Jim has served as the 100th District Attorney since September 27, 1993, after being appointed by Governor Ann Richards to that position. Prior to becoming District Attorney, Jim was Assistant District Attorney under David McCoy, as well as Donley County Attorney Pro Tem.

Jim was born and raised in Childress and has continuously maintained his residence in the 100th Judicial District since returning to this area to practice law in 1984, having lived and maintained a private law practice in Clarendon since that time.

Jim graduated from Childress High School in 1976 and attended Texas Tech University in Lubbock where he graduated with a degree in Accounting in 1980. He obtained his law degree at Texas Tech University School of Law in 1983 and is a member of the State Bar of Texas. Jim served as a member of the State Bar of Texas District 13 Grievance Committee from 1988-1992. He currently is President of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association.

Jim is a member of the Clarendon Lions Club, having served as its president from 1987-1988; he was a Director of the Don-

Dedication Postponed

The dedication of The Taylor Lakes Unit of the Playa Lakes Wildlife Management Area was postponed due to the unpleasant weather. The dedication was planned for 4:00 p.m. Monday, February 1, but temperatures were

only a few digits above zero that morning, and the roads from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Office in Amarillo and the Taylor Lakes Unit in Lelia Lake were icy. Officials with the TP&W, expect to reschedule the event in more pleasant weather.

The tree lakes in the unit are technically not playa lakes, but they are an important site for waterfowl who also use the playas. The lakes were purchased for wildlife habitat by the Playa Lakes Joint Venture, a joint effort of federal and state agencies and private interests.

The 520-acre area is expected to boost the local economy by bringing in tourists, including photographers, bird watchers and naturalists. It should also help increase wildfowl numbers, which will aid hunters in surrounding areas.

Texas Parks & Wildlife reports that the water at Lake Greenbelt is clear, 42 degrees, 4 feet low; black bass are slow; white bass are good with some limits on slabs and minnows in 42-50 feet of water; crappie are good on same baits and depths; catfish are slow.

Mammography Unit Coming to Clarendon

The Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Clarendon Monday, February 14, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Clarendon Medical Center Clinic on Highway 70 North. Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to schedule appointments call (800) 377-HOPE (4673) or (806) 359-4673. The unit is from the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center

and High Plains Baptist Hospital.

The total cost of the screening is \$70. This includes the X-ray, physical breast exam, and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings to women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a registered nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detec-

tion. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn breast self-examination and practice it every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age:

Age	
40	One baseline mammogram
40 to 49	A mammogram every 1 to 2 years
50 and over	Yearly mammograms

Courts Send Felons to Prison

In keeping with the national mood of "get tough with criminals", Donley County courts have sent several local residents to prison.

The office of District Attorney Jim Shelton reports that Raymond Ballard had his probation revoked on two counts of burglary of a building, as well as additional time on new forgery charges. He got four years.

Sherry Smith got five years when the court revoked her probation for tampering with government records. In separate action, she was indicted for burglary of a

habitation and burglary of a building.

Rodney Smith was given four years deferred adjudication for theft over \$750, as well as an \$800 fine. Donnie Harris and Brenita Ballard each took five years deferred adjudication and \$500 fines for forgery. Lakeva Butler Johnson pled on aggravated assault charges and got two years deferred adjudication and a \$100 fine.

