

During a prolonged drouth, supplemental feeding becomes breeding herd intact, This might best be done by putting the herd in dry lot or in a small trap rather than letting the whole range be damaged. Supplemental pastures can help furnish needed grazing in critical per-

iods, explains the county agent, Preventive steps include maintaining reserve forage. A well planned and executed deferredrotation grazing program can provide one good source of reserve forage. An emergency feed supply should be also maintained. It's best to buy when feedstuffs are abundant and prices are most
