## Its Hot and Dry As Mercury Tops 107

Starting last Saturday the mercury began to climb and reached the century mark. It moved up a degree Sunday and Monday and then topped it off with a sizzling 107 degrees Tuesday.  
As far as farmers and ranchers are concerned, the situation is becoming quite critical as there is not sufficient moisture to plant areas and grass is dying. Irrigation farmers who had their cotton up saw many acres destroyed by the wind and blowing sand over the week end and the wind remained extremely high for several days. Others who had enough moisture to barely get their cotton and feed up watched it dry out and burn up. Moisture is needed extremely bad at this time and the situation will grow more acute if the moisture holds off much longer.  
In the moisture department, we have recorded only .07 so far this month and only 4.55 for the year. The total to this time last year was 9.51 inches and June is usually a wet month.

## News From City Hall

We have been asked from time to time why News from City Hall is not in the paper every week. Our answer would be, that as little as you would think, it does take a certain amount of time to write and get to the newspaper before the deadline. We try, but do not always have time at the right minute to get this done, and there is not always something newsworthy to come from City Hall. It would seem rather ridiculous to say that the Aldermen and Mayor voted for the Bills to be paid or that there was a long discussion as to the merits of a D7 over a D6.  
Well back to things at hand and to bring you up to date on Sirens and Airports and all the other old business and new business.  
We have given up on Civil Defense ever getting us any Sirens. We are going ahead and ordering them ourselves. They will cost the City quite a bit more money, but if we don't go on with it and get them ordered the chances are they would not be here for next years Tornado season.  
They have completed the paving of the Airport and as soon as it is accepted by the Federal Aviation Agency, we will go to work with the Texas Aviation Commission and get the low intensity lights installed. So you see, it should not be too much longer before this will all be completed. Let me make it perfectly clear that no City money has been expended for the Airport. This work has all been done with Federal and State funds plus the money that the interested citizens gave for this purpose.  
We are having some problems with Water pressure the past several days. We are looking into this and will be able to correct some of it but not all.  
The Fire Prevention and Engineering Bureau of Texas was in town a few weeks ago and checked our fire equipment along with everything else. It is their opinion that we need some new fire equipment. We all agree, but this takes money, a lot of money and it is sometimes hard to come by.  
We have been kicking around the idea of going to a City Sales Tax. I believe that we are the only City around this area who has not gone to the Sales Tax. We purposely held off to see if we could get by without it, but it looks like we are going to have to go the route of the Sales Tax to help pay for a new Fire Truck and some other Heavy equipment that is needed by the City for Sanitation Land Fill that is required now.

## KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF DONLEY

THAT THIS CONTRACT, COVENANT, and AGREEMENT is entered into by and between the Board of Managers of Adair Hospital, located in Clarendon, Donley County, Texas, acting by and through the chairman of such Board after having first been duly authorized to so act by such Board of Managers, hereinafter called party of the first part, and Geo. W. Smith, of Donley County, Texas, hereinafter called the party of the second part, witnesseseth:

WHEREAS Adair Hospital formerly was owned and operated by The Adair Hospital, a Texas Corporation, but the same has recently been deeded by such corporation to Donley County and the City of Clarendon; and,

WHEREAS, the party of the first part, being the Board of Managers of Adair Hospital, has recently, in the manner provided by law for the creation of such Board of Managers, been appointed by the Commissioners Court of Donley County, Texas and the Board of Commissioners of the City of Clarendon, which said Board of Managers now has all the power and authority provided by law that it should have to enter into this contract; and,

WHEREAS, there has heretofore been voted in both Donley County and the City of Clarendon a tax as provided by law in such cases not to exceed 10c on the \$100.00 valuation of the property subject to taxes in said Donley County and the State of Texas; and,

WHEREAS, the party of the first part is now in control of said Adair Hospital and are in need of a manager thereof; and,

WHEREAS, the party of the second part is a medical doctor, capable and competent of managing such hospital and is desirous of assuming the responsibility of the management of such hospital.

THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto that the party of the first part employ the party of the second part as the manager of such hospital, and the party of the first part does hereby employ the party of the second part as manager of The Adair Hospital, and the party of the second part shall and does hereby assume the duties as such manager, and the parties hereto do hereby mutually agree to such matters on the following terms and conditions, to-wit:

1. The terms and provisions of this contract shall become operative and binding upon the parties hereto on and after the 1st day of October, 1956, and shall remain in full force and effect until the 1st day of October, 1966. Unless the party of the second part shall have given written notice to the party of the first part of his intention not to renew this contract NINETY days before the expiration date thereof, this contract shall automatically be renewed without further agreements between the parties hereto for an ADDITIONAL TEN YEARS from the 1st day of October, 1966 until the 1st day of October, 1976, and at the expiration of such second ten year period unless the party of the second part shall have given written notice to the party of the first part of his intention not to renew this contract ninety days before the expiration date thereof, this contract shall automatically be renewed without further agreements between the parties hereto for an ADDITIONAL TEN YEARS from the 1st day of October, 1976 until the 1st day of October 1986.

of the second part for the operation and maintenance of the hospital the sum equal to the sum total of the amount received and collected by Donley County and the City of Clarendon each year, including delinquent tax payments, on the above mentioned 10c on the \$100.00 valuation, such sum to be placed at the disposal of the party of the second part at the end of each month that the same is received. From the proceeds received by the party of the second part, the party of the second part shall MAKE NECESSARY IMPROVEMENTS to the building, shall make repairs and maintain the buildings, grounds, and equipment, shall pay all utility bills, shall pay for all equipment and supplies that the party of the second part may deem necessary, shall pay the salaries of all hospital personnel, and all hazard and liability insurance on the property in such amount as may be agreed upon between the parties hereto; but it is expressly agreed and understood that the party of the second part is not limited to the above mentioned items but the party of the second part is further authorized to expend such sum of money in any manner as he may deem necessary for the operation and maintenance of the hospital.

3. The earnings from the operation of the hospital are to be used as a supplement to the tax fund as herein mentioned for purposes of paying operating and maintenance expenses of the hospital insofar as the same may be needed, but out of the excess of said earnings, if any, after paying such operating and maintenance expenses, and as a consideration to the party of the second part for the performance of duties as manager of the hospital, the party of the second part shall be paid the sum of \$12,000.00 per year or so much thereof as funds available will permit, such year to be computed from October 1st to October 1st. In com-

puting earnings available for such purpose, computation shall be made on a cash receipts and cash disbursements basis.

4. As part of the consideration and conditions of this contract for the party of the second part performing his duties as manager of the said hospital, it is distinctly understood and agreed that the party of the second part may make full use of all hospital buildings, equipment, grounds, personnel, and facilities in his private practice of medicine and surgery without charge to him.

5. The party of the second part shall keep all necessary records of account and otherwise, and shall account to the party of the first part as to the income and expenditure of all funds semi-annually at a time convenient to the party of the second part.

6. At the sole discretion of the party of the second part, the party of the second part may make available the facilities of the hospital to any other licensed medical doctor or dentist of his choosing. However, if under the law as the same now exists or might hereafter be adopted, if any practitioner of a healing art, other than one duly licensed as a medical doctor or dentist by the appropriate state licensing boards, should be granted the privilege of the hospital facilities, that in such event the party of the second part shall have the option to terminate this contract at anytime prior to the date that the same might otherwise terminate.

7. In the event of the death or the total or permanent disability of the party of the second part, his executor, administrator, agent, personal representative, or any other duly authorized person shall have the option and privilege of terminating this contract prior to the date that the same might otherwise terminate. In addition thereto, if in any consecutive six months period an operating loss, computed on a cash receipts and disbursements basis, exceeds one-half of the taxes collected for the use and benefit of the hospital for the previous year and paid to the party of the second part, the party of the second part shall have the option and privilege to terminate this contract at such time as might be advisable to him.

8. It is understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto that any tax money that is paid to the party of the second part is and shall be construed to be separate and apart from any welfare funds or other funds of like nature of both the City of Clarendon and Donley County, and the party of the second part is neither obligated nor expected by the party of the first part to place any patient or patients in the hospital at his expense, or to provide the facilities of the hospital because tax money is used therefor, or because any proper public authority may adjudge any person to be an indigent or welfare patient, and any expense of any indigent or welfare patient as may be so adjudged by the proper authorities shall be paid by such public authority to the extent of their customary authority or limits.

9. It is further understood by and between the parties hereto that The Adair Hospital shall remain a City-County Hospital as the same is legally defined by law, and any word, clause, sentence, or provision contained herein to the contrary which should be construed by any State or Federal governmental agency or authority of having the effect of making the hospital an institution other than a City-County Hospital, shall automatically be eliminated from this contract.

