titlement, as it would be for retirement or Medicare benefits you must furnish evidence of your date of birth. This would be your birth or baptismal certificate. if you have one. Other documents, recorded early in your life, also can be used. If relationship is involved (for example, in applying for dependent or survivors benefits), evidence of marriages and divorces may be needed Children's relationships can be established by birth certificates which record the parents'

Proof of death is necessary to receive survivors benefits, and medical evidence is required in

Your social security office can help you in gathering information to support your claim.