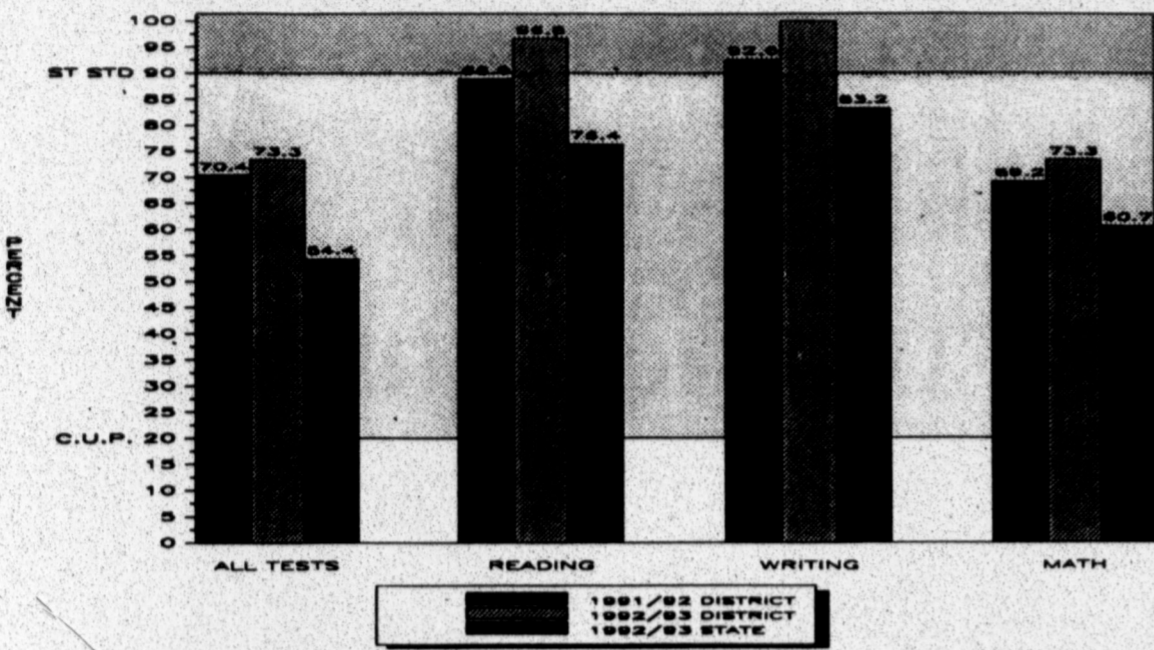

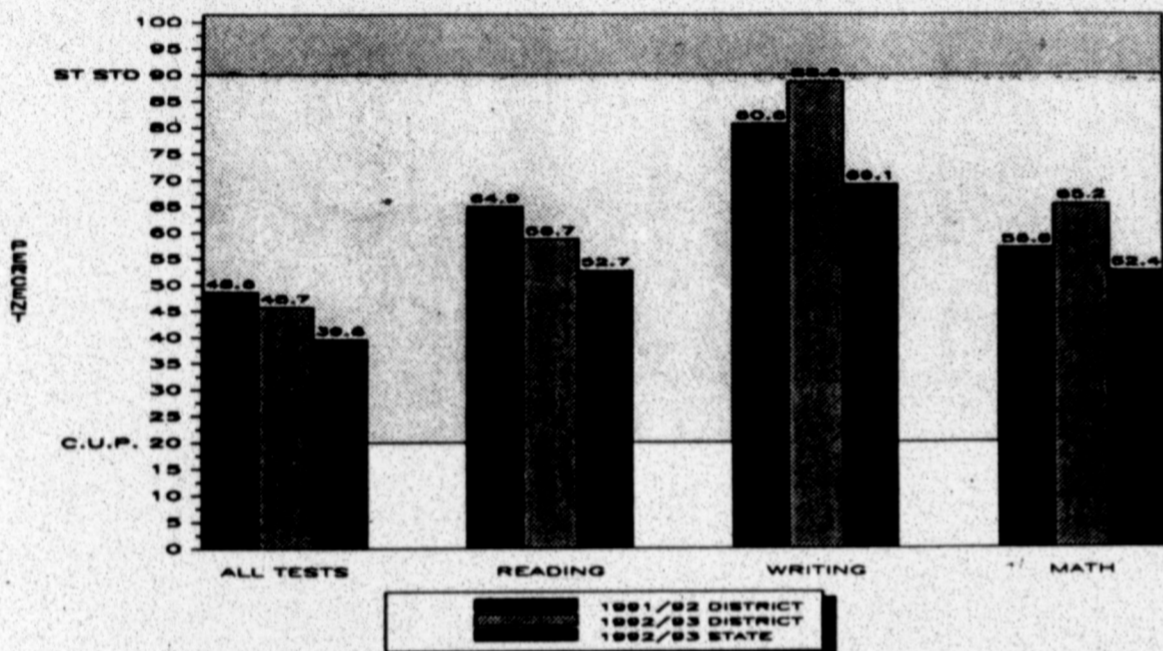

PERCENT PASSING FOR 1991/92 AND 1992/93



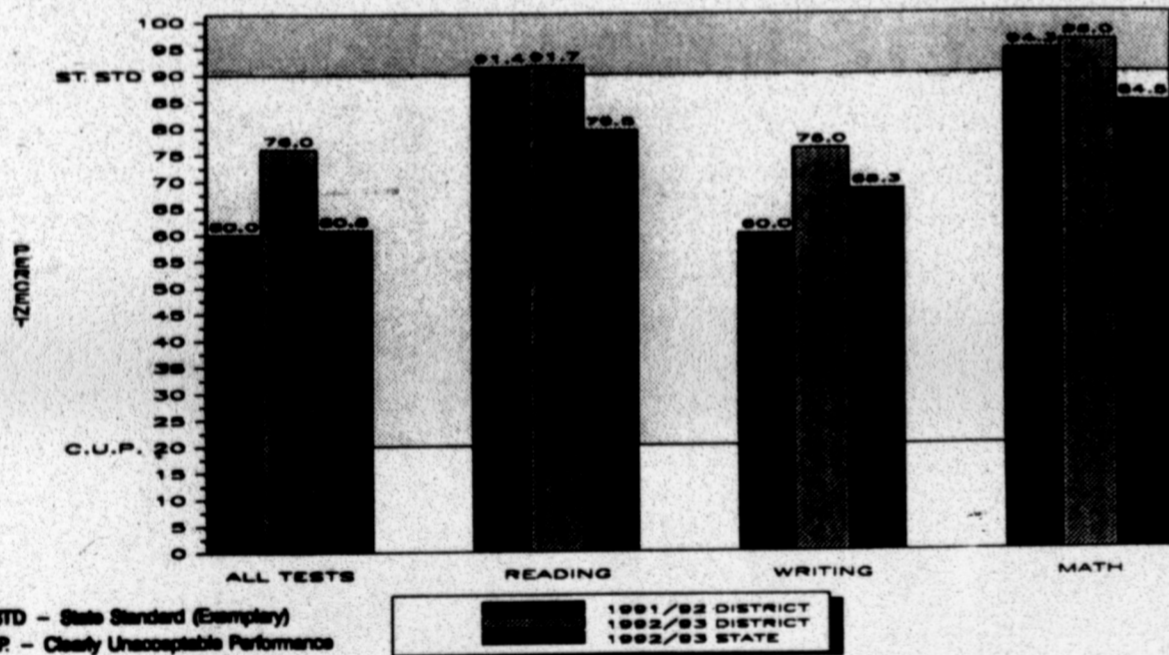

PERCENT PASSING FOR 1991/92 AND 1992/93

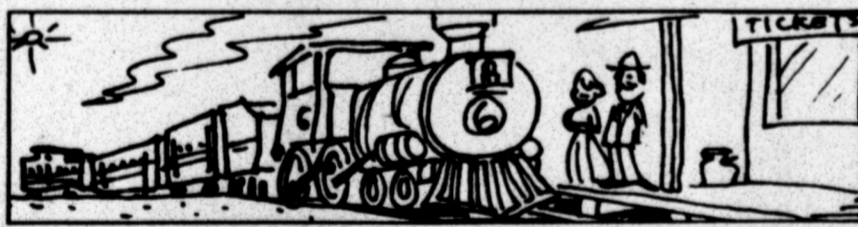

Check It Out

Are you a person who likes to vary your reading pleasure with different types of literature? After reading so much fiction, would you like to find a good piece of non-fictional writing just to change the pace for awhile? If so, a two-volume book series entitled *Orphan Train Riders: Their Own Stories* may hold the exceptional interest you're looking for, especially since some of these Orphan Train riders came right through Donley County at one time.

Until Mary Linn Bills, librarian, showed these books to me, I wasn't even aware of Orphan Trains crossing our country with their precious "cargo". When we think of the last half of the nineteenth century, the Civil War or the Industrial Revolution may first come to mind. Even though orphan trains were still in existence during the early 1930's, the years, 1854-1899, are also known as the "Orphan Train Era".

The idea of an Orphan Train conceived by two New York ministers, Charles Loring Brace and Van Buren Van Arsdale, was to take homeless children from the city to the country where help was needed on farms and in small rural villages. But it was a gentleman named Charles R. Fry who headed the Children's Aid Society in New York that really laid out the groundwork for a "placing-out" system for children in homes with loving families, eager to accept and provide them with enough security that they might enjoy a decent life with hope for the future. Mr. Fry's work was so remarkable that I plan to give more details of his extraordinary life in my next article. His was a life devoted entirely to children—a life which could only be described with words such as humility and dedication. He was, truly, a courageous and caring man.