10. The party of the second part shall have the title of "Hospital Superintendent," and shall and does

hereby agree to comply with the standard and customary rules and regulations pertaining to the operation of a hospital, shall exercise his own, good and reasonable judgment concerning the careful use and management thereof, shall employ and/or discharge such personnel as he shall deem adequate, necessary or proper, exercise general managerial control, and at the termination of this contract to leave such premises and equipment in as good a condition as when received, less reasonable wear and tear and expendable use thereof, and less damage or destruction thereof by accidental fire, act of God, or other cause beyond the control of the party of the second part.

WHEREFORE, witness our hands this the 20th day of November, 1956.

The Board of Managers of Adair Hospital met June 29th, 1966 at the Donley County Abstract Company Office with the following members present: Mike M. McCully, Mrs. J. D. Swift, Charlotte Adams, F. E. Chamberlain, Jr., and Jane Bowns. Dr. George W. Smith, Administrator of the Adair Hospital was present for the meeting. The President, Mike McCully, called the meeting to order.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Dr. Smith explained in detail the inspection made of the Hospital in trying to get Adair Hospital approved for Medicare. Also about the Auditors which had been to the Hospital inspecting the books and methods of operations for Medicare. Dr. Smith reported that the Hospital had been approved for Medicare as of this date.

Dr. Smith read the By-Laws, Rules and Regulations of the Medical and Dental Staff of the Adair Hospital. Motion was made by F. E. Chamberlain, Jr., that we approve the By-Laws, Rules and Regulations of the Medical and Dental Staff as read. Motion was seconded by Charlotte Adams. Motion carried.

The President read a letter from Dr. Smith pertaining to paragraph 7 of the Contract of 11-20-56 between the Board of Managers of Adair Hospital, party of the first part, and George W. Smith, party of the second part, and asked the Board to amend the paragraph 7 to read as follows:

"7. In the event of the death or the total or permanent disability of the party of the second part, his executor, administrator, agent, personal representative, or any other duly authorized person shall have the option and privilege of terminating this contract prior to the date that the same might otherwise terminate. In addition thereto, if the operation of the hospital be such that sufficient funds are not available for payment of the agreed annual salary to the party of the second part, or if circumstances should arise wherein the hospital should lose or be denied license, contract, or approval by Blue Cross-Blue Shield or by State or Federal regulatory agencies, the party of the second part shall have the option and privilege to terminate this contract at such time as might be advisable to him."

Motion was made by Charlotte Adams that paragraph 7 of the Contract be amended as read. Motion was seconded by F. E. Chamberlain, Jr. Motion carried.

Jane Bowns reported to the Board that J. R. Brandon a member of the board appointed by the County has asked that he be relieved from the duties as a board member. The Board accepted his resignation and asked Jane Bowns to meet with the County Commissioners and request them to appoint a new member to the Board of Managers.

Each member of the Board expressed their appreciation to Dr. Smith for the many things that he, Dr. Gilkey and their staff have done to keep Adair Hospital operating and all of their efforts in making the Hospital a Medicare Hospital.

Meeting adjourned, subject to call.

Miss Bell notes that the intelligent older woman becomes more interesting with years, especially with wisdom, wit and the understanding of men she can expect to be sought as a marriage partner. With a longer and healthier life, the more independent retirees are apt to enter into the 'twilight' marriage. We can expect to see them grow in number.

Three New Parks Something Different

Texas' three newest parks represent a new era for the Texas Parks system.

Two of the parks, Dinosaur Valley near Glen Rose and Pedernales Falls near Johnson City, are the first parks acquired under the \$75 million bond program passed by voters in 1967. The third, Hueco Tanks near El Paso, was acquired as a gift.

Each of the new parks represents a departure from any other type of park in the State parks system.

For example, Hueco Tanks offers as an attraction fantastic geological formations, an equally prominent history and a major archeological find.

The Spanish word "hueco" means hole or hollow. The tanks consist of natural water-holding depressions in limestone, surrounded by huge granite blocks rising from 200 to 400 feet above the desert floor.

The depressions in the limestone make natural "cisterns" which store a great amount of water during the wet season. In this parched country any quantity of water at all draws man and beast like a magnet, and Hueco Tanks was the only water supply for many miles.

