Sherwood Shores IX Bouncing Back

In checking with George Howard yesterday, we learned that 29 new mobil homes have been replaced on various lots at Sherwood Shores IX within the last 30 days. It was only a month ago Monday that the disastrous Tornado wiped out the Mobil Home settlement.

In addition, four new homes are under construction on trailer lots instead of going back with the mobil units. Another 12 to 25 Mobil Homes are expected to arrive at the resort this week.

Howard reported also that all power lines had been restored and the water supply was three-fourths back to its original capacity.

Practically all of the debris has been cleaned but we still have some work to do yet, he added.

Mr. Howard predicted that Sherwood Shores would look more like it was before within not too distant a time.

Area Residents Have Better Storm Warning System Here Now

Editors Note: Since tornadoes have struck this area several times within the last 30 days local residents became quite upset, and why shouldn't they, when a storm warning is issued. The local Civil Defense unit has been improved tremendously through the unselfish offering of time and effort on the part of numerous individuals. Read further and we think you will feel much more secure when storm warnings are issued:

According to Communications Officer, Rev. Owen McGarity, we had quite a number of volunteers out in the field last week when storm warnings were issued, even risking their own safety, to help advise residents of the area of any possible impending danger.

Through spotters and a citizens band radio network, covering an area deep in the JA Ranch to the south, Brice Area, Hedley Area to the east and Highway 287 to the west, People here will have ample warning of an approaching storm or tornado. This was evident last week when these volunteers were at work, reporting and some being hailed upon, double checking on funnel clouds etc.

The Civil Defense Headquarters is the City Hall. The phone number is 3433 to call to report weather conditions and also to receive information regarding storm conditions. This headquarters is tied in with the closed circuit Cable TV Channel 6 which gives a report on progress of stormy conditions. This headquarters is connected with the Hedley Fire Station and their spotters and inform olatnis ters and information is exchanged.

The local headquarters is constantly in touch with the City Police, Sheriff's Department, Highway Patrol and the following men who are serving as spotters over this wide area protecting Donley County; Jerry Taylor, Jack Scott, Jimmy Butler, Calvin McCrary, Larry Helms, Billy Joe Aaron, Roddy Kliment, Steve Rogers, and Delbert Robertson.

Manning the Base Radio Station at the City Hall is Rev. McGarity and Rev. Carl Nunn. Mike McCully is the head of the local Civil Defense and Rev. W. R. Lawrence is the Assistant Director. Both of these men are at the Base Station to help direct activities in whatever manner is necessary.

As soon as a storm condition is reported by the weather bureau, local spotters will go out into the field. If a severe condition is reported, the Fire Siren will be sounded 2 times in succession, a pause and then repeated if a tornado is approaching. With the spotters far to the south and southwest, there will be ample time to seek protection.

Thank any and all these volunteers for their efforts when you meet them.

SBA Disaster Loan Modifications Made

Fred S. Neumann, District Director, Small Business Administration, Lubbock, has announced that there will be certain modifications to SBA's disaster loan program as a result of President Nixon's having declared that this is a major disaster area because of the damage sustained in the tornado which struck Lubbock on May 11 and the tornadoes which struck Plainview, Whiteface, Clarendon and surrounding areas on April 17 and 18.

In addition to making long-term low-interest loans available to householders, businesses, and others sustaining damage in the disasters, the SBA is now authorized pursuant to the Disaster Act of 1969 to cancel up to \$1800 of that portion of any disaster loan disbursed in excess of \$500. In some instances, the SBA will also be able to refinance prior mortgages on property which was either totally destroyed or sustained major damage.

