NEWS FROM Congressman Bob Price 18th District, Texas

Congressman Bob Price, of Pampa, has urged the Senate Public Works Committee to approve the McClellan Creek Watershed Project. In testimony before the Senate Committee, Rep. Price said the McClellan Creek Watershed Project is a sound and feasible project, one that will make a very significant contribution to the water resource development program in Northwest Texas.

Speaking of the need for the project Price said, "I have seen the havoc caused by floods in this watershed. I have seen fertile hay meadows covered with sterile sand. I have seen roads and bridges washed away, necessitating many extra miles of travel for the people living and traveling in the watershed." "This project is badly needed and long overdue," he added.

McClellan Creek Watershed encompasses approximately 348 square miles of land in the Northwest Texas counties of Carson, Gray and Donley. Almost 30 percent of this area is crop land, 3 percent pasture and hay land, and 66 percent ranch land. The production and sale of cash crops of wheat, cotton, and grain sorghum together with ranching constitute primary sources of area income. Price was instrumental in getting the project approved by the House of Representatives last December. Senate approval will mean the project will go ahead after nine years of planning, in which watershed residents have spent over \$1.3 million in applying conservation practices to individual farms and ranches.

The State of Oklahoma registered concern to the Senate Committee that the Texas Project might drain water from Oklahoma, but Price countered by pointing out that the two states had resolved such matters on the state level for the past 14 years and that he saw no need or reason for the Federal government to become involved in the dispute. The Texas Water Commission representative echoed Prices' sentiments and said if need be a new clause in the McClellan Creek Work Plan could be inserted and agreed upon appropriation of disputed water and costs between the two states.

Farmers Urged To Participate In ASC Elections

The ASC elections this year will be held September 11. Ballots will be mailed to voters about September 1. Farmer voters will elect three community committeemen and two alternates in each community in the county.

We are urging farmers to nominate candidates for community committee posts by petition. Any sheet of paper listing one candidate and having signatures of at least six eligible voters will serve as a nominating petition. Voters may sign as many petitions as they want.

The nomination - by - petition period for ASC community elections opened July 28 and will continue through August 17.