Until recently, it seems that information about the orphan trains has been rather vague except to those who were riders or their relatives. While doing research for a 1986 county history book, Mrs. Mary Ellen Johnson came across the amazing fact that 150,000 children were involved in this era. As soon as she discovered this fascinating piece of history, she began contacting every source she could think of for assistance in locating orphan train riders or their relatives. After her organization of the Orphan Train Heritage Society of America (OTHS) in 1987, letters and press releases for information were mailed from which she began receiving responses. In 1992, the Orphan Train Riders Research Center was opened.

The Orphan Train books in Burton Memorial Library contain approximately 70 true stories related by Orphan Train riders and their relatives, and compiled by Mrs. Johnson. The stories are interesting, heartwarming, some sad, some happy. I wouldn't attempt to review any of them for you because there's no way I could convey the emotions of those who contributed their own stories.

It's very possible that you are acquainted with or have a relative who rode an Orphan Train. Perhaps you were a rider, yourself. Maybe you would like to contribute your own story. I know our readers would find it interesting. If so, I can be contacted at my home (2532), Burton Memorial Library, or the Clarendon News office.

I hope you'll read my next article concerning Mr. Charles R. Fry whose outstanding work with thousands of children had an enormous effect on America's mid-west area. In the meantime, Mary Linn and Mary Green are ready to show you the Orphan Train books which contain a wealth of interest that will "tug at your heartstrings". Why not check it out?

