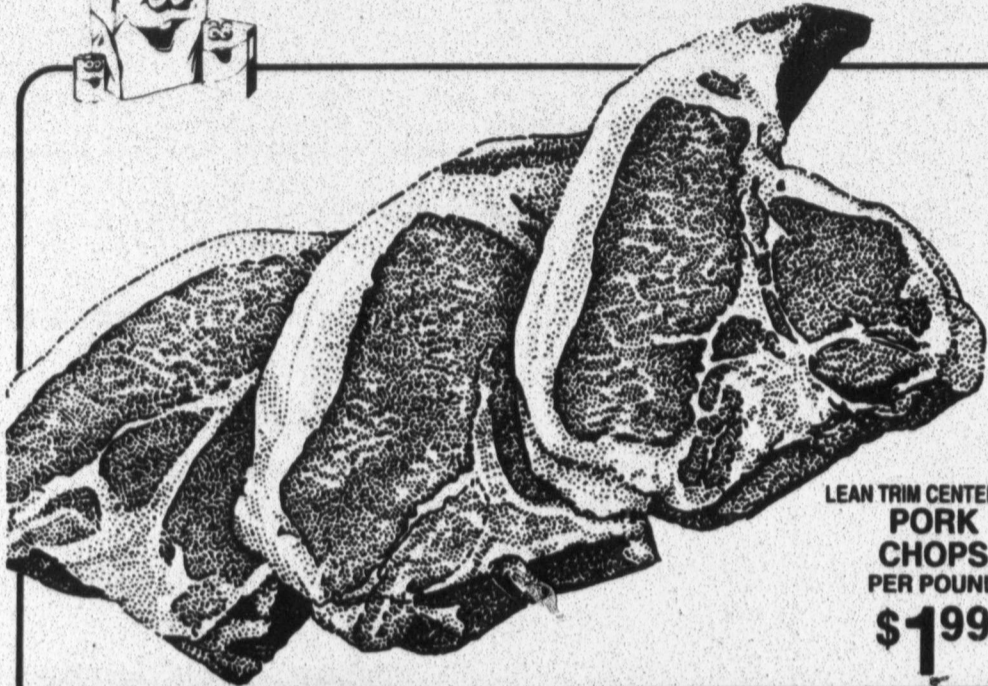

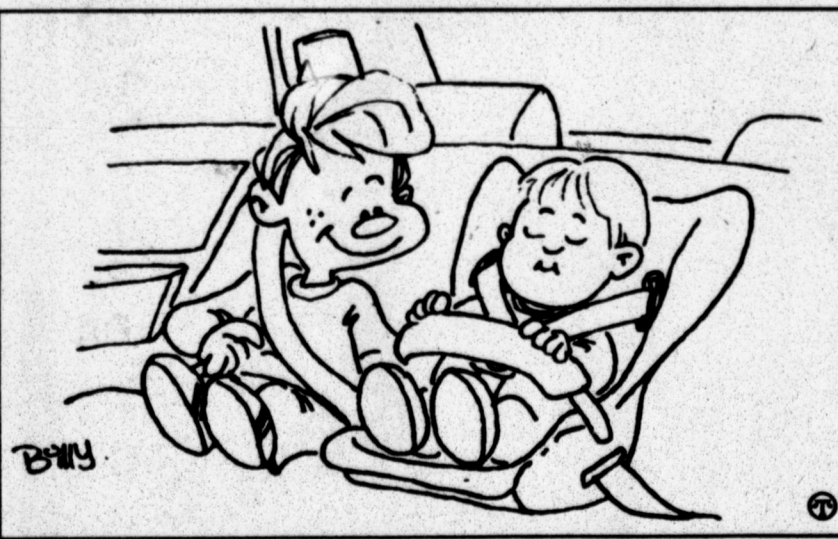
The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam, and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screening for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram. Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age: Age 40 - One baseline mammogram; Age 40-49 - A mammogram every 1 to 2 years; 50 and over - Yearly mammogram.

FMHA Moves To Speed Up Processing

"I have today taken action to delegate the full loan approval authority allowed under the Federal Regulations to FmHA County Offices in Texas," Ellis said.

This action means that FmHA Supervisors at the County level will be able to exercise loan approval authority up to the full County limit without prior reviews being required at other locations or even by FmHA officials at the same location.

"As this new year begins, I feel this will be a real help to our farm customers, and I intend to pursue this type of change in the future, wherever I can," said Ellis.

FmHA County Supervisors were previously subject to a complicated system of reviews and reviews of loan applications in order to approve an FmHA loan. This system was instituted several years ago in order to insure fewer mistakes and more uniformity from County to County.

Tips On Growing Wildflowers

You needn't tame your longing for a wildflower garden any longer. According to a new book by Donald and Lillian Stokes, you can create one right on your own property.