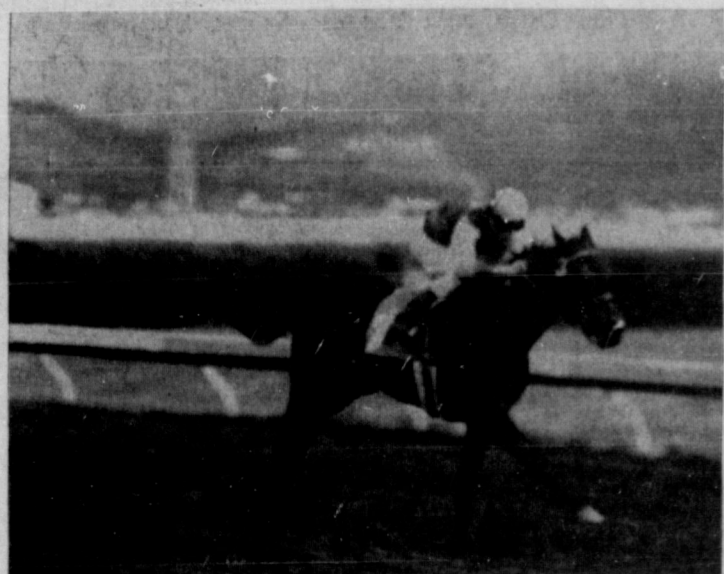

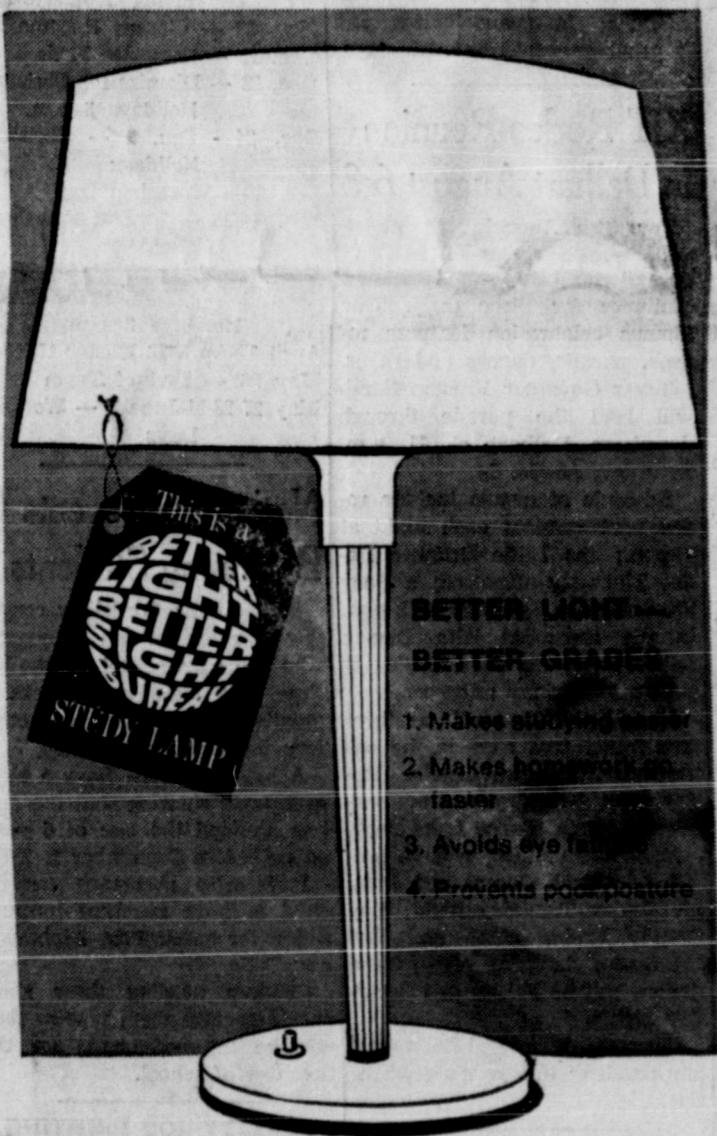

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

security tax from my wages. Should he be doing this?

A—If you are working on a job covered by social security, the social security tax must be withheld even though you are drawing social security benefits. You will receive social security credit for these earnings and this may eventually increase the amount of your benefit.

Q—Is it true that if a person works 10 years (40 quarters) under social security he can draw maximum benefits at retirement?

A—No. Ten years work is the maximum amount of work required to be "fully insured." (You can be "fully insured" with a less amount of work depending on your age.) However, having a "fully insured" status means only that certain kinds of cash benefits may be payable — it does not determine the amount. The amount will depend on your "average" earnings.

Q—In the draft lottery, what if a draft board doesn't have men with birthdays on every day? A—It goes to the next number.

Q—In the July draft lottery, I heard that the alphabet was randomized the same as all the possible birthdays. What is the purpose of that? A—The alphabet was also randomized in the drawing in December 1969. It's done in case a board has two or more men with the same birthday and is required to order one but not all of them to fill a quota. Their sequence of induction will be determined by the first letter of their names, both last and first, using the randomized alphabet.

Q—If a man gets a lottery number he doesn't like, does he have a chance to get another one the next year? A—No, He gets one, and only one, random sequence number. However, his year of first priority for selection will be the year in which he's classified I-A or

I-A-O. The sequence in which a man's birthday is drawn means nothing until he's classified I-A or I-A-O. For example, a man born November 9, 1950, in college in 1970, draws lottery No. 80 in 1969. Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol By Vern Stanford

AUSTIN, Tex.—Campaigns are shaping up on some of the seven proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on by Texans at the General Election on November 5.

While public interest centers on the liquor-by-the-drink amendment, there are other major alterations in the state's laws to be considered by the voters.

In their order on the ballot, these are:

- 1. Enlarge the powers of the Judicial Qualifications Commission to censure or remove lower court judges and justices of the peace as well as district and appellate judges.
2. Authorize the legislature to enact a law on the sale of mixed drinks.
3. Provide for legislative establishment of a uniform method of tax assessment on ranch, farm and forest lands based on the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or production of farm and forest crops.
4. Make the State Building Commission a three-member appointive agency.
5. Permit counties to issue road bonds up to one-fourth of their assessed real property valuation on a majority vote.

6. Make town or city homesteads of \$10,000 and less exempt from forced sale (presently set at \$5,000).
7. Allow the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions of government and for performance of governmental functions by contract between the political subdivision in any county.

Texas voters have adopted 195 amendments to the 1876 constitution, over the years, and rejected 125.
DESEGREGATION SUITS THREATEN — Federal negotiators report that only a few of the 38 Texas school districts, called on the carpet concerning segregation, had satisfactory plans for complying with U. S. guidelines. They conducted a two-day conference with school officials here and gave most of them another week to try and work out something or face a lawsuit by the U. S. Justice Department.

tors. Some complained that federal officials raised a new issue . . . that of integrating Mexican-Americans, as well as blacks. Most want to continue their efforts to find a way to comply with suggested plans.

