Program Payments and Certification

Several farmers in our county have received their final wheat, feed grain and cotton payments.

Not only are payments beginning earlier, but most of the payments will be issued over a shorter period of time. Early certification by producers of compliance with program acreages and regulations is resulting in earlier payments this year. Be sure you have carefully measured your acreages before you certify as there will be no opportunity to adjust acreages if an error in measuring is found by spot check.

Prevented Plantings
If you have been unable to plant your cotton or feed grain, and feel that it is now too late to plant with any expectation of producing a crop, come to the office and make your application for acreage credit. A visual inspection will have to be made of the acreage before it is put to any other use.

All summer cover practices must be completed and reported by August 31, 1970. Funds are still available for other practices. Be sure to make your application before work is started.

18th District, Texas

Grazing and Haying Programs Offered in 6 Texas Counties

U. S. Department of Agriculture advised Congressman Bob Price Friday that haying and grazing privileges on crop-lands taken out of production under the Cropland Adjustment Program in the Panhandle counties of: Collingsworth - Donley - Hall - Hemphill - Lipscomb and Wheeler have been approved.

Severe drought in these counties has sharply reduced pasture and forage on lands normally grazed or harvested for hay. Haying and grazing privileges on the retired acreage set-aside under the CAP program are offered under emergency conditions in designated counties to help prevent liquidation of livestock herds. Friday's action gives the ASCS County Committees authority to permit livestock grazing and harvesting of hay on land diverted from crop production, under CAP, in the counties named.

Downward adjustment will be made in payments to farmers if these lands are grazed or harvested for hay.

TAX BENEFITS FOR TORNADO VICTIMS

Unfortunately thousands of Texas taxpayers have qualified for a major tax deduction for 1970. These taxpayers are the victims of the extensive tornadoes and storms (primarily in the High Plains). They have suffered extensive property losses many of which were not covered by insurance. They can claim a casualty loss on their 1970 income tax return. The Internal Revenue Service has worked with community groups to schedule tax clinics in Lubbock and a number of other High Plains communities where large numbers of taxpayers are entitled to tax benefits.

IRS expects these meetings to help many taxpayers get an immediate tax benefit by simply completing a new Form W-4 and a W-4 Schedule A to reduce the tax withheld from their pay. Most of us would agree that if your home and belongings have blown away that a tax benefit today is worth a lot more than one next April. The Tax Reform Act of 1969 seems to be giving these taxpayers some real help.