Mr. Neumann stated that it will not be necessary for those who have already received disaster loans as a result of the tornadoes to reapply for a new loan in order to become eligible for the forgiveness. They will be contacted shortly by the Lubbock Office and will be instructed in applying for the forgiveness. Those who have not yet done so and wish to apply for a disaster loan should contact our representatives at one of the following locations:

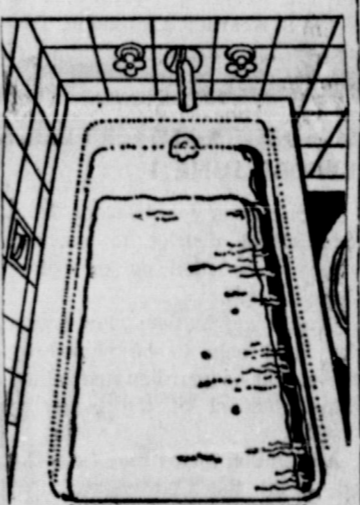

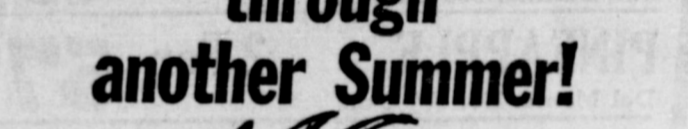

Farm News

from County ASCS Corp.

Agriculture Conservation Program

The season for carrying out brush control practices is here. Both aerial spraying and ground control operations are offered on most types of brush. May 25 to July 1 has been set for aerial spraying of mesquite in Donley County. The Texas Herbicide Law and Regulations apply in our county. Producers and vendors should be familiar with this legislation so that complete understanding of the law and regulations will enable all concerned to be protected. We suggest you see your County Agent.

Assistance is offered for cover crops of sudan and sorghum-grass crosses as well as cowpeas. A complete list of eligible varieties is available at the ASCS Office. The purpose of this practice is to offer summer protection from wind erosion and none of the growth may be harvested for hay, seed or silage. Cost-shares on this practice are: (a) Seed-preparation — \$90 per acre;

(b) Seeding operation — \$.45 per acre; (c) eligible seed — 30% of the actual cost, not to exceed 4c per pound.

Funds are available for these and other needed conservation practices. Be sure to make application before starting work on any practices you want to receive cost-shares on.

Crop Reports From Farmers Needed

During the last half of May, about 40,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Gary Palmer, State Statistician of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin.

The information will be the basis for the official estimates of crop acreage for the State of Texas and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry — agriculture. This

is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

SCREW WORM ALERT SHOULD BE STRENGTHENED

It's true only two cases of screwworms have been confirmed in the Southwest until now, but warn officials of the eradication program, fertile flies are moving northward in Mexico. Stockmen are urged to keep a closer watch on all animal wounds and when worms are found to collect a sample and submit it to the Mission Lab for positive identification. Real trouble could come, say the officials, if a few cases should go undetected for any length of time.

TYPEWRITERS & ADDERS AT THE LEADER

NEWS FROM

Congressman Bob Price

18th District, Texas

The leadership of the House of Representatives broke a long drought of action last week and brought up several major bills for action including one authorization bill and two appropriation bills.

By a vote of 312 to 6 the House authorized the Appropriation of \$527 million to the National Science Foundation. Of this amount, \$306 million will support scientific research in more than 400 colleges and universities in the United States, \$15 million will be earmarked for computing research and education, \$55.5 million will be used to strengthen existing centers of science education, \$110.4 will be spent for science education, the remainder will be used for other scientific pursuits.

I supported this measure because testimony before the House Science and Astronautics Committee, on which I serve, has convinced me that scientific research is essential to a continued economic growth. Many of the everyday items we take for granted today are a result of this type of research.

Also during the week there was an unusual occurrence when the House actually approved two bills that called for less spending than the President had requested. The committee version of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (DHUD) and Independent Agencies appropriation bill, adopted by the House, was \$17,015 billion or \$201.6 million below the budget request. In addition to appropriations for DHUD, the bill contained funds for the Veterans Administration, Federal Communications Commission, Federal Trade Commission, Space Program, Federal Power Commission, General Services Administration and Securities and Exchange Commission.

I did support an amendment which was adopted to increase benefits for veterans medical care by \$25 million. A questionnaire sent out by the House Veterans Committee to VA hospitals around the country indicated the need for additional staff.

The second appropriation bill approved during the week provides funds for Fiscal 1971 for the Departments of State, Justice, Commerce and the Federal Courts. This bill also appropriated less than the President had requested or a total of \$3.106 billion for the three departments and the courts.

