## Memphis Attorney Appointed Judge

Memphis City Attorney Robert E. Montgomery was appointed Tuesday to serve as judge of the 100th District Judicial District Court.

Montgomery, city attorney for the past two years, received word of his selection from the governor's office late Tuesday afternoon.

In a telegram Gov. Smith said, "It is a pleasure and an honor to inform you that I am today appointing you as judge of the 100th Judicial District Court, effective Jan. 1, 1971."

Montgomery replaces Charles L. Reynolds, who was recently elected to a position on the 7th Court of Civil Appeals. Reynolds will assume his duties Jan. 1.

## SBA Disaster Loans Extended Thru Feb.

Fred S. Neumann, District Director of the Small Business Administration's Lubbock Office, announced today that a three month extension for the disaster loan program had been granted through the Washington office.

This extension will enable individuals affected by the April 17th and May 11th tornadoes to apply for a disaster loan as late as February 28, 1971. ## Cotton Classing Office Now Open At Memphis, Tex.

The Memphis, Texas, Cotton Classing Office of the USDA, Consumer Marketing Service opened this week with Wiley Cain in charge. The office classed 2,856 samples this week.

"Staples are slightly shorter this year due to the dry growing season," said Cain. Grades are good at this point with a good percentage of white grades. Cain reminded farmers to give their cotton a good chance to dry out before resuming harvest.

Farmers were busy harvesting this week and not enough cotton has been sold to quote average prices received. A few small lots sold averaged 250 to 350 points over corresponding loan rates. Market sources indicated weakening trends in the market.

Cotton classed this week graded 50% white and 45% light spotted. The prevailing grades were Middling, 28 percent, and Middling Light Spotted, 30 percent.

Prevailing staples classed this week were 15/16, 45 percent and 31/32, 27 percent.

Micronaire, or fineness and maturity, readings are good as 85% read in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed averaged \$57.00 per ton at the gin.

In the B game following, Estelline defeated Clarendon 38-32. Melissa Estes hit for 11 points and Elaine Ford hit 10. Connie Altman was high for Estelline with 14 points.

The Clarendon Bronchos ran over the Memphis Cyclone last Friday night at Memphis for a final score of 39 to 13 and a ticket to the Bi-District playoff.

The only touchdown in the first quarter came when Memphis scored on a 22-yard run. With the kick good, the score stood Memphis 7—Clarendon 0.

Clarendon tallied in the second quarter with a touchdown when Elray King ran 6 yards for paydirt. The kick was good by Scotty Lindley and the score stood 7 to 7. Late in the second quarter Lindley kicked a 42 yard field goal giving Clarendon a 10 to 7 lead at half time.

Early in the third quarter Louis Dons of Memphis ran 98 yards for a touchdown on a kickoff return. The kick failed but once again Memphis went ahead, 13 to 10. The next scoring in the third quarter came when James Shadle made a 2 yard run for six points with the kick good by Lindley. This put the Bronchos out in front 17 to 13. Again Elray King scored on a 1 yard run with the kick good by Lindley, making the score 24 to 13. The last counter in the third quarter came when Danny Hill scored on a 27 yard touchdown pass play. Lindley made the kick and the Bronchos left the Cyclone way behind 31 to 13.

In the fourth quarter, Kenny Bacon caught a 7 yard touchdown pass. The conversion play was good with Mac Tomlinson running the ball over to make the final score Clarendon 39 Memphis 13.

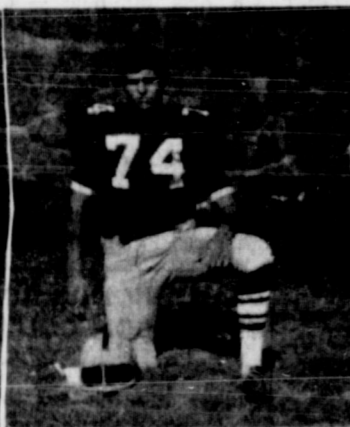

## Social Security

By Travis C. Briggs  
Q—When I apply for social security benefits, what information must I have to support my claim?  
A—The information needed to support your claim depends upon the type of benefit you expect to receive.

If your age is a factor of entitlement, as it would be for retirement or Medicare benefits, you must furnish evidence of your date of birth. This would be your birth or baptismal certificate, if you have one. Other documents, recorded early in your life, also can be used. If relationship is involved (for example, in applying for dependent or survivors benefits), evidence of marriages and divorces may be needed. Children's relationships can be established by birth certificates which record the parents' names.

