Crop **Certifications** Due In July

The Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service is currently accepting acreage reports for the 1994 farm program and other uses. All spring seeded crops planted for harvest, grazing, or cover crops for ACR and/or Conserving use acres must be reported. Producers should certify must be reported by September 15, 1994

Before reporting, farmers can request that ASCS measure their program acreage. The measurements are furnished at cost, and guaranteed for the crop year. Measurement service is not only valuable to the program participants, but to any farmer who desires an accurate acreage for any reason.

Farm program participants are required to correctly certify their entire farm after planting to be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and history credit. The reports contain crops and acreage planted, the uses to be made of these crops, acreage removed from crop production to the acreage conservation reserve (ACR) and conservation use acres for payment. ASCS urges producers who have not certified their springseeded crops. to do so before the July 15, deadline, please call 874-3561 for a certification appointment.

The children's Summer Reading Club is in progress. Special programs will be presented during the month of July. It's never too late for your children to begin participating. Why not check it out?


One At A Time

Recent news from the media headlines has been filled with violence and social injustice. Consequently, America has been shoved into the world's spotlight as a dangerous country to visit, yet the US remains to be the "dream" destination of many teenagers across the globe. Time To Treat For Cattle Grubs

Cattle grubs are internal parasites and their damage is largely unseen, yet they cause greater economic losses to the U.S. beef cattle industry than any other insect pest.

While grubs are usually found on the backs of infested animals during the winter months, that's not the time for control measures since the pests have already done their damage. Feed ef-ficiency and animal vigor are reduced in infested animals.

Grubs are the larvae or worm stage of heel flies, and adult heel Organization flies are active over most of the state from March through May.



GEESE WORK

(First of two parts) As a young man I watched huge flocks of geese migrate north and south over the Missouri farm where I grew up. Over the years I learned to love the honking sounds and watching the big V formations fly overhead

Although I loved the geese, I remember feeling sad in the fall as the flocks traveled southward because I knew winter would soon arrive. Winter meant cold, bitter ' an uplift for others behind it. successful. weather and more work to ensure the safety and health of our livestock.

The northbound flights of spring were early indicators that warm weather was on its way. It meant no more ice to chop or hay to feed. Spring brought new green growth, warm sunny days and pleasant activities around the farm. I didn't know about the

wonderful lessons being taught in the sky as I performed my routine chores. I just enjoyed the sights and sounds.

Geese Lessons

Bill and Marty Geist, owners of Gingiss Formalwear Center in Amarillo, TX, shared an essay with me last month. It is titled "Lessons Learned from Geese.'

As I read the essay I remembered those early farm days I described above. I was also reminded that we as small business owners and managers need to be alert for business building lessons regardless of the source. I extracted several thoughts from the "Geese" essay. I think you'll agree as you read them that we can even learn from the birds.

According to the essay, as each goose flaps it wings, it creates

The lesson we can glean from this information is that people who share a common sense of direction and purpose are more successful. They can work longer and accomplish more because they feed off the energy of others.

Another interesting fact is that when the lead goose tires, it rotates back into the formation and another bird takes over. This allows a fresh goose to keep up the pace while the leader takes a breather.

The message here is that shared leadership and independence gives others a chance to lead as well as follow. While being the lead goose may improve the view, the work is harder. Everyone needs a break from the routine and a fresh perspective may improve your attitude.

I also learned from the essay the reason geese honk as they fly. (It's not because they are passing another goose.) The geese in formation honk to encourage the leaders to keep up the speed.

The lesson here is to make certain our honks are encouraging. We all need a friendly honk from time-to-time. In business, it may be a word of praise or a pat on the back for a job well done. Encouragement is a good team builder.

The final point in the essay dealt with being supportive. When an ill or injured goose can't keep up with the flock, other geese will drop out of the formation and stay with it until it revives or dies. Then they catch up with the flock or join a new one

The point here is that your colleagues may need help from time-to-time. We should stand by them in bad times as well as good.

A Social Security Message For Brides-To-Be

It's the time of year when many brides-to-be are busy with a list of "things to do" before their wedding. The Social Security Administration (SSA) would like them to add one important, but easily managed item, to that list.

"If you're going to change your name when you marry, remember to tell Social Security," says Jim Talbot, manager of the Amarillo Social Security office.

for women who are working, reporting a name change assures that they will receive proper credit for their earnings and, one day, all the Social Security benefits they are due. For women who don't work outside the home, reporting the change will ensure that their Social Security record shows the correct name when the times comes to apply for benefits.

Another important reason to report your change of name is that Internal Revenue Service and SSA records should show the same name and Social Security number. If they don't, your tax refund could be postponed.

"Of course, if a woman continues to use her maiden name after marriage, as many women do today," said Talbot, "they don't

> Talbot reminds everyone that the service is free. "Don't be misled by any business that offers-for a fee--to complete the paperwork for you. The process is simple and you don't need to pay anyone for a revised Social Security card."

> SSI Changes May Affect Some **Military Personnel**

> Recent changes in the rules governing the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program can affect a number of men and women serving in the armed forces, according to Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo.

> SSI disability benefits are paid to individuals who have low income and few assets if they also meet the disability program criteria. Children are also eligible if the impairment is as severe as one that would disable an adult.

> Until recently, the law has provided continuing SSI benefit payments to the blind or disabled children who accompany their parents on military duty to Puerto Rico or to U.S. territories or possessions

> Congress has provided new legislation which changes the way Social Security treats the income of military families when the service member is away from home on duty assignment. To prevent any ad-verse effect on eligibility for, and the amount of, SSI payments, a spouse or parent who is away from home solely because of active military duty generally will be considered to be living in the same household as the individual(s) who are receiving SSI payments.

> Talbot explained that "the purpose is to prevent SSI payments from being reduced as a result of the spouse or parent being absent from the household, which sometimes occurred under the previous rules.'

In a related action, Talbot noted that Congress also excluded hostile fire pay from income computations for determining SSI eligibility and payment amount.