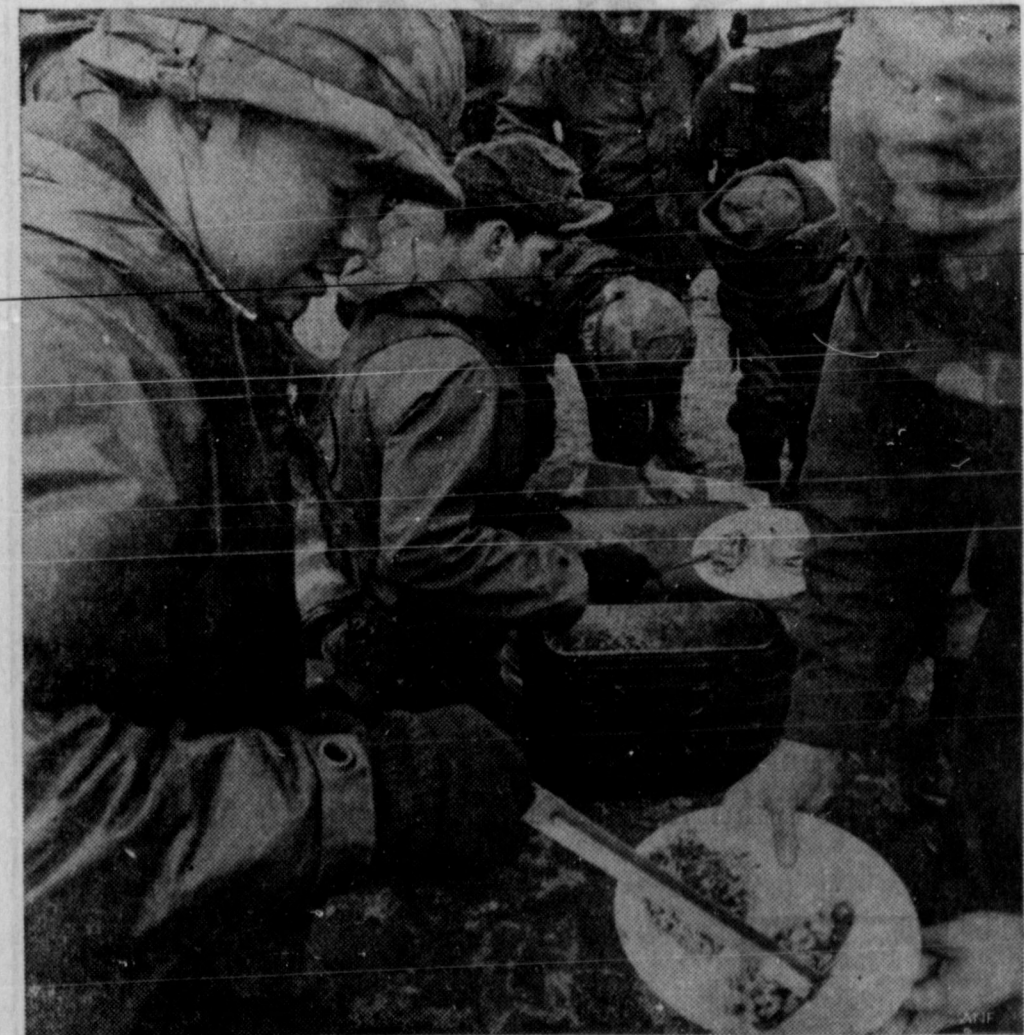
HEDLEY METHODIST REVIVAL IN PROGRESS

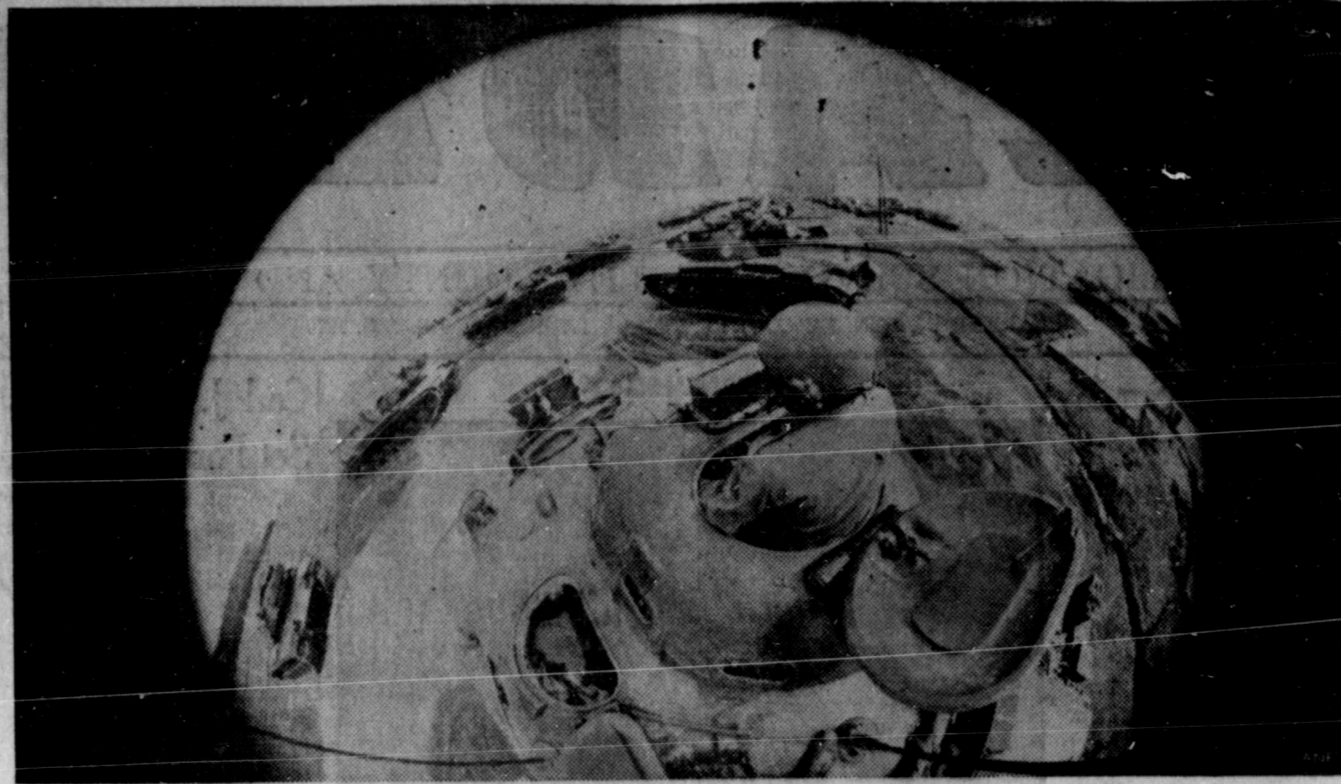

Highlights and Sidelights
From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN, Tex. — Cold figures submitted in major agency budget proposals left top state officials and legislators little room for optimism about the amount of next year's tax bill.

Texas Education Agency calculated public school operations during the next biennium will cost about \$2.5 billion — \$2 billion in state money alone. This is an increase of about \$377.1 million over the present level.

Nobody was too surprised about that, but the Texas Public Welfare Department came up with a shocker.

Welfare staffers figure that the rising assistance rolls will require a budget of nearly \$2 billion overall for the 1972-73 fiscal period. That represents an increase in state welfare funds of \$300.4 million over the current biennium.

So, two vital functions of state government alone — public education and welfare — are seeking some \$677.5 million in additional revenues. It is expected that most of the other agencies will request more than their present appropriations instead of less.

Welfare requests, as large as they are, do not take into consideration larger grants for the needy and ill.

However, a Senate committee has recommended the \$80 million a year ceiling for state spending on categorical assistance be abolished and aid payments be matched to actual need. If enacted by the Legislature, this would

mean millions more in welfare spending.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes expressed grave doubts that legislators would accept tremendous increases in welfare spending without "substantial reform" of the entire welfare system.

Welfare officials note that assistance rolls continue to expand uncontrollably (due largely to federal court ruling and rising population).