Proof of death is necessary to receive survivors benefits, and medical evidence is required in disability cases.

Your social security office can help you in gathering information to support your claim.

Q—I was getting social security as the wife of a retired worker until I went back to work. Now I have worked enough to get retirement benefits on my own record. Can I collect as both a wife and a retired person?  
A—Sorry, you can't get both benefits at the same time. But if the benefit based on your own earnings would be larger than the amount you'd collect as a wife you would get this higher benefit.

Q—I've been getting social security since my father had a stroke and had to quit work. I'm 17 now. I heard there is some way I can keep getting the checks even after I'm 18. Is this true?  
A—Yes, if you're not married, you can get social security until you're 22 if you're a full-time student. Or if you are so disabled that you can't work, your checks would continue for as long as the disability lasts.

Q—I'll be 18 soon, but I'll still be going to school. What must I do to keep getting social security payments?  
A—A questionnaire will be mailed to you some time during the five months before you're 18. This questionnaire asks if you plan to continue in school after 18, where you'll go to school, and if you'll be working while you're a student.

To get your checks without interruption, complete the questionnaire as soon as your plans for attending school are definite.

If you don't receive a questionnaire, visit your social security office and give them the necessary information about your school plans.

Q—I have already made over \$7,800 this year. Now that I've changed jobs, I'm still contributing to social security. Since I'll end up paying more than I should, can't I get some money back?  
A—Yes. You'll get a refund after you file your Federal income tax return for 1970. The tax return is designed to show any overpayment of social security contributions during the previous year.

## Selective Service

Q—I understand that at the end of this calendar year, men with a random number higher than the highest number ordered by their board during 1970 will go into the Second Priority Group?

A—Men who are assigned to the Second Priority Group will not be processed for induction until all the carryovers in the Extended Priority Group and all of the men in the First Priority Group have been processed.

Q—What men will be in the First Priority Group for 1971?

A—Those who were born from 1944 through 1960 and are classified in 1-A, 1-A-O or 1-O in 1971 and those born in 1951 who are classified.

Q—I am in 1-A and my random number is 197. I understand that no registrant above 195 will be ordered in 1970. What will my situation be in 1971?

A—On January 1, 1971, you will be placed in the Second Priority Selection Group because your number was not reached.

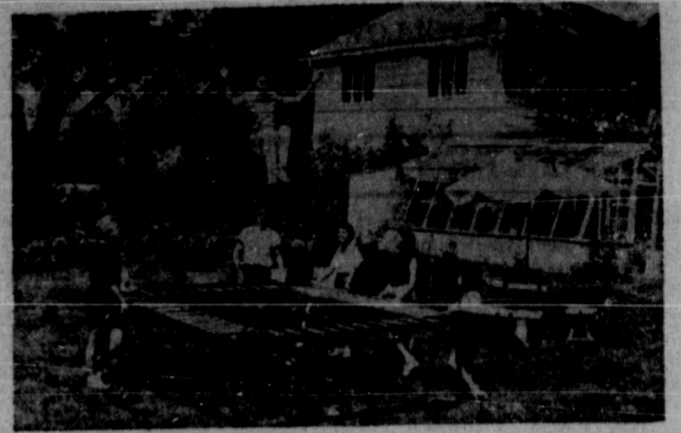
Q—My random number is 162 and my local board reached random number 170 in July 1970. What will be my situation next year if I am in 1-A on December 31, 1970?

A—On January 1, 1971, you

will be a carryover in the Extended Priority Selection Group because your number is lower than the highest number reached by your local board in 1970.

Leon Doherty has completed 35,740 linear feet of parallel terraces this fall. Most of these terraces have a pre-determined number of rows with no land left over for point rows. The irregular areas that formerly existed between every pair of terraces are now found in just a few terrace intervals on this farm. Some of the slopes were so irregular and undulating that correction terraces were necessary to get the least amount of heavy earth shaping. These odd areas may be farmed in point rows or planted to a sown crop. The parallel terraces on this farm have reduced point rows by about four hundred percent. The land has been chiseled on contour and is presently seeded to rye. Thus the winter cover crop was planted to help retain water and prevent erosion.

The design for other farms is undergoing a transition, too. A. L. Beggs, Euman Lyles, Homer Hardin, and Leroy Leathers plan to have parallel terraces install