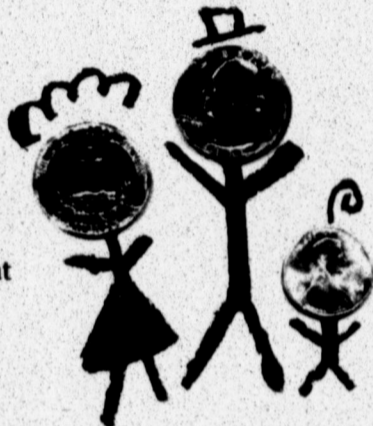

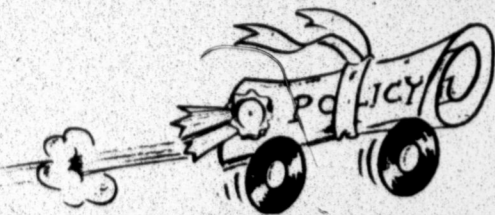

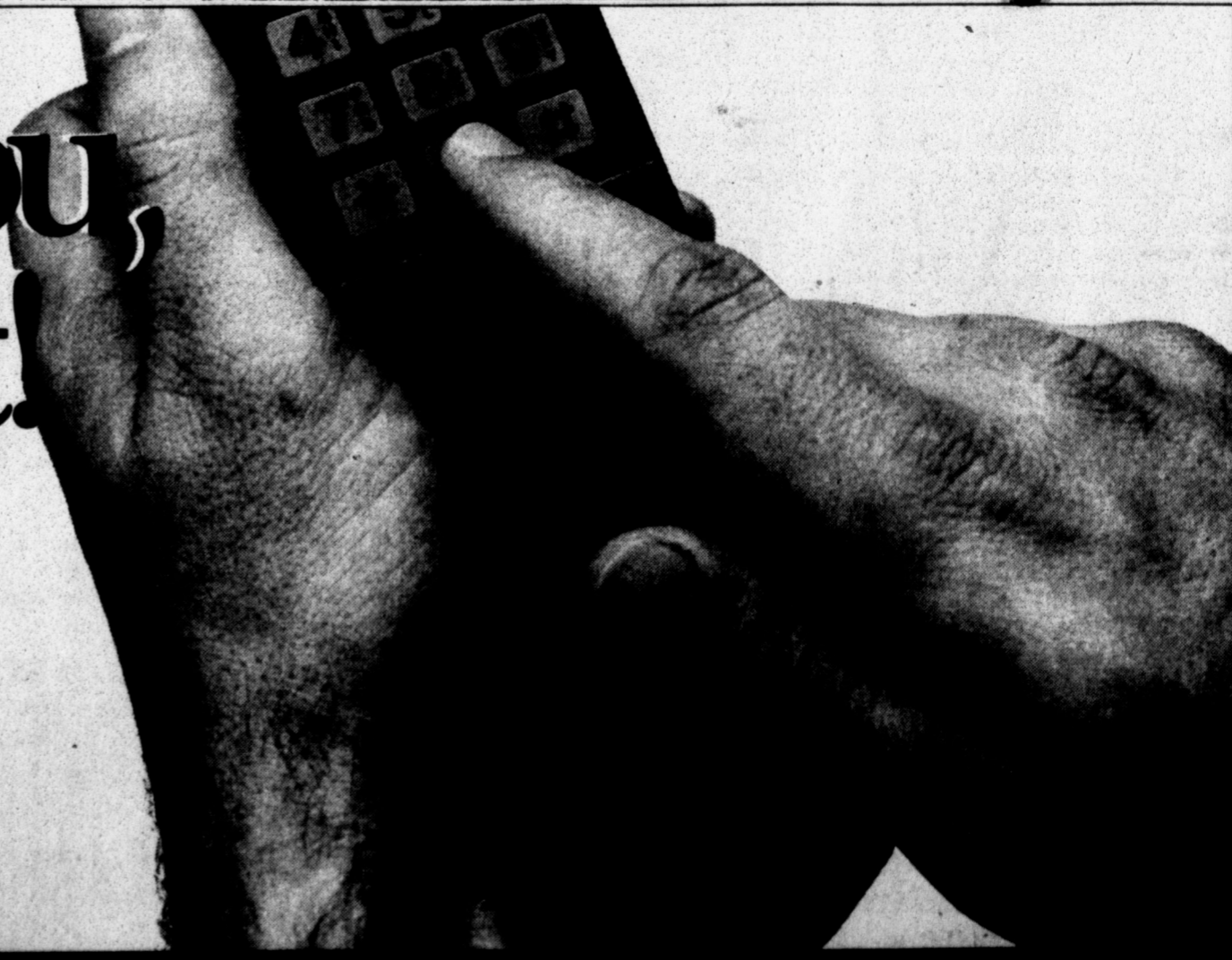