COURTS SPEAK — Supreme Court upheld tough rules defining guests and required food service at private drinking clubs. In another decision involving the Alcoholic Beverage Commission, the Court refused to outlaw the purchase of liquor by "agents" for the private lockers of members of dry area clubs.

In a Texarkana-area case, the Court held that victims of uninsured drivers must prove there was no insurance coverage on the other motorist before he can collect on his own uninsured motorist policy.

A Houston nurse, who claimed purchases were charged against her on a bogus credit card, lost her appeal to the top court in her effort to collect damages from a discount house and bill collection service which persistently tried to make her pay.

EAGLE RULING NEAR — Railroad Commission soon will rule as to whether the famed Texas Eagle passenger train can be discontinued by the Missouri-Pacific Railroad.

Eagle is one of three passenger haulers now operating across the state. M-P claims that the train is losing money and wants to cut it off. Railroad attorneys argued that the Commission has no right to force it to continue to lose money.

Contending that the train should be kept in service, the National Association of Railroad Passengers said if M-P tried harder it could sell more passenger service and make a profit.

Train runs from St. Louis to Laredo, through Texarkana, Palestine, Austin and San Antonio.

DRIVING SCHOOL — Drivers who collect too many moving traffic violations may be going to night school to learn better behavior.

State Rep. John E. (Ned) Blaine of El Paso will become an assistant to House Speaker Gus Mutscher when he retires from the Legislature next January at 82.

Speaker Mutscher is naming a 100-member committee to evaluate jobs of lawmakers.

INTEGRATION AID ASKED — U. S. Justice Department has called for state aid in meeting federal integration guidelines by 48 Texas school districts.