Apache, Kiowa and Comanche Indians camped there and left behind cave drawings telling adventures and sorrows, their triumphs and superstitions.

For not only is there water, but the giant igneous monoliths, with labyrinths of caves and tunnels, form an excellent fortress.

Sandals and basketware found in the caves furnish evidence that an early Pueblo tribe inhabited the area around 300 to 500 A.D.

It was here the last great Indian battle in El Paso County was fought when some early settlers tracked marauding Apaches across the desert to the tanks, besieged them in their caves, and slaughtered them.

The tanks served as a watering place for the Butterfield Overland Mail.

Dinosaur Valley State Park has as its central attraction footprints of dinosaurs made approximately 100 million years ago.

The footprints, located along the Paluxy River, which flows over solid rock and contains the best preserved tracks in the State. It was in this area that the first sauropod tracks in the world were recognized.

The park was recommended for inclusion in the National Registry of Natural Landmarks of the Department of the Interior by Governor Preston Smith.

Pedernales Falls State Park offers as its main attraction 4,800 acres of unparalleled, unspoiled Hill Country scenery.

The park, formerly known as the Wheatley Ranch or Circle Bar Ranch, is located on the banks of the Pedernales River and encompasses spectacular waterfalls and deep clear pools.

Park planners indicate they will develop the park in such a way as to have the facilities for visitors concentrated, leaving most of the park in a wild state.

At the moment all three parks offer plenty of scenery and little else. Limited picnic facilities and chemical toilets will be available after the parks are open to the public.

In Pedernales Falls State Park, two parking areas will be made available; swimming and wading in the park will be restricted to certain areas.

The three parks will be open in the day — from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. in the summer and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the winter. A news release last week incorrectly listed opening day as July 1, instead of the correct June 1.

WHAT WELFARE COSTS IN NEW YORK CITY

WASHINGTON — More than 5,000 persons are added to the welfare rolls of New York City every month, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

If the present trend continues for another decade nearly one quarter of the residents—or 2,000,000 New Yorkers—will be on the dole. At present, 1.1 million are collecting welfare each month.

The cost of the city's welfare is \$1.9 billion this year. The Federal Government is paying \$825.7 million, the state \$520.1 million and the city \$566.4 million.

Texas Cotton Farmers Support 7-Step Program Plan

Though there have been many changes in practices and methods over the 24-year period since the 7-Step Cotton Program was initiated by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, its basic objectives are still very sound.

Last year, Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist, said that more than 47,000 farmers used cotton in their balanced farming program and followed other recommendations outlined in production guides and planned county programs.

Machines and chemicals continue to be vitally important to growers in cost-cutting. Elliott said, almost half of last year's acreage was treated with pre-emergence chemicals for weed and grass control. After the crop was up and growing, chemicals and mechanical equipment were used to keep weeds and grass under control; thus largely eliminating hand hoeing, he noted.

As harvest season approached, chemicals again were used as defoliants or desiccants to get fields in condition for mechanical harvesting. More than 51,000 farmers, he noted, used harvest-aid chemicals.

Then came the army of strippers and mechanical pickers to do the harvesting job. An estimated 39,675 strippers were used to harvest 73 percent of the state's 1969 production while 5,762 mechanical pickers accounted for another 25 percent. Thus, 98 percent of last year's production was harvested with machines, he said.

Elliott took a backwards look at what has happened to per acre cotton lint yields in Texas for the last 90 years. From 1880 until the boll weevil hit in 1901, yields averaged over 200 pounds per acre. In 1901 it dropped to 148 pounds and only twice from then until 1946, when the 7-Step Program started, did yearly averages exceed 200 pounds per acre.

The all-time record yield was posted in 1968 at 410 pounds per acre with a 408 average in 1965. Over the last 20 years, he noted, yields have trended upward. This period, he also noted, has seen the most rapid advances made in using research findings and demonstration results.

The veteran cotton specialist credits many changes for the improved yield picture. Soil testing and fertilizer use, rotation systems, improved varieties, better cultural practices, more effective insect control programs, development of more effective chemicals for weed and grass control and larger and better machines and equipment to name a few. Irrigation has also been a heavy contributor in many areas.

But, he added, it has been the cotton farmer's acceptance of the new ideas which have been of utmost importance. We're doing the production job a great deal differently from just a few years ago and the pace of change is not expected to slow much in the future, he predicted.

