

#### **Business Failures Decline**

NEW YORK - The rate of care as the pesticide itself, ad- business failures fell a sharp 22 per cent in 1968, according to the Insurance Information Institute. 





Different types of fondue pots fit different kinds of fondues says Sally Springer, Extension foods and nutrition specialist at Texas A&M University. Metal pots usually are used for beef fondue but can be used for cheese fondue if the temperature is kept low enough so cheese will not stick or burn. Earthenware pots should be used for cheese or chocolate fondue only. Earthenware can withstand temperatures required for these but it tends to crack under higher temperatures used for meat.



#### PREHISTORICAL FOSSIL TORTOISE BEING RESTORED AT WTSU

Restoration of a prehistoric fossil tortoise, estimated at 10 million years old, is being carried out by members of the vertebrate paleonthology class at West Texas State University, Dr. Gerald Schultz, professor of geology, said.

The speciman was found last summer during a geologic prospecting trip at a ranch north of Clarendon in the Panhandle. Byron Neshitt of Canyon, junior geology major, made the discovery when he spotted a portion of the fossil weathering out of a sandstone formation.

Some fossil fragments at the base of the formation led to the discovery of the skull and lower jaw of a prehistoric otter, about the same age as the tortoise, Schultz said. The otter skull is only the second of its kind to be found in North America, he said.

Members of the field crew returned to the ranch site at the end of the summer and excavated the tortoise. As the shell was unearthed, the otter and skull and the remaining half of its lower jaw were uncovered. These fossils, found against the back


and a plaster jacket was prepared. However, attempts to transport the fossil to Canyon were unsuccessful when a makeshift stretcher of burlap and wooden tent poles was not strong enough to life the shell in its cast.

The group returned to the site before the Christmas holidays with steel poles for the stretcher and loaded the shell into a truck.
