Citing the need for more effective import control, Rep. Bob Price has introduced legislation to provide an orderly import quota system for textiles and leather footwear.

In introducing the bill Price stated he has long been in favor of free international trade. But. he said, "in trade as in life, unbridled freedom often creates more problems than it solves."
