Notice For Hospital Election Published This Week In Leader

The full text of the Legal Notice calling for the Hospital election is being published in this issue of the Leader. It carries both the propositions of creating the hospital district and also the voting of bonds toward the construction of a new hospital.

According to Mike McCully, Chairman of the Hospital Board, the local hospital has been operating on a temporary approval basis for the care of Medicare patients and it is hoped that the calling of this election will prove to Inspectors of the Medicare and Medicaid programs that an effort is being made to improve the situation here in Donley County. Under new standards, the local hospital does not meet new requirements of the physical structure of the building. If the hospital loses its approval, senior citizens will no longer receive any help from the Medicare or Medicaid program at the local hospital.

A floor plan of the proposed hospital may be seen at the Donley County Abstract Co. office. In addition to many other facilities, it will contain a 20 acute bed wing and a 30 bed extended care wing. An administrator will be hired to supervise the operation of the hospital by the Hospital Board.

Mrs. Bugbee, 92, died January 22 in San Bernardino, California where she had lived since 1942. She was married to Thomas Everett Bugbee, Sr. December 30, 1903 in Dallas being the former Mary Jane Carroll of Dallas. They made their home in Clarendon as Mr. Bugbee was the son of one of the first ranchers to come to the Texas Panhandle and make a permanent home.

Mr. Bugbee's death came January 30, 1917. The family moved to California and lived in Long Beach before moving to San Bernardino.

Surviving are three daughters: Mary Isabell Bugbee, Mrs. P. B. Long, and Mrs. H. A. Pool, all of California; five grandchildren and five great-grandsons.

Dr. Albert V. Jellen Joins Active Staff At Adair Hospital

Dr. Albert V. Jellen has been appointed to the active staff at Adair Hospital, according to announcement by M. M. McCully, President of Hospital Board of Managers. Dr. Jellen received his M.D. degree in Austria from the University of Graz in 1963 and has since completed a three year residency at Hartberg Hospital, Austria, with three years additional residency training at Royal Victoria Hospital in Bournemouth, England, at University Hospital in Graz, Austria, and in the Bradford Royal Infirmary in England. Prior to moving to Clarendon, Dr. Jellen was in practice in Clifton, Texas since July, 1969. He received his permanent license to practice in Texas after examination by the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners.

Dr. Jellen was accompanied in the move to Clarendon by his wife, Elizabeth, and two year old daughter, Michaela. They will reside in the old Frank White residence at the corner of Kearney and Sixth Streets. His offices will be in the Adair Hospital.

Mrs. Jellen is a registered nurse, having completed four years professional training at David Lewis Northern Hospital in Liverpool, England. Additional training was received at Post-Graduate Medical School of London and Stobhill Hospital in Glasgow, Scotland, and Mrs. Jellen was designated in 1963 as a State Certified Midwife by the Board of Midwives of Great Britain. Her practice included staff work at Jersey General Hospital, and at Western General Hospital of Edinburgh, in addition to hospital work in Graz, Austria.

Be sure you are counted when the final tally is made as there will be numerous important elections this year and you will have an opportunity to express your own desire through your own vote.