Count Your Pennies

When pennies count consider thrifty trades. One of the first targets in a family economy drive often is the food budget, reached without sacrificing either good food or good nutrition.

That takes a keen sense of healthful food values in relation to food costs, plus good judgment. Basically it calls for choices made from each of the four food groups — meat—eggs; milk—cheese; vegetables—fruit; and bread—cereals.

For a starter, Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist suggests the following:

HIGH COST — Calves' liver, frozen halibut steaks, prime rib beef roast, porterhouse steak, ground sirloin, canned red salmon, sweetbreads, center sliced ham, fresh orange juice, wheat flakes, whole milk, fancy sweet rolls, soft drink.

MODERATE COST — beef liver, frozen cod or haddock, rump roast, rib steak, ground beef, canned pink salmon, tongue, ham shank, frozen orange juice, shredded wheat, evaporated milk, raisen bread, canned fruit juices.

LOW COST — pork liver, frozen ocean perch, chuck roast, cube steak, hamburger, canned mackerel, heart, canned luncheon meat, canned orange juice, cooked whole wheat cereal, dry milk solids, cinnamon toast, lemonade from canned juice.

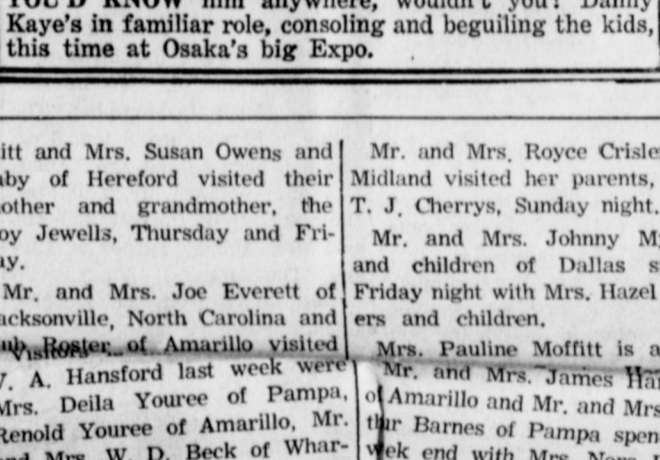

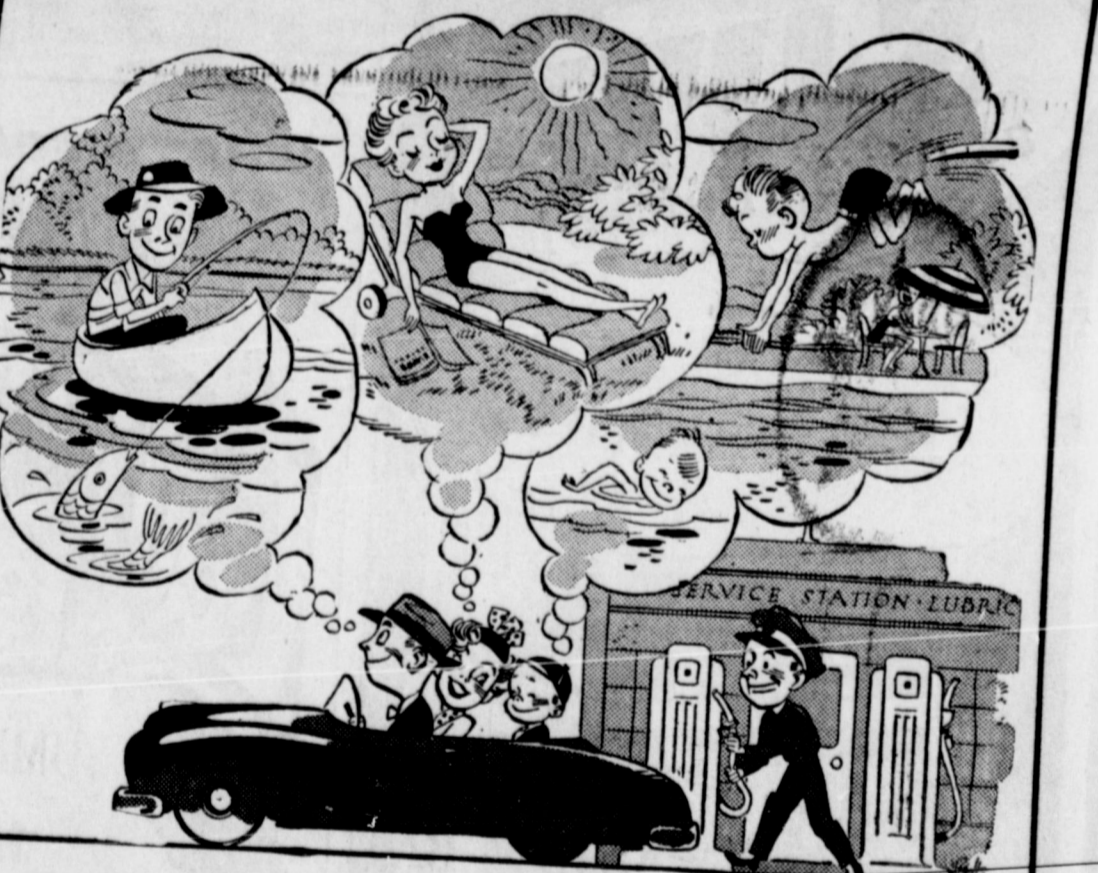

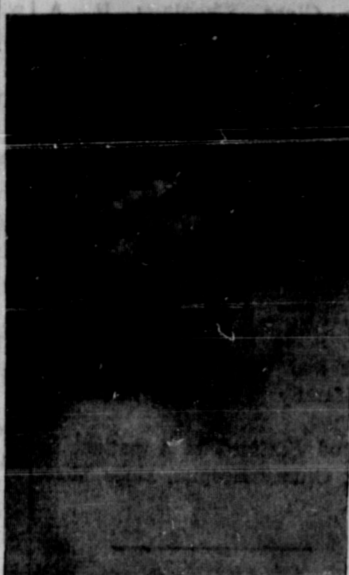

## Taxpayers Ask IRS

Q—Is it true you can deduct the expenses of a house-hunting trip under the new tax law?

A—If the move is for job reasons and you meet the mileage and employment tests, you may be able to deduct your transportation, meals and lodging costs on a house-hunting trip. This provision was added in the 1969 Tax Reform Act and is effective for tax years beginning after December 31, 1969.

Other expenses that may now be deductible under the new law are meal and lodging costs for up to 30 days at the new job location. Expenses related to the sale of a house or the settlement of a lease to the old job location and the purchase of a house or acquisition of a lease at the new location also may be deducted for the first time.

The total amount that may be deducted under these new provisions is \$2,500. Not more than \$1,000 of this may be for house-hunting trips or living costs.

Q—When are companies supposed to start withholding taxes at the lower rates?