Their new guide, *The Wildflower Book—An Easy Guide to Growing and Identifying Wildflowers* (Little Brown & Co., \$10.95) points out the first step in creating your wildflower meadow is choosing a location. There are four things to check for when seeking a spot: the amount of sun it gets, the amount of moisture in the soil, and the condition and acidity of the soil.

The Stokeses, authors of *The Bluebird Book*, *The Hummingbird Book*, *The Bird Feeder Book* and others, point out that the main condition needed is sun, at least six to eight hours a day. The more sun the better the plants will grow.

According to the Stokeses, you should also dig up a shovelful of soil. If it's gritty or sandy and light in color, it should be enriched by what is commonly called "organic matter." This is merely decayed vegetation such as compost or peat moss. If the soil is slippery and dense it may be full of clay. Clay soils do not drain out moisture quickly and most meadow wildflowers like a well-drained soil.

The Stokeses teach you how to choose, plan and prepare the right site on your property, from a small bed to a large meadow; what to consider in buying plants or seed mixes; how to select the best and easiest plants to grow and how to maintain your garden once you have planted it. Whether you're planning a meadow of sweeping color, or an enchanted woodland garden, or just want to add wildflowers to existing plantings, *The Wildflower Book* can help you surround yourself with the natural beauty of wildflowers.

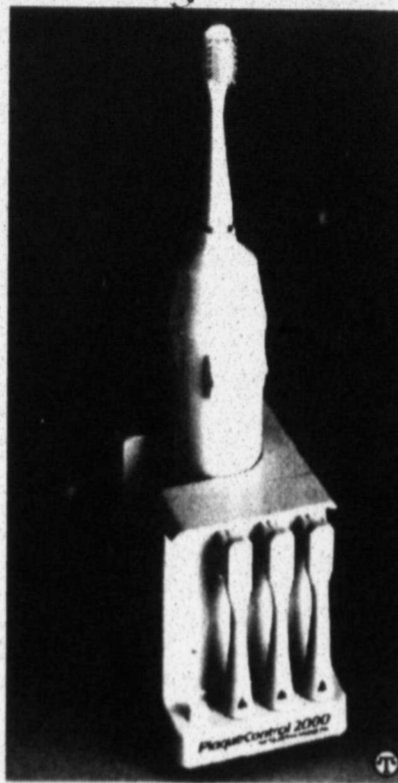

Mammography Unit Coming to Clarendon

The Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Clarendon Monday, February 14, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Clarendon Medical Center Clinic on Highway 70 North. Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to schedule appointments call (800) 377-HOPE (4673) or (806) 359-4673. The unit is from the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital.

The total cost of the screening is \$70. This includes the X-ray, physical breast exam, and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings to women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a registered nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn breast self-examination and practice it every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age:

AGE	1 baseline mammogram.
40	A mammogram every 2 yrs.
40-49	Yearly.
50 and over

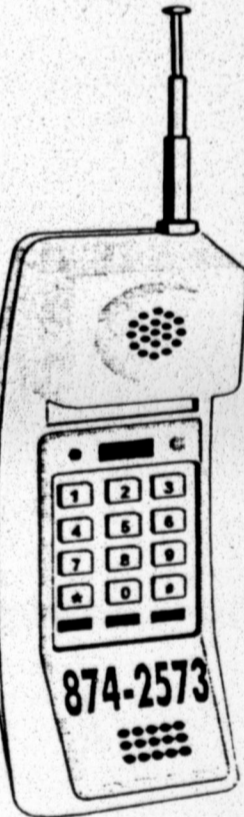

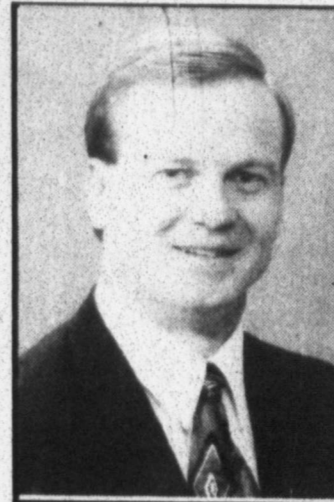

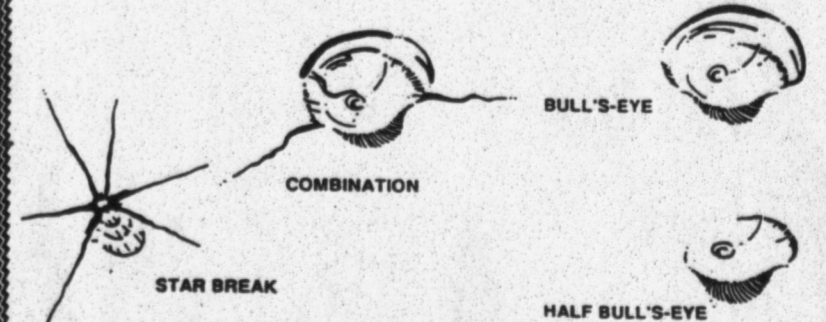