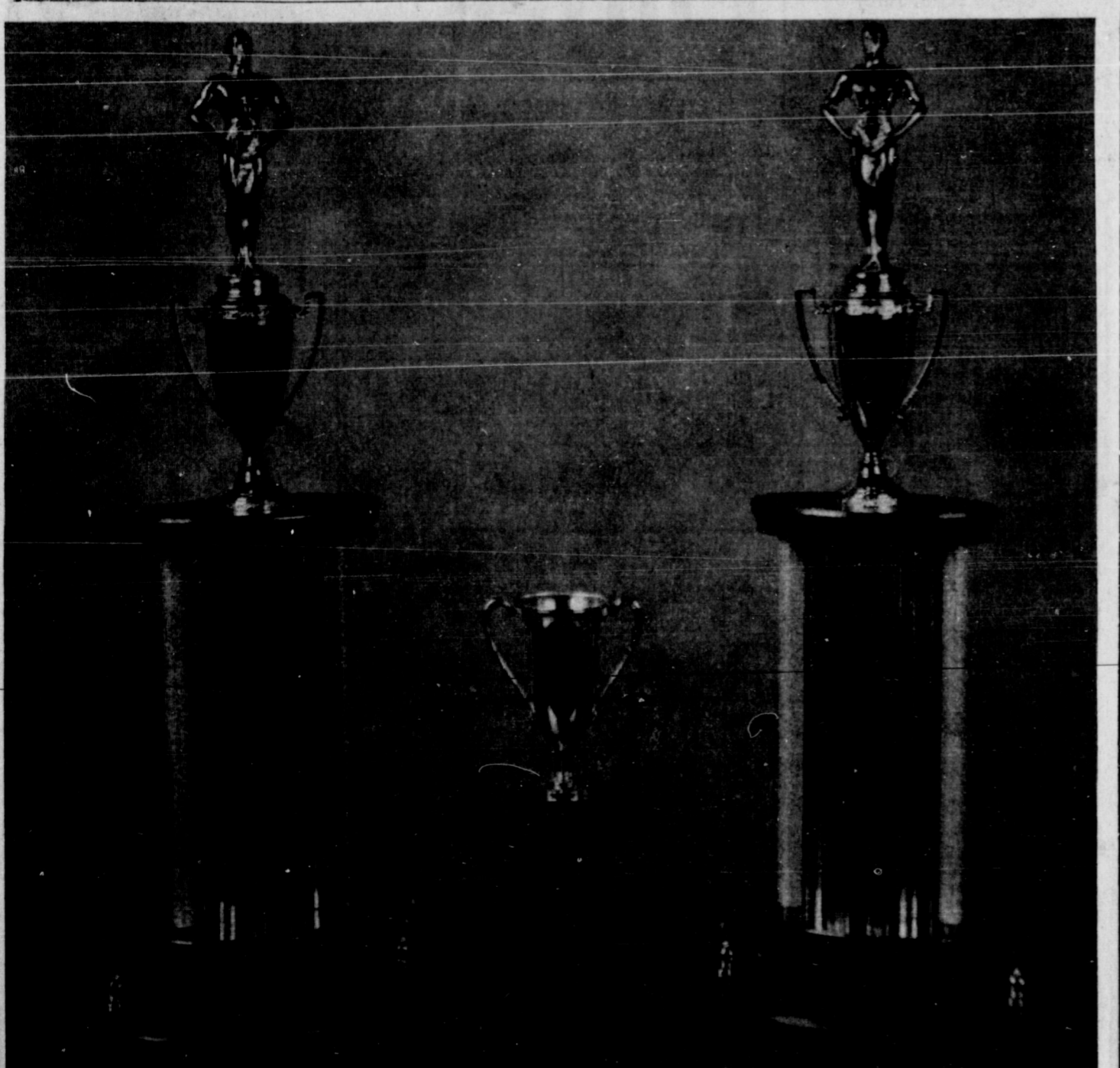

Jayhawks Overpower Bulldogs 81-66 In Saturday Night Game

The Clarendon College Bulldogs dropped their fourth Western Junior College Athletic Conference game 81-66 last Saturday night when they traveled to Big Spring to tangle with Howard County Junior College. This was the first of ten straight ball games which the Bulldogs will play on the road before coming back home for their final three games, February 26, 27, and March 2.

The Dogs incorporated a 1-2-3 zone and played a controlled offense to try to upend Howard County, one of the conference favorites. The slow down tactics worked to keep the Dogs in the game, but nine costly turnovers and failure to get offensive rebounds hurt their cause to give the Jayhawks a loss on their home court, something which rarely happens.

The Jayhawks jumped out to a nine point lead in the early going, but the patience and shooting of Tony Moya, Russ Harris, and Rene Ornes got the Bulldogs back into the ball game, and with 8:30 left in the half, the

Bulldogs took the lead 27-25. The lead switched hands several times before the Hawks forced the Dogs into three quick turnovers, and capitalized by building an eight point lead. The half ended with Howard County leading 39-31.

Employing the same slow down style, the Bulldogs came back the second half to cut the lead to four with 14:30 to go. At this point the ball game changed complexion as the Jayhawks got their running game going, and quickly vaulted into a 14 point lead. Lyn Payne, 5' 9" guard from Quitaque, kept the Dogs alive with his hustling defensive play, and offensive thrust of seven points as the tempo of the game picked up. With a little over eight minutes to play, the Jayhawks opened up a 20 point lead forcing the Bulldogs to apply the pressure with a man to man defense. The Bulldogs cut the lead to twelve with 2:30 to go, but could get no closer.
