The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is offering a computer shortcourse in Quicken7 February 9-10. Quicken7 is an inexpensive, easy to use record keeping program that is widely used by agricultural producers. In this two day course participants use a case study to learn to use Quicken7 in a hands on setting. Participants will enter transactions in the register and write check screens. They will learn to categorize by type of income and expense, to split and memorize transactions, and to develop meaningful reports. Tips for use will be discussed throughout the course. No prior computer experience is necessary.

# Traffic Interrupted On Highway


Motorist traveling along U.S. Highway 287 between the communities of Childress and Memphis will notice detours, barriers and safety measures in place during road rehabilitation. The traveling public is advised to use caution west of the community of Estelline and east of Memphis during the next seven to eight

months. All vehicles traveling north on highway 287 from Estelline should be alert before rounding a curve and descending into the Red River valley, when nearing the bridge and roadway. All southbound traffic lanes will be closed to the motoring public for approximately six miles.

Caution is required in this area due to all traffic using twoway, single lanes on the north-side roadway only. Passing will not be possible in the areas where traffic is limited to one lane. In the event of snow, ice or other inclement weather during the construction phase, extreme caution is advised. Bad weather limits visibility, vehicle traction and creates additional burdens and hazards for personnel working in the area.

SSI Celebrates 20th Anniversary

"This month, the Supplemental Security Income program, better known as SSI, joins the '20something' crowd," according to Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo. The first SSI benefits were paid in January 1974 to about 3.2 million people. This month, an estimated 6.2 million individuals will receive payments under this program managed by the Social Security Administration that pays benefits to people with low incomes and few assets if they're 65 or older, or if they are blind or have a disability.

"Many original SSI recipients had been on state assistance rolls before the federal program was established," Talbot said. "SSI was set up to provide a nationally uniform standard for people with little or no income." In January 1974, the highest federal SSI payment to an individual was \$140 per month. Beginning this month, the national payment standard for an individual will be \$446.

Although the SSI program was designed for needy people of all ages, more than half the original SSI population was 65 or older. According to Talbot, things have changed considerably in the last two decades. "Individuals with disabilities are now the largest seg-

ment of SSI beneficiaries," Talbot said, "representing nearly threefourths of all recipients. And children are the fastest-growing recipient group, accounting for nearly 12 percent of all SSI beneficiaries with disabilities. In December 1975, the first month such statistics are available, children represented only three percent of disabled SSI recipients.

Reaching out to potential beneficiaries in the Amarillo area is one of Talbot's goals. "From the outset," he said, "we have given high priority to identifying individuals who might be eligible for SSI. Our goal is to make sure that anyone potentially eligible for SSI is aware of the program and given every opportunity to file for benefits.

Individuals who think they might be eligible for SSI can cal the Amarillo Social Security office to discuss the program or set up an appointment to file for benefits.

Social Security Reviewing **Disability Process** 

"The Social Security Administration has begun 'reengineering' its disability program. The goal is to streamline the process -- to ensure that proper decisions are reached in a timely manner," according to Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amaril-

Talbot said reengineering begins with a fundamental rethinking of the process that starts when an individual applies for disability benefits and ends when that individual receives a benefit or is found ineligible after completing all levels of administrative appeal.

An 18-member reengineering project team will develop proposals that will ensure dramatic improvements in the way the entire process works and is managed.

The steps in determining disability have not changed significantly since the disability program began in the 1950's," Talbot said, "yet case loads and the types of disabilities have changed radically. Improvement is urgently

About 3 million people are expected to apply for disability benefits under the Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability programs in 1994. This number represents an 18-percent increase over 1993 and follows a 23-percent increase in the previous year. The workload currently consumes approximately 40 percent of SSA's operating budget and is expected to increase to more than 50 percent in the near future.

To get a better idea of what the people expect when they apply for disability benefits, "focus group" meetings with people who



Talbot noted that the review will not change the definition of disability, which requires individuals to be unable to do substantial work for a year or more to qualify for benefits. The effort also will not affect individual benefit amounts, nor will it change vocational rehabilitation programs. And, Administrative Law Judges will continue to preside over disability hearings.