Among the larger districts named as not in compliance were Amarillo, Austin, Odessa, Lubbock, Midland, Port Arthur, Beaumont (South Park), Temple, Richardson and Wichita Falls.

State education agencies, federal authorities noted, have control over local districts in such vital matters as state aid, accreditation and textbook distribution.

INSURANCE HEARING DELAYED — A delayed hearing date on auto insurance rate-making in effect assumes Texas car owners that any premium hikes won't be effective until around December. Raises were expected by September.

Insurance board put off the hearing slated for July 14 on whether investment income of companies should be considered in the rate base and at the same time postponed an August 17 hearing on the rate itself.

Investment income hearing now likely will be set for September 9, and another hearing

will follow by a month or more.

SCHOOL GROUP FORMED — A new statewide group called "Citizens Association for Public Schools" has been formed to oppose diversion of public funds to non-public elementary and secondary schools.

Organization made no secret of the fact that it will "work for keeping public tax money for schools confined to support of the public schools." Some private and church schools have indicated they will seek state assistance next year.

Affiliated organizations include Texas State Teachers Association, Texas Association of School Administrators, Texas School Boards Association, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, Anti-Defamation League, Baptist General Convention of Texas and Americans United for Separation of Church and State.

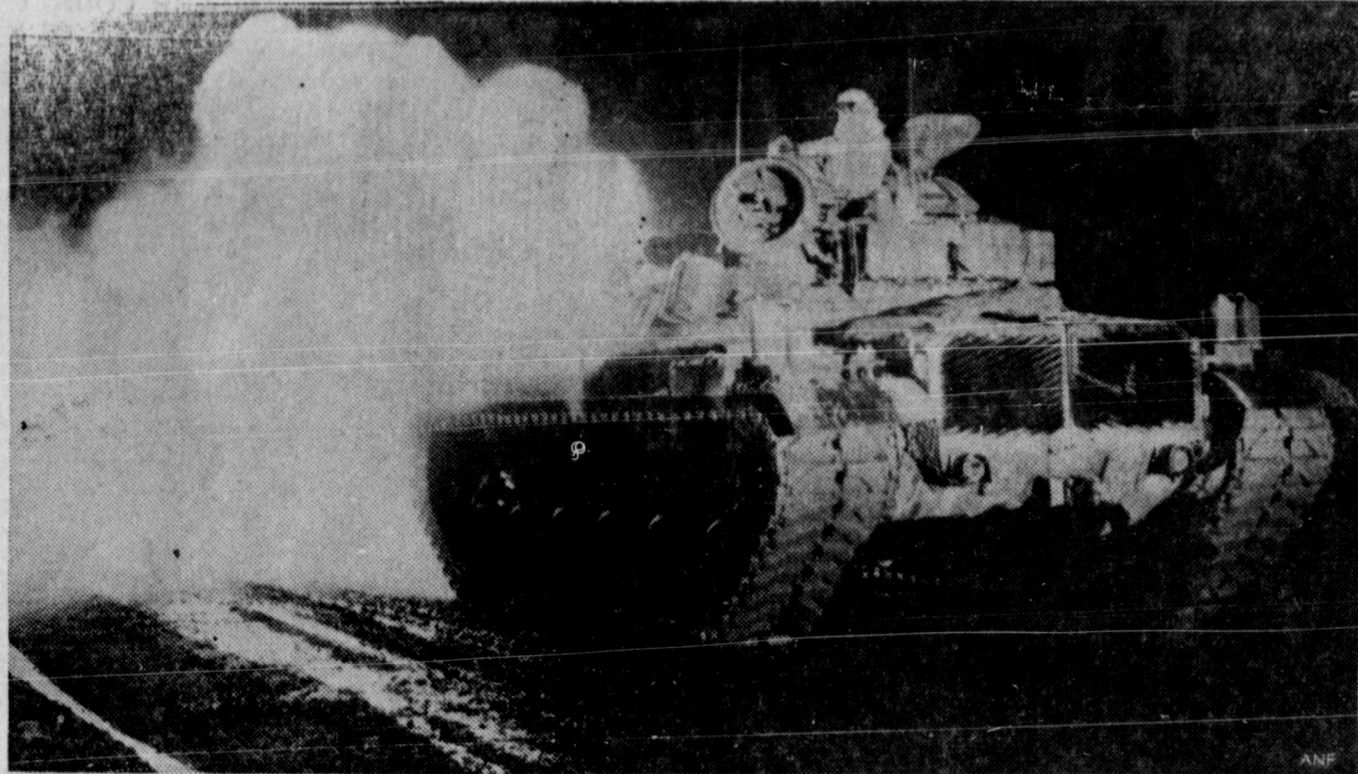

WHEREAS, Article 1066 c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Clarendon, Texas, on the 29th day of August 1970, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

FOR ADOPTION OF a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City.

That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

City Hall
Sam Lowry Presiding Judge
L. P. Moore Alternate presiding Judge

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two clerks.

That said election shall be

held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Clarendon, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

That the ballots of said election shall conform to the election code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City.

AGAINST adoption of a one (1%) local sales and use tax within the City.

That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with the election code of the State of Texas, as amended, which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an (X) or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of the proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said city, the date of first publication to be at least twenty one (21) days prior to the date set for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in the election precinct of the City not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the Donley County Leader is a newspaper published within the City of Clarendon, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City.

