The State of Oklahoma registered concern to the Senate Committee that the Texas Project might drain water from Oklahoma, but Price countered by pointing out that the two states had resolved such matters on the state level for the past 14 years and that he saw no need or reason for the Federal governemnt to become involved in the dis-