A—The new withholding rates become effective the first pay-day after June 30, 1970. Tables showing the amounts to be withheld will be sent to employers in June.

The new rates will be lower since there will be no withholding for the income tax surcharge which is due to expire June 30, 1970. Also, each exemption will be worth \$50 for withholding purposes rather than \$600, after that date.

Q—Will the Post Office forward my refund check to my new address?

A—Yes, your refund check will be forwarded if you have left a change of address notice at your former Post Office. Failure to provide this information to the Post Office held up thousands of refund checks last year. They were returned to IRS because the Post Office did not have an up-to-date address for these taxpayers'.

When this happens, the refund count and reissued as soon as the new address is obtained.

Any taxpayers who moved without giving his Postmaster his new address and has waited at least ten weeks for a refund, should send his name, new address and Social Security number to the IRS service center where he filed his return and ask that the refund be mailed.

Q—How much should I pay on my estimated tax?

A—Use the worksheet you fill-out when you filed your estimated 1970 declaration to determine the amount of your second installment. Make whatever adjustments are needed to take care of any changes in your estimated income and deductible occurred since you filed your declaration.

Q—If I provide room and board for a student this summer, can I claim any deduction for what I spend?

A—If the student is a member of your household under a written agreement between you and a qualified organization in order to provide him educational opportunities, then your costs may be deductible as a charitable contribution. The deduction must be for a full-time student up to the 12th grade, who is neither your dependent nor relative, at an educational institution located in the United States. The amount of the deduction may not exceed \$50 times the number of full calendar months of your tax during which the student is a member of your household.

Social Security News

Q—I have a power of attorney to handle my husband's business affairs because he is incompetent. Is this sufficient to enable me to endorse and cash his checks from social security?