On Wednesday, the House agreed to a conference report and sent to the President legislation providing for new taxes on airline passengers in order to provide funds to extend Federal assistance for expansion of the Nation's airports. The bill provides for an increase from 5% to 8% on domestic flights and levied a new charge of \$3 per passenger on international flights. Also, the House failed to adopt a resolution disapproving a plan by

President Nixon to reorganize his office. This means that the President's plan to organize a Domestic Affairs Council and to reorganize the Bureau of the Budget will now go into effect.

Citing the need for more effective import control, Rep. Bob Price has introduced legislation to provide an orderly import quota system for textiles and leather footwear.

In introducing the bill Price stated he has long been in favor of free international trade. But, he said, "in trade as in life, unbridled freedom often creates more problems than it solves."

Price noted that in the last decade inexpensively produced foreign textiles and footwear have flooded domestic markets. The result has been that, "cow hide prices have been driven down, and consumer demand for cotton products has been reduced."

The Texas Republican declared, "Foreign businessmen should simply not be allowed to continue using their competitive advantages as a bludgeon to add to the internal economic problems this country is already facing." "Foreign inflows have already forced some American textile and footwear manufacturers to close their doors — this has added to rising unemployment rates, cut back domestic job markets, adversely affected the cotton and the tanning industries, and lowered federal tax revenues."

Price's bill would establish legislative standards by which orderly trade in imported cotton textile products and footwear could be affected. As such, it joins a growing number of import control bills recently introduced on Capitol Hill.

The Nixon Administration has been attempting to achieve a voluntary multinational agreement on trade restraints. Commerce Secretary Stans has reported that present prospects for reaching international agreements are bright.

Price has stated, "If the Executive branch fails to promptly arrive at a set of agreements designed to establish orderly import quotas that will not disrupt domestic markets and will not harm American businessmen and workers, I believe Congress has the responsibility to take strong and decisive action."

Taxpayers Ask IRS

Q—Will I get a reminder notice on my June estimated tax payment?

A—Yes, the IRS will send reminder notices on the second installment due June 15, to all those who received estimated income tax forms earlier this year. Anyone receiving a notice who is not required to make a payment should ignore it.

Use voucher number 2 to make the June payment. This voucher identifies the payment since it carries the taxpayer's name, address and Social Security number. For your convenience, envelopes addressed to the service center were provided in the 1040-ES package.

Q—Where should I write about a delayed refund?

A—If it has been ten weeks since you sent in your return and you have received no word about it, then write the IRS service center where you sent your return. IRS will need to know about when your return was mailed, your Social Security number, name and present address.

Q—I'm a teacher and plan to take some courses this summer. How can I find out whether these costs will be deductible?

A—Send a post card to your IRS district director and ask for a copy of Publication 508, "Tax Information on Educational Expenses." This booklet is free. Generally, educational expenses are deductible if they are expressly required by your employer or if they are necessary to maintain or improve your skills in your present position. No deduction can be taken for courses needed to meet the minimum standards of employment or to obtain a new job.

Q—How much can someone earn and still be claimed as a dependent?

A—For 1970, a person must have gross income of less than \$625 to meet the income test for dependents. The income test for 1969 was \$600, but was changed by the Tax Reform Act of 1969.

The 1969 law raises the income test in steps just as the amount that may be claimed for a dependent is raised. For example, a taxpayer is entitled to a \$625

allowance for each exemption on 1970 returns and the gross income test for dependents is less than \$625. For 1971, a taxpayer is allowed \$650 for each exemption, while the gross income test rises to less than \$650.

Note that the income test does not apply to children of the taxpayer, if they are under 19 or are full-time students at least five months during the tax year.

Q—Can I deduct any of the closing costs I paid when I bought my house?

A—State and local taxes on real property and interest payments are deductible if you itemize. Keep a record of your closing costs so you have the information available when you file your return next year.

Many of the closing costs associated with the purchase of a home are not deductible since these are considered by law to be either personal or capital expenses. Your lawyer's fee, insurance on the home, title search and similar expenses are not deductible.