Peach BROWN ROT — Although peach brown rot may have already hit early-maturing varieties in Texas, there is still time to save the late crop by tree spraying. Prompt treatment can protect such late maturing varieties as Ranger, Loring, Jefferson, Redskin, Dixieland and Redglow. The disease causes peaches to take on a brown, rotten appearance. Best time to spray is about two weeks before ripening and again one day before ripening.

OUTDOORS in TEXAS

Wouldn't this world be in a terrible turmoil if every man loved the same woman? Or every woman loved the same man?

While we're thinking out loud, just imagine what would happen if every fisherman liked the same boat. There'd be only one style, one brand, one maker.

Thank goodness, we have a choice. It is keen competition for trade that makes business good, businessmen hustle and products improve.

Take Giddings Manufacturing Corporation, for example. This Giddings, Texas, concern has had its ups and downs. But, the downs were due mostly to a fire several years ago.

Today, this smalltown boat-making firm has grown to where it will manufacture and market in 1970 an estimated 2,500 Invader boats. This from 1,200 last year and 800 two years ago.

How did all this come about? Mainly by studying people's needs, their wants, their likes and dislikes . . . then combining these desires into a tremendous popular product that's now distributed over the Southwest in a 21-state area which includes Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and New Mexico.

They make Invader runabouts, both outboards and I-O's, all beautifully styled and in distinctive colors. One secret of Invader's rapid success is use of the same hull throughout their series of eight boats . . . and making only two sizes, 15 and 17 footers.

Newest product is their FISH-ERMAN. It's called the FRISKI, and it looks it. It's a 15-footer built sturdy enough to carry an 85hp outboard motor.

Its trihedral hull with polyurethane foam flotation makes it a soft rider, quiet and safe. For added safety there is flotation in the sides, below the gunwales.

This to help prevent the boat from turning over. In toto, there is ample buoyancy to keep Old Friski upright even under severe conditions.

There are many "handies" too, like the storage compartment in the bow . . . and the two that are aft. One is a little plastic built-in utility box made especially for small instruction books and your boat license (which title must accompany your boat). Also, there are two mounting pads . . . one fore, the other aft . . . for attaching the trolling motor. Then there are the side panels for storing your rods and reels out of the way or for attaching your rod holders. Naturally there are bow and stern eyes, and four cleats, as well as safety lights fore and aft.

Extras available? Oh boy — bow rails, stern rails, canopy, 30 or 48 qt. ice chest. Also, live bait chest with aerator; a battery box with charger; a port, starboard or center console with a bug-screen windshield; and attractive, comfortable, swivel armchairs . . . just to mention a few.

Colorful? You bet! Yet simplified to cut costs, Every Invader boat has a white hull with a

deck choice of gold, green or blue.