State will be among the first states to challenge constitutionality of the new federal act extending voting rights to 18-year-olds.
State Supreme Court, splitting 5-4, held that a businessman could not collect a \$10,000 libel judgement against a Denton newspaper for a story, based on an accurate account of a statement made at a city council meeting where it was erroneously reported that the man had declared bankruptcy.

a mandamus suit in the Supreme Court to require its candidates' names to be placed on the general election ballots in three South Texas counties (Dimmitt, LaSalle and Zavala).

Supreme Court agreed with an intermediate court decision that judges cannot grant occupational drivers' licenses just so those whose licenses have been suspended can get to work.

LOOPHOLE COSTS — State has lost millions in land revenue due to an old loophole in the law, which was temporarily closed last year.

State Land Office has been forced to sell submerged land for \$1 an acre to any navigation district that wanted it. Another law permitted district to declare land so acquired surplus to their needs — and sell it to the highest bidder.

So, Aransas County Navigation District, for example, acquired 604 acres near Rockport (in Little Bay) for \$1 an acre, then resold to a corporation. Some 165 acres of property now is selling for \$33,098 an acre.

Now, no more state-owned beaches, islands or submerged land may be sold or leased until the Interagency Natural Resources Council makes its final report to the legislature — or until May 31, 1973 — whichever date is first. Unless the legislature takes a permanent step, the Land Commissioner once more could be forced to sell land requested by navigation districts for \$1 an acre.

GAS PRICE Rise URGED — Federal Power Commission at hearings on natural gas prices in the Permian Basin was urged to end pricing controls or raise rates fast and substantially. Commission examiner reopened the Permian Basin rate case that resulted in the establishment in 1965 of ceiling rates at well-head.

Witnesses, including producers and political office holders, called on the commission also to halt "two-price" system for wells drilled before 1961 and new wells. Some called the 1965 regulation a dismal failure that led to the current shortage in gas reserves. Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin pledged full resources of his office against any effort at federal regulation of Texas intrastate gas market. FPC now regulates gas.

AIR POLLUTION END SEEN — An end to "visible" air pollution in Texas in less than a decade has been predicted by the director of the State Air Control Board.

ACB Chief Charles Barden so forecast at a budget hearing for his agency. Board, revealed Barden, now is working on a state regulation to control pollution from vehicles. Regulation will be in effect before the year is out.

FEDERAL GRANTS — Recent federal grants include \$200,541 to Southwest Educational Development Laboratory for continuation of Head Start Pilot Program in McAllen; 240,000 for alcoholic counseling and recovery program in San Antonio; and \$21,340 for planning assistance to Lower Rio-Grande Valley Development Council.

Aoudads Doing Well In Palo Duro Canyon

Sportsmen who have stalked the sharp-eyed aoudad sheep over Palo Duro Canyon's cliffs and ledges still may be subject to skinned knees and sore muscles — but this year frostbite won't likely be one of the hazards.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has moved the open season from January to November and has increased the length of the season by two days.

This year, hunters may take care sheep by permit only from Nov. 14-20 in the Panhandle Regulatory District.

The hardy sheep were first stocked in the canyon area in the winter of 1957-58, when 44 animals from a New Mexico ranch were released.

The exotic sheep, which are natives of the Atlas Mountains of North Africa, apparently found the rocky landscape to their liking. Census efforts have indicated a stable population of at least 600 animals in the half-million acre area.

The season change was not made entirely for hunter comfort, however. Pierce B. Ussell, wildlife coordinator for the Department, said the November hunt will provide more biological information about the population and food habits of the herd.

In addition, the aoudad sheep appears to be one species which reproduces virtually all year, although a few more lambs than usual have been seen during March, and May.

Helicopters have provided a means for counting the animals with accuracy which would have been impossible otherwise. The aoudads unerringly seek the most rugged and inaccessible portions of the available habitat for their home, the census efforts have shown.

The Panhandle Regulatory District is the only district in Texas in which the State has stocked aoudad. But private stocking by ranchers in the Hill Country and in the Davis Mountains have made the aoudad one of Texas' most populous exotics.

The tawny brown animals are

truly big-game animals, with the male of the species attaining a height at the shoulder of more than 40 inches and a weight of 220 pounds. The females are smaller, but both sexes have the characteristic curving horns which make the species a desirable trophy.