A—No, it is not. You should file an application with the Social Security Administration to be made payee for your husband. The checks will then show your name as payee for your husband and you can legally endorse them.

Q—I need two more quarters of social security in order to qualify for benefits. Is there some way that I could just pay in some money to obtain credits?

A—This is not possible. In order to obtain additional quarters of credit you must either work on a job covered by social security or actually be engaged in a trade or business as a self-employed person.

Q—Some of my social security checks were withheld in 1969 because I thought I would earn over \$1680. As it turned out, I earned a little less than that amount. How can I apply for these payments?

A—You should file an annual report of earnings with the Social Security Administration. You will then receive a check for any amount due for 1969.

Q—When I applied for my social security card I used my nickname. Now I go by the name as shown on my birth certificate. How do I get my card changed?

A—We are sending you a form entitled "Request for Change in Social Security Records." Fill it out, sign it, and mail to this office with your present card. We will send you a corrected card by return mail.

Swine Production in Plains Area of Texas Analyzed

Recent developments in swine production have resulted in a rapid expansion of the swine industry in certain sections of Texas, especially in the Plains areas.

Advances in production technology and favorable prices have caused many farm operators to consider swine as a possible supplemental enterprise in their farming operation, according to research and extension economists at Texas A&M University.

A study just released as PR-2756 by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station analyzes the economics of swine enterprises in the Plains area of Texas, dealing principally with partial confinement systems. Graduate Students W. R. March and J. M. Spratt in A&M's Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology made the study.

They point out if a farm operator has the management ability and available capital, the addition of a swine enterprise can provide a means for maintaining or perhaps increasing his net income.

The researchers have provided in the publication detailed budgets on investment costs and returns under different conditions, emphasizing the importance of good management in the operation of a hog business. They conclude that an "above average" manager can profitably produce hogs in the Plains areas as long as the price of Number 1 and 2 barrows and gilts exceed 18 cents per pound and milt prices are below \$2.00 per hundredweight.

On the other hand "average" management as defined in the study would need a price of three cents per pound more for hogs marketed to show a profit under the same system. They looked at hog prices over a period of 16 years and found that the price of 18 cents per pound occurred 94 percent of the time over a recent 16 year period, but only about 50 percent of the time over the 16 years studied.

The authors estimate that a total investment of \$600 or more per sow is required for a partial confinement farrow to finish system in the Plains areas. For a 120-sow system, fixed cost is estimated at \$2.13 and available cost at \$15.28 for a total of \$7.41 per hundred weight of hogs marketed.

This should yield, they say, an estimated annual return to management of \$7,600, basing the price of Number 1 and 2 hogs at \$18.75 per hundredweight.

The authors point out that this is the first report in a project designed to estimate the economic importance of hogs in Texas under the different conditions which exist and is based upon information obtained from Plains growers during 1969.

Copies of the Progress Report are available from the Department of Agricultural Information, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843 or from area Extension Service farm management specialists. Local county agricultural agents can also assist interested persons in obtaining a copy.

Selective Service

Q—If I appeal an action of the draft board, may I appear in person before the appeal board?

A—No. Only your record goes before the appeal board. You can put anything in your record you wish.

Q—When I appeal my draft board's decision, may I retain an attorney to counsel me?

A—You may have a private attorney if you desire. The government appeal agent of the local board can render you this service free. He is charged with the duty of advising you of your rights and he can assist you in taking an appeal. No attorney may represent you before the board as legal counsel.

Q—I am a conscientious objector and have completed the special form for a conscientious objector, which I have forwarded to my draft board. Now the board has asked that I appear to explain my views in more detail. Does this interview count as one granted under the law as a personal appearance, or may I have another appearance if I desire?

Your board may, if there is any question about granting you a conscientious objector classification, invite you to meet with the board for an interview prior to classification. The primary purpose of this interview is to develop further facts on which the claim is based and the sincerity of it. The interview does not take the place of the personal appearance after classification.

SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFIT STATISTICS

Social Security benefits paid to residents of Donley County totaled \$65,000 a month as 1969 ended, Travis C. Briggs, social security district manager, reported today.

A benefit increase, signed into law by President Nixon on December 30, 1968, has since raised the monthly rate of payment by 15 percent for the 912 social security beneficiaries in Donley County, Briggs noted.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Donley County, 638 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 182 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 76 are getting benefits as disabled workers or the dependents of disabled workers.