And bless their hearts, every Invader—including Friski—has a spillover panel, splash pan, transom drain well, or whatever you want to call it . . . along the transom. That's a safety feature which, one day, will be a must on every on-board motorboat. This regardless of its size or make.

By the way, Plant Manager Lee Mangrum says that Friski is a composite of the preferences of a number of Texas outdoor writers who were surveyed by Invader last year to determine what the ideal bass fishing boat would be like. We were not asked, but we must say we sure do LIKE.

Catfish Application Deadline Nearing

The Aug. 1 application deadline for channel catfish and hybrid sunfish for stocking purposes is drawing near, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reminds.

Each year, the Department distributes more than three million fingerling channel catfish for stocking throughout the State.

The deadline for largemouth black bass, which spawn much earlier than catfish, was April 1.

Department spokesmen said many applicants applied for catfish shipments at the same time they applied for bass. Application forms may be obtained at the Department's Austin headquarters or in the various regional offices.

The deliveries ordinarily are made during October and November.

One hatchery superintendent indicated this year's crop of incubator catfish is going to be a good one. "We're in good shape right now," said James C. (Jake) Searcy of the Eagle Mountain Lake hatchery.

He said the incubators are racked up, the brooders have been returned to the holding ponds and about 430,000 young catfish are growing well.

Searcy said this year might possibly be the best for catfish raising at his hatchery, and the demand for the fingerlings will be met.

At Eagle Mountain, 57 pairs of catfish produced 47 spawns, and 37 pairs rematched for 31 additional spawns. As spawns were found in the jars, the eggs were transferred to the incubators until the young hatched.

Searcy said this year's spawn was "pretty good," despite continued cold weather in the late spring. He added that he feels he is able to grow a greater number of freshly hatched catfish to fingerling size now because of the use of wooden holding troughs and more effective control of predatory water bugs.

Since grass grows its food in the leaves, SCS experts advise leaving at least half the leaves on grass at all times. Fourteen million acres of Texas rangelands were grazed this way last year.

Greenbelt Lake Fish Rodeo Thru Sept. 7

A Fish Rodeo is now in progress at Greenbelt Lake and will continue through Labor Day week end, September 7, 1970. Tagged fish are worth from \$10 to \$100.

Merchants of Clarendon and Greenbelt Lake have contributed \$300.16 to tag fish in Greenbelt Lake. Fish were caught, tagged, and released by the State Fish and Game Commission. These include bass, channel cat, crappie, and hybrid perch. Tagged fish weighed up to 9 pounds.

A list of tagged fish and the names of contributors may be seen at Mooring Place on Greenbelt Lake.

Last week a tagged crappie worth \$25 was caught. Come fishing, have fun, and make money while doing so. Join in the Fish Rodeo at Greenbelt lake.

Food Ads An Aid To Shoppers

Food advertisements can be a big help to the grocery shopper, Gwendolynne Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist, notes.

"Food advertisements tell what foods are available and where, often include price, and although not often enough, they include a description of the food grade, size or other quality indications," Mrs. Clyatt said.

"Quality is usually high on advertised items as the store would not profit by calling attention to items in poor condition."

The purpose of the advertisement is to get the customer into the store, but the store also wants and needs repeat business, she said.

"Before buying groceries, check the food advertisements for high quality food at the low prices," Mrs. Clyatt said.

"Fryer chickens continue to take the spotlight as the bargain in most meat departments," she said. "Plentiful supplies of eggs are also on the market at prices everyone can afford."

There is little change in beef and pork prices, Mrs. Clyatt added. Best beef buys include chuck roasts and steaks, ground beef, short ribs and round steaks and roasts, according to Mrs. Clyatt.

"Best pork values will be found on hams, picnics, shoulder roasts and steaks, end cut loin roasts and chops and all kinds of lunch meat," she said.

Fresh fruit and vegetable items in good supply at the most economical prices include bananas, oranges, cantaloupes, watermelons, peaches, plums, corn, carrots, squash, and dry yellow onions. Others included are potatoes, head lettuce, cabbage, okra, cucumbers, radishes, green onions and tomatoes.
