

- EDITORIAL -

WHY CAN'T WE DO IT OURSELVES?

For some time now there have been whispers that a big feed mill might be built here by a well-known feed company. This company has made detailed plans to construct its mill after a survey of facts and figures proved to them that this location is a good one. They like our area with its big ranches and transportation facilities, labor, and other advantages.

It just occurs to us that the farmers and ranchers of this vicinity might be losing a good bet if they do not build the feed mill themselves, operate it according to their own needs, and keep the profits at home. Whatever some foreign concern can do for the people of Callahan county, we can do better for ourselves.

We have the brains, the brawn, and the capital. All we need to put this proposition over is leadership, and we wouldn't be surprised if the capable leadership doesn't show up right around here close to home. In case local men do take hold of this idea, they should have our wholehearted support.

Callahan county produces grain that is shipped to feed mills away off. Then the ranchmen buy it back and feed it to their stock. We are not talking about a hat full of feed now. Thousands of tons of feed are shipped into this county each year. We pay high freight rates both ways and then give the processing company a handsome profit.

The development of our own resources will bring Callahan county to the front as nothing else can do. We must use a certain amount of imagination as well as vision. We must be willing to stick to the plan until it proves successful. And, after all, this is nothing new, and we are not taking much chance. Under the direction of experts in the agriculture field, who can guarantee our success before we begin, there's really one thing we need and that is ambition.

By cooperating with each other in a well planned program, we can produce and market an unlimited volume of grain, poultry, dairy products, and many other kinds of produce. The time has come when there is no market for small quantities of farm produce, but there is a great demand for such produce in large quantities. It is up to Callahan county farmers and ranchers to produce their farm out-put in quantities that will attract and hold a year-round market.

SCHOOL PROFITS ON ELECTRIC BILL

Quite a number of our readers have compared the electric bill at the Baird football games with that of the football games at Clyde and other nearby cities. The financial reports of the games shows that the floodlight bill at Baird is \$12.50 per game, and at Clyde the bill is only \$10 per game. This is a good question, and should be answered.

As we see it, the amount of \$12.50 is set up by the football district, and that amount is allowed at each game in the district. Clyde is in a different district than Baird, and that district allows \$10 for lights at each of its games. This gives each school an even break at the proceeds.

As a result of this arrangement, the Baird school comes out ahead by several dollars each game. The Baird Municipal Light Plant furnished electric service for the local football games during the past season for an average of about \$5.50 per game. So, instead of the school paying the prescribed amount of \$12.50, they actually paid \$5.50 per game, and added the balance of \$7.00 to its share of the profits.