The reengineering task force, established in October 1993, includes Social Security employees from all aspects of the disability process. Social Security Recipients to get **Benefit Statements** 

Social Security beneficiaries will receive statements in the mail in January showing the benefits they received in 1993," said Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo. This statement should be used to determine if any benefits are subject to Federal income tax. "to ensure you receive the statement," Talbot said, "make sure Social Security has your correct address. This is especially important for individuals who receive their benefits by direct deposit."

Most of those who receive the statement - Form SSA 1099 - will not have to pay taxes on their Social Security benefits because their total income is less than the taxable ceiling. "If you receive Social Security benefits as your only source of income, you are unlikely to owe Federal taxes on the benefits," Talbot said.

Office

An Internal Revenue Services (IRS) worksheet - IRS Notice 703 - comes with the benefit statement. "The worksheet shows you how to determine if your Social Security benefits are subject to tax," Talbot explained. "If, after completing the worksheet, you have questions about your tax liability, you should call the IRS toll-free number, 1-800-829-1040 and ask for Publication 915, which contains tax information about Social Security benefits.

Beneficiaries who file an individual tax return may owe taxes on some of their benefits if their combined income exceed \$25,000. Married couples who file joint tax returns may have to pay taxes on some of their benefits if their combined income exceeds \$32,000. Married couples who live together but file separate tax returns probably will pay taxes on part of their benefits.

#### 1994 Social Security Taxes **Increase for Some Taxpayers**

Beginning January 1, 1994, the only taxpayers who will see an increase in their Social Security taxes are those who earn more than \$57,600. The 1994 "wage base," the maximum amount of earnings subject to Social Security tax, will be \$60,600, up from \$57,600 in 1993. The tax rate remains the same: 7.65 percent (6.2 percent for Social Security and 1.45 percent for Medicare). The tax rate for selfemployed individuals remains the same: 15.3 percent (12.4 percent for Social Security and 2.9 percent for Medicare).

Also beginning January 1, 1994, individuals who make more than \$60,600 will continue to pay the Medicare portion of the Social Security tax - 1.45 percent for wage earners and 2.9 percent for selfemployed - on the rest of their earnings. In 1993, they paid Medicare taxes only up to a \$135,000 wage

The amount of wages needed to earn one Social Security "credit" will be \$620 in 1994, up from \$590 in 1993. The maximum number of credits that can be earned each year is four. Thus, anyone earning more than \$2,480 in 1994 will receive the maximum of 4 credits for the year. To be eligible for Social Security benefits, a worker needs a specific number of credits. The number depends on his or her date of birth and the type of benefit involved. Most people need 40 credits to be eligible for retirement benefits, but some you qualify for disability and survivors benefits with as few as 6 credits.

#### Short-Term Railroad Workers **Collect Social Security Benefits**

"If you worked for the railroad industry, but not long enough to be eligible for an annuity when you're ready to retire, don't worry. Your railroad wages will count toward you Social Security if you had less than 10 years of railroad service," according to Jim Talbot, Social Security Manager in Amaril-

Generally, wages from railroad employment are not counted for Social Security if you had less than 10 years of railroad service," according to Jim Talbot, Social Security Manager in Amarillo.

Generally, wages from railroad employment are not counted for Social Security because railroad employees have a separate retirement system that is administered by the Railroad Retirement Board. "But, If you have fewer than 120 months of railroad service," Talbot said, "your railroad credits are transferred to Social Security upon retirement and combined with your wages (or self-employment income). Those combined railroad and Social Security earnings will be used to determine your Social Security benefits."

Social Security recently added Railroad earnings to the statements it provides individuals who want to check their earnings record or get an estimate of their Social Security benefits. "You can get an estimate by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, to ask for a Form SSA-7004 (Request for Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement)," Talbot said. "Complete and return the form in the envelope that accompanies it. Your personal earnings and Benefits Estimate Statement should arrive 4-6 weeks after Social Security receives your request."
