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



EDITORIAL

FIRST SIGNS OF BAIRD'S EXPANSION NOTED

During the past few days we have seen the first signs of Baird's growth like the young tender buds of spring coming forth to greet the sunshine. With the near completion of our new lake water system, new highway 80, and other developments that make Baird a better town in which to invest, we are about to see some building going on here.

L. R. Hughes has applied for a permit to construct a modern tourist court on the new highway west of the courthouse where his son, M. L. Hughes, recently built a handsome service station. They hope to have a complete unit ready for business by the time the Baird-Abilene stretch of the new road is completed late this year. A modern tourist court is one thing Baird has been needing for a long time. Mr. Hughes will continue to operate his old camp on the present highway 80, about two blocks from the new location, but he says, "This new court will be a honey. We are going to make it neat and keep it clean and cater only to the better class of tourists. We are going to wrap it up in neon lights and make it as attractive as we can.

It has been the opinion of some people for a long time that Baird is not a good location for a big expensive motel, but when Mr. Hughes opens his new place, we believe that he will prove this to be a wonderful location. There is plenty of room here for Mr. Hughes new camp, and the overflow from it will be sufficient to support several more like it. Few people realize how much traffic flows through Baird over our giant highways.

Tom B. Barton has recently obtained a permit to construct a Humble super service station east of the courthouse on Highway 80. He is now receiving bids from local contractors on its construction. Before the summer is over, the fine new station will be in operation, so says Mr. Barton. The station will be so situated that it will greet travelers who enter Baird from the east with its bright lights and friendly atmosphere. Such service institutions will certainly give the world a good opinion at first sight of us. Strangers usually get their first impression of a town from service station attendants and waitresses in cafes. With Humble, Gulf, Magnolia, Texas and Premier stations holding out open arms to greet folks as they drive into our town, Baird is going to be known from coast to coast as the friendliest little city along the highway.

PARKING METERS VS. WIDE OPEN SPACES

Our neighboring city to the north, Albany, is installing parking meters to find the answer to their parking problems. Mason, 2,000 population, about a hundred miles south of here, is also installing parking meters. One by one towns the size of Baird are turning to parking meters as a solution to their problems.

People in Baird do not want parking meters. Neither do the people in Albany, Mason or any of the other towns we know anything about. They turn to the meters as a choice between two evils.

Baird is putting up with the worst traffic congestion of any of these towns. We do not want parking meters because we don't like the things. We allow people to park their cars all over the streets and drive any way they please, because we don't want to call them down. We didn't want to prohibit center parking on Market Street for fear that it might run business out of town. Cross Plains is enforcing the no center parking rule success-

While Baird carries the traffic hazards along and at the same time trembles in her boots for fear that conditions will mean the death of some child, something else is taking place. It might be for the best. Back in the minds of some business folk is the plan to set up stores back away from Market Street where they will have plenty of parking space for their customers - back where their customers may shop in safety and convenience. As we say, this might be the answer. The modern trend is to spread out and make use of all this wide open space we hear so much about in West Texas.

In Chicago there is lots of parking space and there are no parking meters. One may drive just about any way he wishes without running afoul with the law. That's because the town is spread out. The modern trend in Baird is to spread out. Instead of building business houses wall-to-wall along the sidewalk, the trend will be to get away, separate buildings with space, and landscape the grounds. After all, why should any business house be jammed between other buildings. Spread the town out, modernize, eliminate fire hazards, beautify, make shopping easier. When Baird does these things, we won't need parking meters.






